

Biographical

DELBERT RAY GENTRY Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri 2003-2004

Delbert R. Gentry, working compatibly with the late Benjamin C. Moore, Jr., has demonstrated a remarkable blend of Masonic commitment and zeal. Much of the progress of Trenton Lodge and York Rite bodies during the past decade has resulted from the leadership of this loyal duo of Masonic stalwarts. Regrettably, Ben's untimely death in April 2002 ended their aspirations of simultaneously steering Missouri's Grand Chapter and Grand Commandery during the 2003-2004 year. For at least ten years, Most Excellent Companion Gentry and Sir Knight Moore were prerequisites for conferring degrees and ritual for Trenton Lodge and York Rite as well as most Masonic funeral services in the area.

Missouri's Grand High Priest was born March 31, 1927, only a half-mile from the home where he and his lady Betty now live. Their 295-acre farm has been in the Gentry family for more than a century. Delbert attended a rural grade school and graduated from Trenton High School in 1945. With military draft inevitable, he stayed on the farm until early in 1946, when he was inducted into the U.S. Army at Ft. Leavenworth, KS. He was soon transferred to Fort Lee, VA, then to Fort Sill, OK. From May to November of 1947, he was an instructor on the artillery range at West Point Military Academy where he was discharged.

Early in 1948, after returning home to survey employment possibilities, he met Betty Crawford, a Trenton girl. They were married November 25. Four children ensued; Brenda Allen, Deanna Boggs, Timothy, and Karen Saul residing in California, Columbia, MO, St. Joseph, and Trenton respectively.

Meanwhile, Delbert was assistant manager of Trenton Hy-Vee Foods before starting a 28-year career at the Carnation Food Plant, also in Trenton. He began in the maintenance department and in time became a purchasing agent. He retired in 1991.

An active member of the Trenton First Christian Church for about 50 years, Delbert served two terms as chairman of the church board and repeated terms as elder and deacon.

For some ten years, their children and grandchildren have been Delbert and Betty's main interests, followed by their Masonic activities at local and state levels. Part of his spare time, which is limited, is spent delivering prescriptions for a local pharmacy.

Raised in Trenton Lodge No. 111 in 1958, he has been elected Master three times, was Secretary for six years, and has served as District Deputy Grand Lecturer.

He was exalted a Royal Arch Mason in Trenton Chapter No. 66 in 1959 and has been elected High Priest three times. He was greeted a Royal and Select Master in Trenton Council No. 37 and knighted in Godfrey de Bouillon Commandery No. 24 in 1959. Delbert has filled the offices of Illustrious Master four times and has served as Commander five times.

Most Excellent Companion Gentry is also a member of Missouri Priory No. 17, KYCH, the Order of High Priesthood, the Order of the Silver Trowel, and the Missouri Association of Past Commanders. He is Past Sovereign of St. Joseph Conclave, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine; a member of the Royal Order of Scotland; Past Worthy Patron of Parson Chapter No. 189, OES; and a member of Pony Express Council No. 350, Allied Masonic Degrees. Delbert has also served as Governor of Edwin C. Carpenter York Rite College No. 181 and has been honored with the Order of the Purple Cross. He is also Fifth Pillar of Our Lord's Tabernacle, H.R.A.K.T.P. and a member of Charlemagne Council No. 79, Knight Masons. For many years he has served as Grand Representative of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of South Carolina, Regional Deputy Grand Master of Region 2 of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of Missouri, and Regional Grand Commander of Region 2 of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri.

Most Excellent Delbert R. Gentry, Grand High Priest, was elected Grand Principal Sojourner on May 14, 1999 and will continue to serve where needed and when called.

EDICTS

All Royal Arch Chapters within the state of Missouri are hereby granted a blanket dispensation to hold joint convocations, one with the other, and to move from their normal meeting places to those of the visited Chapter for the purpose of official visits of either the District Deputy Grand High Priest, District Deputy Grand Lecturer, or Grand High Priest, or for the purpose of conferring the Degrees of the Royal Arch. When such joint convocations occur, the membership of each Chapter must be notified in advance and in accordance with the by-laws in effect for each Chapter. It will not be necessary to obtain a separate dispensation each and every time, however, it will be necessary to inform the Grand High Priest and the Grand Secretary in advance of the event. This edict will be in effect until a new Grand High Priest is elected and installed.

TIME CAPSULE

On October 1, 2003, I went to Branson, inspected the time capsule, and found it to be in very good condition. The monument, with all of the inscriptions, looked very nice. I would like to commend Bob Detherow for all the time and work he has given to get the monument and to have it installed. I would like to thank him very much.

CONDITION OF THE CRAFT

The reports indicate that we are still losing members at a rate of eight or nine percent. It is thought the average age of our members to be 71 years. So the grand reaper takes his toll every year, and we are not taking in enough new members to offset our losses. We just need to visit our blue lodges and sell our York Rite Bodies. I have appointed a long range planning committee, and they have given some good suggestions that maybe we can put to good use.

REPORT OF THE GRAND TREASURER

All accounts are interest bearing, with no service charges. Investments in common stock or equal securities in nationally known corporations traded on the New York Stock Exchange, as allowed by Sec. 44 of the By-Laws is being utilized (Commerce Bank, Special Account and Investor Services at Central Bank). Based on previous ledgers, general fund receipts and expenditures are being projected on a monthly basis, so as to keep investments at the highest practical level for the longest practical time frame.

I present herewith my report of the receipts, disbursements, and the financial condition of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri for the fiscal year, April 1, 2003 through May 31, 2004.

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REPORTS OF GRAND SECRETARY

Summary

To the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri:

Companions, the membership records are getting closer to those reported by Chapter Secretaries. Our records differ from secretaries by about 620. Many secretaries are still not providing us with accurate membership records—meaning that they do not have them themselves. Joyce is working with them each and every day to try to get these numbers together. It is extremely important that secretaries keep accurate records of their membership to include full names, addresses, phone numbers, degree dates (all of them, not just the Royal Arch), and keep up with suspensions and reinstatements, dimits, etc. It is also extremely important that they report any changes in their membership as soon as it happens, not just during the annual return. We have about half of the secretaries that keep us up to date with that information and we thank them for their hard work.

There is a situation with the membership database hired to be developed for the Grand York Rite. The vendor hired has refused to provide us with the application developed, work with us to move the membership records over, and has gone out of business. Legal action is taking place at this time.

At the time of this communication, we are still waiting on annual returns from Hannibal No. 7, Linn No. 41, Clinton No. 73, and Kingsway No. 144. There is an effort underway by the Grand and Regional Grand Officers to get Linn No. 41 and Clinton No. 73 consolidated with another chapter.

Fifteen annual reports were late this year, the last being received on April 29. The continued tardiness of these reports makes it impossible for us to provide the membership numbers needed to develop budgets and long-range goals for the Grand Chapter. Chapter High Priests, District Deputy Grand High Priests, and the Grand Officers are now being informed of these delinquencies.

Liberty Chapter No. 3 has still refused to pay late fees for 2000, 2001, and 2002. All other Chapters are working with this office to complete their annual return fees.

The reports on chapter audits and bonds can be found in the tabular statements of chapters. Annual audits are good for the most part, but some chapters simply refuse to complete the annual audit. Chapter reports still identify that monies of the chapters are not deposited in accounts with at least two signatures.

Signet Chapter No. 68 consolidated with Wyoming Chapter No. 43 on October 6, 2003. St. Louis-Missouri Chapter No. 1 consolidated with St. Charles Chapter No. 111 on February 18, 2004. They requested a name change to St. Charles Missouri Chapter No. 1. Since the consolidation included a name change, the consolidation will become effective when the charter is issued under the new name on May 14, 2004.

The 2003 proceedings appear to be in good order with only minor corrections noted. The CD version of those proceedings will be available during this Grand Session and will be mailed to other jurisdictions this summer. The cost of the printed and CD versions of the proceedings was expected to save the Grand Chapter money. It is estimated that this savings was not as much as expected, about \$750.00 over all. The only difference being that it will save us about 75% in postage for distribution of the CDs over the books. The book printing will continue to see and increase in cost of about 10% per year regardless of what we do. We only printed 380 books this year as opposed to the usual 550. The 380 accounts for one copy for each Chapter, Council, Commandery, grand officer and

committee chairman. Although I feel it is the responsibility of the Grand York Rite to see that each of these organizations and representatives gets a copy, the only other way of reducing the numbers is change the current distribution. That being said, the cost in printing is not so significantly tied to the number of books printed, but the layout and press time. We either need to accept this recurring cost and continue to publish a professional document in which we can be proud of, or do as other jurisdictions have done and distribute the document in a different "less professional" document. There are always ways of saving money if we can live with our reduced standards of representation. It is my feeling that we should maintain our current standards of highly professional representation of the Grand York Rite of Missouri in its officers, its publications, and the way we do business in general. When we lose those things, we are no longer what we profess to be. We all owe a debt of thanks to Russell S. Hanson for his work in preparing the CD version of the proceedings, saving the Grand York Rite even more money. His report follows the conclusion of this report.

Joyce and I thank the Grand High Priest, his lady, and all the grand officers and members of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri for a most enjoyable and productive year. It has been a distinct pleasure to work with MEC Gentry. We also thank Teddie Harrison for his continued support of this office in his donation of paper; and a very special word of thanks goes to Paul Cannon who has so graciously given of his time and money to volunteer in the office and assist with a great many things in the day to day operations of the Grand York Rite. We thank all those who volunteer their time to help with the Grand York Rite Session—we could not do it without them. We all look forward to working with each and every one in the future.

I will close with this little quote:

If the Secretary writes a letter, it is too long;

If he sends a postal, it's too short.

If he sends out a notice, he's a spendthrift;

If he doesn't send a notice, he is lazy.

If he attends a committee meeting, he is butting in;

If he stays away, he is a shirker.

If he duns the members for dues, he is insulting;

If he fails to collect the dues, he is slipping.

If he asks for advice, he is incompetent;

And if he does not, he is bull-headed.

If he writes his reports complete, they are too long;

If he condenses them, they are incomplete.

SUPPLEMENTAL

REPORT ON 2003 OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS CD PROJECT

Dear Companion and Sir Knight Sample,

Per our conversation on April 30, 2004, here is a brief report on the 2003 Official Proceedings CD Project. On March 23, 2004, I contacted Disc Makers and spoke to Mr. Todd Bailey about the CD Project. He recommended glass-mastered CD-ROMs instead of CD-Rs. The \$825.00 cost for 500 CD-ROMs included 3-color silkscreen printing, paper sleeves, shipping and handling. Last year I estimated that reproduction costs would be about \$2.00 per item. I can now happily report that the actual cost per item will be \$1.65. Though time is getting tight, it remains my hope to receive the order prior to the Grand Session.

The cost of this project does not include the time and effort to prepare the CD master and the artwork for the surface printing. While Disc Makers could have handled the authoring and layout, I performed those tasks in order to control the cost to the Grand York Rite. We need to thank my friend Mr. Todd Houts for the generous use of his Apple Titanium notebook computer and his copy of the industry-standard graphics software Adobe Illustrator CS. I want to thank him for all of the support and encouragement that he gave me during that phase of the project. Creating the layout was a challenge (Illustrator is often called Intimidator), but very satisfying.

Authoring the CD master was easier than last year's proof-of-concept prototype due to all of the work that the Grand York Rite Office and General Printing Service did during the preparation of the printed proceedings. The Adobe Portable Document file (.pdf) provided by General Printing at no additional charge was an exact computer-readable version of the printed book. Utilizing the techniques developed last year, I had no problem creating an interactive version of the proceedings using Microsoft Word 2003 and Adobe Acrobat 5 on my HP a320n computer.

With what I have learned this year, I believe next year's job will be much easier. In fact, I have already prepared artwork for both the 2004 and 2005 Official Proceedings CD-ROMs. As they say once you invent the wheel, the rest is easy. I hope this report is sufficient for your needs. If you have any questions or require additional information, please let me know.

Proposed Legislation Laid Over from 2003

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Article XXVIII, Change of By-Laws, Section 224, Alteration or Repeal, be amended by striking the words, "foregoing" and "and read on one day of the session, be published in the PROCEEDINGS of the Grand Chapter and lay over until the next annual convocation, when it shall be again read".

THE BY-LAW CURRENTLY READS: Any alteration or proposition to amend or repeal any of the foregoing by-laws shall be reduced to writing and read on one day of the session, be printed in the <u>PROCEEDINGS</u> of the Grand Chapter and lay over until the next annual convocation, when it shall again be read, and if approved by a majority of the members present, shall become a part of the by-laws of this Grand Chapter.

IF AMENDED THE SECTION WOULD READ: *Article XXVIII, Change of Bylaws, Section 224, Alteration or Repeal*, Any alteration or proposition to amend or repeal any of the by-laws shall be reduced to writing and if approved by a majority of the members present, shall become a part of the by-laws of this Grand Chapter.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: In this day and age of electronic media it is no longer necessary and in most cases inconvenient and cumbersome to require such legislation to lie over an additional year.

Proposed Amendment Passed, May 14, 2004

Proposed Legislation Laid Over from 2003

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Article VI, Grand Secretary, Section 33-A, Retirement Plan, be repealed in its entirety.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: To save the Grand Chapter money and to prevent the raising of per capita in the future, seeing how the Grand Chapter has \$100,000.00 plus in the retirement fund. The Secretary's position is meant to be a job that will supplement his income, not one from which he can retire.

THIS SECTION OF THE BY-LAWS CURRENTLY READS: Article VI, Grand Secretary, Section 33-A, Retirement Plan.

- (a) After serving not less than one hundred twenty (120) months as a full time employee of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, of Missouri, such employee may at his option retire from said employment on or before May 1 next after becoming 65 years of age, or at any time thereafter, and shall then receive the retirement pension hereinafter provided.
- (b) The employee who retires as hereinafter provided shall be paid an annual pension equivalent to the number of years of his service multiplied by 1 1/2 percent of his average annual salary of the highest five (5) years, provided that in no event shall the retirement pension payments exceed 50 per cent of the annual salary being received by such employee at the time of his retirement.
- (c) No retirement payment shall be paid to any such employee who retires prior to becoming 65 years of age or with less than 120 months of service, unless while serving such employee shall become totally and permanently disabled. "Totally and permanently disabled" shall be comparable to that as defined and determined in the Social Security Act.
- (d) That a pension plan be now established in the Grand Chapter to make available at any necessary future time a partial source of funds.
- (e) That the Finance Committee be authorized now and until further action of any future Grand Chapter Annual Convocation, to provide any sum necessary to sustain the fund at its current investment principal to be placed in said fund for investment in U.S. Government Securities and that all earned interest accruing to the benefit of said fund

shall remain in said fund with the exception of those monies expended for payment to any retirees.

(f) The adoption of this section and the provisions therein contained shall not give any person, or persons, any vested right. The right is reserved to amend, modify, or repeal any or all parts of this section for any reason at all.

IF REPEALED THE SECTION WILL CEASE TO EXIST. The following recommendation of disbursement of the retirement fund is to divide it into four equal parts, putting one fourth in the first year into the General Investments Fund; one fourth the second year; one fourth the third year; and etc.; so as not to bring questions from the Internal Revenue Service. If adopted this should keep the Grand Chapter from raising per capita for several years in the future.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Article VI, Section 33-A, Retirement Plan, Paragraph (e) of the By-laws of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons be amended by striking the words, "U. S. Government Securities".

PARAGRAPH (e) CURRENTLY STATES: That the Finance Committee be authorized now and until further action of any future Grand Chapter Annual Convocation, to provide any sum necessary to sustain the fund at its current investment principal to be placed in said fund for investment in U.S. Government Securities and that all earned interest accruing to the benefit of said fund shall remain in said fund with the exception of those monies expended for payment to any retirees.

AS AMENDED PARAGRAPH (e) WILL READ: That the Finance Committee be authorized now and until further action of any future Grand Chapter Annual Convocation, to provide any sum necessary to sustain the fund at its current investment principal to be placed in said fund for investment and that all earnings accruing to the benefit of said fund shall remain in said fund with the exception of those monies expended for payment to retirees.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: Currently, the principal of the retirement fund must be invested in U.S. Government Securities. By removing this requirement, it would allow the retirement funds to be invested in accordance with the requirements of Article IX, Section 44, *Investments*. Thus, a portion of the funds would be able to potentially achieve higher rates of return than available for U.S. Government Securities.

Proposed Amendment Repealed by previous legislative action, May 14, 2004

Proposed Legislation Laid Over from 2003

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Article XVIII, Life Membership, Section 164, Subsection 12, of the By-laws of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri, be amended by changing "recorders" to "secretaries", striking "less the per capita tax in effect when the member became a life member", substituting "minus per capita" in its place, placing a period (.) after capita, and adding the following wording, "This is provided that no earnings shall be distributed on any Life Membership until after January 1 of the second (2nd) calendar year after such fee, paid in full, is deposited with the Grand Secretary. When a Life Member dies, the Grand Chapter will continue to receive his per capita, less 20% and his Chapter will continue to receive his prorated earnings, less 20%. The retained 20% will be added to the Funds principal to provide for growth in the fund. Prorated earnings shall be based on the member's chapter dues that existed at the time the individual entered the Life Membership Program. Per capita shall be the per capita that existed at the time the individual entered the Life Membership Program.

IF AMENDED THIS SECTION WILL READ: Article XVIII, Life Membership, Section 164, Subsection 12, The Grand Secretary shall annually remit to the Secretaries of participating subordinate chapters their prorated portion of the earnings of the Life Membership Fund minus per capita. This is provided that no earnings shall be distributed on any Life Membership until after January 1 of the second (2nd) calendar year after such fee, paid in full, is deposited with the Grand Secretary. When a Life Member dies, the Grand Chapter will continue to receive his per capita, less 20% and his Chapter will continue to receive his prorated earnings, less 20%. The retained 20% will be added to the Funds principal to provide for growth in the fund. Prorated earnings shall be based on the member's chapter dues that existed at the time the individual entered the Life Membership Program. Per capita shall be the per capita that existed at the time the individual entered the Life Membership Program.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: Currently, the fund must achieve annual earnings in excess of 5 1/2% in order to provide for a 100% distribution. By establishing a minimum of one (1) year for the earnings from any new Life Membership investment (participant), it allows the investment to have earnings for at least a full year, prior to them being involved in the earnings distribution. Thusly, the distribution to prior membership will not be reduced in order to make up for the short term investment earnings from the new members. The principal of the fund <u>must grow</u> in order to provide for greater earnings. The return of 20% of a deceased members earnings to the principal of the fund will allow for growth in the fund, without greatly hampering the Grand Chapter and subordinate Chapters.

Proposed Amendment Passed, May 14, 2004

Proposed Legislation Laid Over from 2003

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: *Article XVIII, Life Membership, Section 164*, of the Bylaws of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri be amended as follows:

- (1) by striking all after "membership" and substituting "by computing the fee as 20 times the member's Chapter dues at the time of purchase of said life membership, provided that no life membership fee shall be less than \$300.00. All formulas shall be reviewed annually by the Committee on Life Membership, and if needed to be changed, submitted in writing in accordance with Article XXVIII, Change of By-laws", and
- (2) by repeal of paragraph 15.

PARAGRAPH 2 CURRENTLY STATES: Any member may purchase a life membership using the following method of computing the fee. Divide his chapter dues by 5% (or multiply by 20) and this will be the cost of a Life Membership if purchased between January 1 and June 30, if purchased after June 30, add one year's dues.

All formulas shall be reviewed annually by the Committee on Life Membership, and if needed to be changed, submitted in writing in accordance with Article XXVIII, *Change of By-Laws*.

PARAGRAPH 15 CURRENTLY STATES: The Committee of the Life Membership Program shall be empowered to establish a minimum fee for Life Membership. However, the minimum fee shall not be less that \$150.00. These fees shall be reviewed annually by the Committee of the Life Membership Program and a report made to the annual convocation.

IF ADOPTED THE WORDING OF PARAGRAPH 15 WILL NO LONGER EXIST.

PARAGRAPH 2 WILL THEN READ: Any member may purchase a life membership by computing the fee as 20 times the member's Chapter dues at the time of purchase of said life membership, provided that no life membership fee shall be less than \$300.00. All formulas shall be reviewed annually by the Committee on Life Membership, and if needed to be changed, submitted in writing in accordance with *Article XXVIII*, *Change of By-laws*.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: It is our understanding that the purpose of having a member pay an additional year's dues, who purchased a Life Membership after June 30, was due to the fact that the Grand Chapter could not generate a return on that Life Membership in less than six months time. Therefore, the additional year's dues should not have been part of the endowment, but used as a part of the earnings for distribution for that year. However, due to the wording of the existing by-laws, additional years' dues were deposited as part of the principal of the fund. This had not been all bad, as it has allowed for some growth in the fund, but in turn has caused unnecessary paperwork, confusion, and concern with many secretaries of subordinate Chapters. The necessary items in paragraph 15 are adequately covered elsewhere in this section and need not be duplicated. By establishing an increased minimum participation fee, doing away with the additional year's dues, and eliminating paperwork, it will provide for growth in the fund, while being less confusing for the Chapters and ease the management of the fund by the Grand Chapter.

Proposed Legislation Laid Over from 2003

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Convocations of the Grand Chapter, Section 1, Annual Convocations, be amended by striking all after "held" and substituting "on the day immediately prior to the annual conclave of the Grand Commandery, beginning at 9:00 a.m. in the City of Columbia or Jefferson City, provided that time of the next succeeding annual convocation may be changed by a majority vote of the Grand Chapter at any annual convocation, or as provided for in the Constitution, as amended in Article V, Section 1".

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: To establish a permanent meeting place for the Grand Chapter in or near the center of the state and to exhibit a sense of York Rite unity when all Grand Bodies can meet at the same time of the year.

Proposed Legislation

Palmyra Chapter No. 2, Royal Arch Masons

1. Historical

Palmyra Chapter No. 2, R.A.M. received its original charter from the General Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons, September 14, 1838. A second charter was granted from the Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons, State of Missouri, in 1848.

Palmyra Chapter No.2, R.A.M. was one of the organizing chapters of the Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons, State of Missouri.

Palmyra Chapter has been in a state of disarray for several years. Because of its historical significance, we feel it must be preserved.

2. Proposal

It is proposed that Palmyra Chapter No. 2, R.A.M. be given a research and an educational function. We propose that it become a storehouse for Royal Arch and York Rite educational material to be distributed to Master Masons in the State of Missouri. The educational material would include not only printed papers but also videos and films. It could also be a source of historical documents (old charters, seals and other pertinent files). Another valuable application would be a provision for Royal Arch references such as the Denslow collections of books and pamphlets and for other collections written by other Missouri Masonic authors.

A possible home for this material might be within the proposed Library of the Missouri Lodge of Research to be located in Columbia.

It is also proposed that a governing body of Palmyra Chapter No. 2 be composed of the Past Grand High Priests of the Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons, State of Missouri. A line of succession would start with the current senior Past Grand High Priest. Committee members would also be selected from that pool of senior Past Grand High Priests. The current Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary could function in their respective capacities to provide administrative expertise.

An annual meeting hour could be at a time during the Grand Chapter session. A separate account would be established by the Grand Treasurer for Palmyra Chapter No. 2. Current members would be grandfathered in a current dues structure. New members will be: 23 Past Grand High Priests, to become Life Members of Palmyra Chapter No. 2 at cost of the Grand Chapter; current Grand High Priest, life membership paid by the Grand Chapter of Missouri upon his taking office; Honorary Memberships to be sold for \$50.00; Life Memberships to be sold for \$500.00. Current cost to Grand Chapter would be \$12.000.00.

Membership will receive quarterly newsletter, certificate of membership, and a dues card. Life Members will receive one time issue of credit card style dues card with picture and current Grand Chapter title. Replacement cards will be charged at cost.

Details of operation and precise functions remain to be developed.

3. Request

It is urged that the Grand Chapter membership consider this proposal and join us in creating a living memorial in behalf of those who founded and served Palmyra Chapter during the past 166 years.

IF ADOPTED, THIS SECTION WILL READ: Every chartered Chapter shall annually pay to the Grand Secretary, for the use of the Grand Chapter, seven dollars and fifty cents per capita for each member borne on the rolls of the Chapter, on the 31st day of December, preceding the annual convocation of the Grand Chapter, and the sum of two dollars for all dues remitted by the Subordinate Chapter for the purposes of paying for the Royal Arch Mason Magazine and the per capita for the General Grand Chapter on those members whose dues have been remitted.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: To have the Subordinate Chapters cover the costs of the Companions whose dues have been remitted. The Magazine costs approximately \$1.50 per member and the General Grand Chapter per capita is approximately \$0.45. We do not feel that the Grand Chapter should bear the expense.

Palmyra Chapter No. 2 is, and therefore should be retained as, a living memorial in behalf of those who founded Royal Arch Masonry in Missouri and, served Royal Arch Masonry in Missouri for the past 166 years. It is for these reasons that we strongly support an amendment to the Constitution of the Grand Chapter of the State of Missouri.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RETURNS OF CHAPTERS

To the Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri:

Companions, on March 27, 2004, I examined the returns of the Chapters and overall found them to be in fair condition. I would like to compliment our Grand Secretary, who made this task a simple and pleasant one.

Following is some of the problems we found with the returns; no audit reports, no seal on the returns, missing officers, same companions holding multiple elected stations, no High Priest signature, etc. It is sad to report that as of this date, we have ten Chapters who have not made an Annual Report. These Chapters are: Palmyra, Liberty, Hannibal, Linn, Ralls, Clinton, George F. Gouley, Joplin, Owens, and Kingsway. Companions, it is hard for the Financial Committee to set a budget when we have so many Chapters not making Annual Returns on time.

Companions, it is sad to report we are continuing to decrease in membership at the average of ten percent a year. There must be a way to put emphasis on the retention of membership. Realizing we cannot do anything about the deaths, we need to concentrate on stopping the suspensions and demits. That is why I am recommending that we incorporate the Three R's, Retention, Re-motivation, and Recruitment, in Royal Arch Masonry.

Being a member of the Life Membership Committee for many years, this is the first year we will be able to pay back one hundred per cent that is due the Chapters.

In closing, I would recommend that we strive to get more members to join the Life Membership program, this would stop the decline.

GRAND CHAPTER SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORTS

PRELIMINARY REPORT OF AUDIT COMMITTEE

An audit of the financial records of the Grand Chapter was conducted on April 18, 2004, with the Grand Secretary and the Grand Treasurer in attendance. This audit focused primarily upon the record keeping practices and controls placed upon the

finances of the Grand Chapter by the Grand Secretary and the Grand Treasurer with limited incursions into actual receipts and expenses from the individual accounts as previously authorized in the approved budget by the Finance Committee. The Committee notes that the Grand Secretary and the Grand Treasurer maintain a successive list of warrants that successively and successfully track income to and expenditures from the various line items contained in the budget. The Committee further notes that each officer maintains a balance sheet to report such activity on a continual basis. The balance sheets are readily deciphered even by an untrained eye. The lack of balance sheets from Committees having oversight of the income and expenditure of some funds is particularly troublesome especially as these relate to the tax-exempt standing of the Grand Chapter. The Committee observed that some of the equipment utilized by the Grand Secretary in the performance of his duties are leased items. The Committee also observed that some supplies are donated items for the use of the Grand York Rite of Missouri and that some of the office equipment and shelving utilized by these officers is donated for the benefit of the Grand York Rite of Missouri. The audit took into account the amount of space being utilized by the Grand York Rite. The Grand York Rite office is manned on a near 24/7 basis and functions with only the assistance of one other paid employee. Taxes are computed and paid for these employees and adequate records are maintained for that purpose. The Committee did review the 990 forms utilized to document the tax payments of the Grand Chapter and found them in order. The Committee found that some original paperwork documenting the tax-exempt status of the Grand York Rite was missing. The Committee notes that a number of Subordinate Chapters have filed no annual returns, paid per capita tax, or have filed late returns. The lack of doing so complicates the maintenance of accurate membership statistics that are used to project and prepare the annual budget. Furthermore, this lackadaisical attitude and lack of record keeping and submission results in unnecessary costs to the general fund of the Grand Chapter.

It is the understanding of the Audit Committee that some initial planning has taken place for the conduct of a dollars and cents internal audit following the close of the Grand Session this year.

Recommendations:

- 1. that a complete inventory be conducted of all the property being held in storage. It is recommended that a committee of Past Grand Heads of Bodies be appointed for this purpose.
- 2. that such committee focus on items that are out dated or can no longer be utilized with an eye towards dispersal in order to reduce the necessity to retain scattered storage locations thereby reducing costs to the Grand York Rite. Such material includes desks, typewriters, and printers to name a few.
- 3. that such committee reviews all documentation currently in storage and determines its intrinsic value for retention or destruction.
- 4. that having done so, the committee explores the means of reducing items (documentation and papers) selected for retention to electronic media thereby again reducing the necessity for retaining and paying for additional storage space.
- 5. that practice be put in place to require financial statements from all committees having oversight of any funds associated with the Grand Chapter, including those of the charities.
- 6. that practice be put in place to enforce the filing of annual returns and payment of per capita and/or penalties in a more timely manner.

- 7. that a paper inventory be established to identify and segregate property actually under the control and ownership of the Grand York Rite as opposed to that being donated by the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer.
- 8. that any proposed internal audit be conducted as near as possible after the close of the books for the Grand Session.
- 9. that the Grand Treasurer continues his pursuit of and obtains such documentation as is necessary to corroborate the 501(c) (10) filing status for the Grand York Rite of Missouri.

In closing, it should be noted that one of the names appearing as signatory on this report was not as originally appointed by the Grand High Priest. In the waning hours immediately prior to the date and time scheduled for the conduct of the audit, it became quite apparent that the majority of the Committee had dissolved itself. It therefore became necessary to relieve the burden and fill the void by grabbing a willing soul. That was done. So be it!

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LONG RANGE PLANNING

To the Most Excellent Grand High Priest and Companions of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri:

Companions, in consideration of the fact that York Rite Masonry in Missouri must grow to continue its survival, this Committee, at the request of the Grand High Priest, arrived at the following recommendations for consideration and/or inclusion in any planned goals or objectives for membership growth to be pursued by the Grand Chapter of Missouri in the years ahead:

The members of this Committee recognized the formidable challenge faced in exposing the sum of all influences working today against the growth of the Masonic Fraternity, and the practical impossibility of reporting and printing all that is capable of eroding its membership base.

They acknowledged that the magnitude and nature of this challenge automatically sets certain boundaries as to what can be incorporated into any proposed long-range plan for fighting membership decline.

It became clear also that the steps involved in any such plan not only must be sufficiently general so that all may be able to come to agreement with them but be accomplishable using the limited available time and money to be donated and the limited available human resources to be volunteered.

With these limitations in mind, the Committee arrived at the following conclusions and fourteen (14) underlined recommendations for possible future implementation and development by the Grand Chapter of Missouri:

The Committee determined that during the last forty years membership in Masonry as well as all other fraternal organizations has dropped by half, and that half of Masonic membership in Missouri today is over 71 years of age.

It was also determined that our membership problem is related to the fact that, as a group, the generations born after World War II have not been joiners, and that during these decades a man had to first approach a Mason with a desire to join in order to become one.

While it is possible now for Masons to solicit new members, it remains true however to this day that not every adult male relative or friend may possess the type of attitudes or beliefs which would enable him to benefit from Masonic membership.

Therefore, it was felt that recruitment of new members needs to remain selective.

Every Royal Arch Mason is to develop his own personal mission to selectively recruit those he knows who ought to be one from the members of his own family, professional colleagues, neighbors, and friends.

To that end the Blue Lodges may not always be the most productive places to go looking for new Chapter members, i.e., it may work better to interest a non-Mason first in the entire York Rite where more will happen.

Since every Master Mason should be a Royal Arch Mason, it may prove advantageous to organize and conduct future York Rite Conferences in such a way as to permit Master Masons who do not yet belong to Chapters, Councils, or Commanderies to attend them.

It also may be found expedient for the Grand Chapter to assign a Royal Arch Ambassador to each Blue Lodge, with a special nameplate of recognition containing the name and number of the Lodge, to improve communication and promote potential membership.

It was felt that the Grand Chapter, along with the Grand Council and Grand Commandery, should continue maintaining a physical presence, and distribute York Rite literature and information, at the annual communication of the Grand Lodge.

It was also felt that the Grand Chapter might begin to appoint a Royal Arch Ambassador to the various other appendant Masonic bodies, especially the Scottish Rite, and for those bodies to appoint their own Ambassadors to the Grand Chapter, for the purpose of establishing cooperation and finding ways of improving membership in both organizations simultaneously for mutual benefit.

The Committee felt that any plan to reverse declining membership must consider retention and be geared to reduce suspensions and demits by understanding and trying to counteract their causes.

It was determined that Masonry cannot reach a potential member to begin improving the world through him unless it also reaches the woman in his life and convinces her of its good effects.

The Committee therefore felt that providing good men and their ladies with a means of social interaction with other good men and their ladies is a duty incumbent to every Lodge, Chapter, Council, and Commandery.

It was determined that Masonry has to do with self-improvement, philanthropies, and a host of other worthwhile things, but above all else, it is about friendships.

It is about human connections.

It is about the things that people, by their own admission, miss most as they grow older.

The Committee therefore felt that providing men and their ladies with a venue in which they can, on a regular basis, strengthen existing friendships and form new ones while at the same time be part of something bigger than self and, in the process, help to make the world a better place, should be the core idea for promoting our fraternity to the outside world.

The reasons for this are simple:

This is what gets men to join the Lodge and Chapter.

This is what gets them to attend meetings.

This is what keeps them paying their dues.

This is what keeps them from getting suspended or requesting a demit.

Chapters exist for the Companions, not the Companions for the Chapters.

A means therefore should be developed to permit Chapters to hold daylight

meetings, or even establish daylight Chapters, to accommodate those Companions who can no longer attend evening meetings or travel after dark due to health reasons or having to work nights.

The Committee also recognized that those Chapters which are remaining most viable, staying together, and accomplishing what they need to do, have officers who are practicing the skills of leadership.

Therefore, it was felt that a means of acquainting all Royal Arch Masons in this state with the principles involved with the eleven (11) Leadership Skills should be made available; either by holding separately scheduled educational forums for this purpose or by extending the Regional York Rite Conferences to include them.

The Committee felt that a complete and full understanding and application of this teaching by every Companion in this state would be more effective at fighting membership decline than any other single recommendation it can make.

It was also felt that an appropriate means of recognition would be advantageous to develop, such as a Grand Chapter Leadership Certificate, in return for attending a Grand Chapter sponsored Leadership Forum.

The Committee also recognized that the by-product of losing a good opportunity is lost growth, and lost growth in turn translates into loss of potential membership.

However the seizing of one good opportunity usually opens a door to more of the same.

It was felt therefore that our committees should be mindful of recognizing any good opportunity that presents itself, to recommend whatever action be taken which would result in the opportunity being seized rather than lost, and if lost, to commit to doing something to recover it again.

The Committee determined that a certain proportion of Companions each year would get into arrears on paying their dues because the timing on when their dues notices are received is not always the best.

Fraternal dues notices often arrive between Thanksgiving and Christmas/Hanukah at the same time that personal property taxes, holiday purchases, and many other bills come due, and sometimes a Chapter dues notice must wait until the new year to be paid.

It was also determined that dues notices arriving from some Chapters are making no provision for partial payment toward Life (Endowed) Membership.

To help minimize any potential financial hardship at year's end for dues paying members, the Committee recommends that dues cards be ordered from the Grand Secretary in August of the preceding year, and that Chapter Secretaries be encouraged to mail out dues notices so that they are received no later than October 1.

Chapter dues notices should in each case include a provision for making partial or full payment toward purchasing a Life (Endowed) Membership.

The Committee recognized that candidates need to receive the four Chapter degrees within a short time after they become eligible.

To that end, and to accommodate those less active Chapters which may lack the resources needed to put together their own degree teams, the Chapter Secretaries should be requested to assemble a listing of the Companions in their respective Chapters who participate in the various parts of the degrees and to send that record to the District Deputy Grand Lecturer, who may then share that information in the future, if requested, with any other Chapter in his respective District whenever it confers a degree(s).

Then, if the District Deputy Grand Lecturer would forward that same information to the Grand Lecturer who can in turn share it with all of his Deputies, it would place all of them in a position to better direct any Chapter degree team leader to someone who may be able to fill the part(s) a Chapter may need to confer a certain degree(s).

The advantage of adopting this system over trying to organize and maintain regional degree teams would be that the demands it makes on time, expense, and manpower would be far less, to say nothing of making a degree team leader's job easier.

The more a candidate is impressed by what he sees and hears in the degrees, the more he will value his membership.

Therefore the Committee felt that, because of what it would add to the dignity, grandeur, and impressiveness of a conferral, and for the unforgettable impression it makes when properly done, a standardized program of organ music well performed and well chosen for its appropriateness to the Chapter degrees in consultation with the Grand Lecturer, if pursued, developed, recorded, and made available for distribution, would be highly desirable.

The members of this Committee wish to acknowledge the admirable efforts of those dedicated York Rite Masons who have worked diligently in many ways to stimulate membership growth, and to thank them for their dedication and sharing their wisdom with us.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMBERSHIP AND YOUTH ACTIVITIES

To the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri:

Without new members, we will eventually close our doors or our Chapters will not have enough members to operate or put on the degree work for new members. Could it be that when he gets his First Degree, we are telling them that they should be a York Rite or Scottish Rite Mason? Should we be mentors to these new Masons, encouraging them and being visible as York Rite Masons, so they want to join us when they feel ready to do so?

The young men of today with families do not have the time that we did when most of us joined, there is so much going on with their children both with school and sports, therefore, we need to focus on events that the whole family can be invited to. Has your Chapter had a social event this past year that prospective members and their families

could be invited to? The future depends on US; each Chapter needs to start doing some strategic planning NOW, don't wait until it is too late.

Lastly, when we get a young man in our Lodge or Chapter and he has fresh new ideas, why does someone say, "We tried that twenty years ago and it didn't work." (or we didn't like it). Remember it only takes a spark to start a flame, and he might just have that spark.

I have just given you some thoughts to ponder, I do not have the answers, as I said, but if every one of us would just replace ourselves with one new member, and then take the time to nurture that new member, we can be assured that we have given new life to the York Rite of Missouri.

He also encouraged Chapters to start Daylight Chapters to provide an opportunity for some of the older members to get out and be with their Companions without the risk of driving at night.

Finally, he encouraged all to try different things, and to read the book "Who Moved My Cheese."

REVIEW AND HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

To the Most Excellent Grand High Priest and Companions of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons:

This and subsequent material has been adapted primarily from "A History of Royal Arch Masonry in the State of Missouri" by Ray V. Denslow. It was first published in 1932. It was issued by Authority of the Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons State of Missouri. From time to time, other references will be referred to. They were credited by their source.

The Period 1861-1863 (Civil War)

"On Wednesday, May 22nd, 1861, the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri was opened in the City of St. Louis; its Convocation continued through Thursday and Friday, and then was followed by the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge on the Monday following: this was the first of the annual meetings of any of the Grand Bodies to be held following the declaration of war on April 9th and we are naturally interested in what the Grand High Priest, J.W. Crane, had to say concerning the threatening war clouds:

"We, as the representatives of the subordinate Chapters, of this grand body, are again permitted to meet in this hall dedicated to brotherly love, relief and truth, to legislate for the best interests of the fraternity; and I sincerely hope that, in all your

deliberations and acts, you will have but one aim in view – that is, to do all in your power to promote peace and harmony amongst the companions throughout the State. This duty seems to me to be imperative upon us at this time, owing to the National difficulties which are alienating one State from another: and indeed its baneful influence has made its way into our sacred domiciles, creating anarchy and discord around our once happy and peaceful firesides. Under the benign influence of the teachings if Royal Arch Masonry, so far as I am advised, peace and harmony prevails; but owing to the distracted condition of our beloved State, comparatively but few members have been added to the list of the past year.

"My Companions, the trying and severe ordeal under which we are now passing, in a national point of view, justifies me to admonish you to exercise moderation towards our Companions who may differ from us in our opinions touching our troubles; forget not that they are Brethren; let your charity for them be as expansive as the blue arch of heaven; let us not forget these truly Masonic virtues which teach us peace on earth and good will towards men."

From the pen of Brother Anthony O'Sullivan, who, like Jeremiah of old, predicts the fateful consequence of war, we are constrained to quote:

"The perusal of old proceedings commented on convinces us that in the several Grand Chapters and their subordinates, peace and brotherly love prevail. No exhibition of unfraternal feelings are observable. No unmasonic language falls harshly on the ear. The comments of writers are courteous, and evince a desire to avoid exciting the passions or prejudices of their companions. And the conclusion at which we arrive is that within the past year a large measure of prosperity has been meted out to Royal Arch Masonry.

"If we are deeply impressed with the works of creation, what an ample field for thought is offered to the contemplative mind by the changing year, bringing at stated times, spring, summer, autumn, winter, typical of childhood, youth, manhood, old age! How sudden and startling the change from winter to spring! It is but a few weeks and the angry blasts of winter, like the fierce wrath of a passionate man, was heard loud and boisterous, when they suddenly disappear before the invigorating breezes of spring. The rivers and brooklets bursting from the icy embrace which so long bound them, are now rushing with headlong impetuosity to lose themselves in the restless ocean, fit emblem of unbridled youth. As we write, the prairies bordering our cottage home are like a piece of rich tapestry, decked with thousands of beautiful variegated flowers, the handiwork of God. The birds, silent in winter, now joyous, send forth from their little warbling throats hymns of praise and thanksgiving. The voice of the husbandman is heard in cheerful strains, as with vigorous arm he guides the plough, preparing the earth to receive the seeds, which will at the appointed time send forth a bountiful reward for his labor. Thus, God plants the seed of his divine love in the hearts of men, and when scattered on fruitful soil, and watered by the tears of repentance, brings forth an abundant harvest of generous thoughts of noble deeds. The earth itself, like a beautiful bride decked with gorgeous vestments, yields itself to the invigorating embrace of the sun. When earth and air are resonant with the praises of God, why is it that man alone, like an unstrung harp, sends forth notes of discord, when all else is harmony?

"If the present unhappy condition of the people was brought about by foreign armies traversing the country, carrying desolation and death wherever they appeared, the sympathy of the civilized world be aroused in our behalf. But, when we reflect, like our present troubles are of our own devising, we must acknowledge that we alone are to blame, and must abide the consequences. Why are the hearts of good men oppressed

with sorrow when they contemplate the distracted condition of this once glorious confederacy? Why do men indulge in fierce and angry invective, and those who should be brothers denounce each other as enemies? Because we, as a people in the day of our prosperity, have forgotten God, and we are now like His chosen people of old, to feel the terrible effects of his anger.

"Have we as Royal Arch Masons collectively or individually contributed in any manner to bring about these troubles? If so, let us humble ourselves before the Great I AM, and invoke Him to spare us the realization of that dread calamity which hangs over our unhappy country like a funeral pall. Let us supplicate that He may change the hearts and understanding of men, so that all may acknowledge that He is a God of infinite love and mercy; and let us fervently pray that this nation may be once more a light set upon a hill, shining with such mild radiance that the nations of the world may be guided – not dazzled by its brilliancy. But, above all, and beyond all, let us by our acts proclaim that Jehovah is our God, and our refuge in all times of trouble and tribulation, and that to his name is to be ascribed Power, Glory, and Dominion now and forever!"

William R. Penick, elected Grand High Priest in 1861, did not preside over the Annual Convocation of Grand Chapter, being engaged in military duty; he was serving as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge at the same time, and, of course, was absent from the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, which convened on Monday following the conclusion of the Grand Chapter on Friday. His address was read by Grand Secretary O'Sullivan; there was no evidence to show that it underwent the amendments as did his annual address before the Grand Lodge. Concerning war conditions he said: "You have again assembled in annual convocation to legislate for the best interests of Royal Arch Masonry in this state, and, although my military duties are of such nature that I cannot meet with you, I will here report my official acts and doings as your executive officer, since your last annual convocation and present for your consideration such matters of interest as I may think worthy of your attention. ***

"I have made no official visits to Chapters since our last convocation. A great portion of my time it would have been unsafe for me to attempt to discharge that duty, on account of the armed guards of marauders that have been infesting our state. ***

"My official correspondence has been limited, owing to the suspension of mail facilities in a large portion of the state during most of the year. As it has been mainly of a political nature, I shall make but one allusion to it. I have often been asked to define the duty of Royal Arch Masons in the present rebellion, and have always unhesitatingly answered in the language of the old charge: A Mason is to be a peaceable subject to the civil powers wherever he resides or works, and is never to be concerned in plots or conspiracies against the peace and welfare of the nation. ***

"In conclusion, my Companions, I would remind you of the solemn responsibility which rests upon each and all of us, as Royal Arch Masons, to execute faithfully the trust reposed in us. In all our actions, let us ever look to the author of the Great Light in Masonry for wisdom to govern us, that we may "judge with candor, admonish with friendship, and reprehend with justice."

Grand Secretary O'Sullivan reported that all mail facilities had been suspended between his place of residence (Springfield) and St. Louis, and that he had been deprived of receiving the proceedings of the several Grand Chapters.

The Committee on Returns had before them the returns of 14 Chapters; they were Missouri No. 1, Palmyra No. 2, Weston No. 4, Hannibal No. 7, St. Louis No. 8, Lexington No. 10, St. Joseph No. 14, Monroe No. 16, Bloomington No. 22, Bond No.

23, Bellefontaine No. 25, Mexico No. 27, Greenfield No. 31, and an informal return from Independence No. 12, the Secretary informing the committee that the Chapter had held no meeting since July 1861, owing to the unsettled state of affairs.

Boonville No. 5, Columbus No. 17, Monticello No. 20, DeMolay No. 26, Kansas City No. 28, Eastern Star No. 29, failed to make returns, and Liberty No. 3, Jefferson City No. 11, Savannah No. 18, Davenport No. 19, Melody No. 22, George Washington No. 24, and Lone Star No. 30, had failed to make returns for the last two years.

1863

James Carr of Paris, Missouri was elected Grand High Priest at the Annual Convocation in 1862, but he did not appear to preside over Grand Chapter on May 20, 1863. His address, which was read, occupied less than two pages of the proceedings; he said: "My official correspondence has been limited in consequence of the disturbed condition of the country, growing out of the present rebellion. A few of the subordinate Chapters have been doing a very flourishing business in the way of exalting new members, but the majority have been hard run to keep the necessary meetings to prevent a forfeiture of their charters.

"In view of the disturbed condition of the state, I would recommend that the utmost leniency be extended to the Chapter in this connection, believing that such a course would conduce more to the good of Royal Arch Masonry than requiring them to comply strictly with the Constitution."

The Grand Secretary announced that Independence Chapter No. 12, Davenport No. 19, Kansas City No. 28, George Washington No. 24. DeMolay No. 26 had been compelled to suspend labor, and that Columbus No. 17 and Eastern Star No. 29 had probably been compelled to "bend to the storm which has devastated our beloved state."

The following Chapters made return: Nos. 1, 2, 4, 5, 7, 8, 14, 16, 20, 21, 22, 23, 25, 27, 31, 36, although Greenfield No. 31 paid no dues; Lexington No. 10 and Huntsville No. 13 failed to make return, and Columbus No. 17, Kansas City No. 28, Independence No. 12, DeMolay No. 26, Eastern Star No. 29 failed to make returns for the past two years; Davenport No. 19 and George Washington No. 24 had made no returns in three years.

James N. Burnes, Weston, was elected Grand High Priest and immediately addressed the Grand Chapter. Among other things, he said:

"Adhering, with faultless devotion, to the Government of the Country in which we live, and submitting to the decisions of the Supreme Legislature,' we yet proudly ignore all differences, religious or political and preserve for ourselves and our posterity the ancient, honored and beloved Institution of Royal Arch Masonry, which can never be rightfully affected by any change of government, political institutions, or tumults among men. Decay – written in imperishable characters upon everything else under heaven – will not dare approach our sacred temples so long as Royal Arch Masons repudiate and denounce every departure from our time - honored teachings.

"The red hand of Civil War and commotion, which has fallen heavily upon us, and which even now deprives us of the counsel of so many of those venerable and enlightened companions, who hitherto met us in this sacred place, is still agonizing the whole country, retarding its prosperity and filling the land with mourning, still our cherished tenets are unchanged."

1864

On May 17, 1864, the Grand Chapter convened in the City of St. Louis. The Grand High Priest, James N. Burnes, told of conditions as they existed in the various Chapters:

"Many of our Chapters are doing no good, and are, perhaps permanently broken up. On the north side of our great river, I do not believe there are six Chapters doing work enough to justify the maintenance of their organization. The existence of a Chapter, when that Chapter fails in its labors and its duties, is a positive injury to the Institution and a wrong to its neighboring Chapters. Not working, its existence prevents others from doing much valuable labor. The present and past condition of the state prevents us from censuring our Companions in such cases, but it does not justify us in the continuing of charters when no efforts have been, or are being now, made to recover what has been lost by merciless encroachments upon our Sacred Tabernacles."

1865

The Annual Convocation of the Grand Chapter, held in St. Louis May 17, 1865, followed the surrender at Appomattox. J.A.H. Lampton, Grand High Priest, deplored the raid on Masonic mysteries and the influx of new members, many of whom he believed were unsuited for material in rebuilding the Temple. He said:

"Some Grand Chapters in neighboring jurisdictions have granted roving commissions or dispensations to certain Companions connected with the armies of the United States, for the establishment of Military or Field Chapters. Strange names! These Chapters move from one jurisdiction to another – first to Kentucky, next to Tennessee, then to Mississippi, as the armies advance, making Royal Arch Masons of citizens of Missouri and other jurisdictions where, for the time, the regiment or brigade having this roving commission may be stationed. This is wrong. It is an unauthorized invasion of jurisdictions having Grand and subordinate Chapters of their own capable of working up all the good material in their midst, and entitled to the rights to them by general Masonic law and usage."

"There can be no possible excuse for such fragrant violation of all the laws of Masonic comity, and that brotherly regard which should influence the Companions of the several jurisdictions.

"Whatever may be thought of the Regimental Lodges and Chapter of former times, when there were but few Lodges and scarcely any Chapters in the country, there can be no justification for their establishment now, when Lodges and Chapters are to be found in every state. They are nuisances and should be abated as soon as possible. As for the Royal Arch Masons professing to have been made in these Field Chapters, they should not be recognized as such by regular Companions. Most certainly, citizens of Missouri so made should be treated as clandestine, and dealt with accordingly.

"My Companions, I trust that you will take such action regarding these roving Chapters as the dignity and welfare of the Grand Chapter of Missouri may warrant."

As to conditions existing in the Chapters, he has the following to say:

"During the year no Chapters have been suspended, no charters surrendered, and no dispensations granted for new Chapters in this jurisdiction. So far as I have information, the Craft has been working harmoniously, and fulfilling, to the best of their ability, the duties of Royal Arch Masons. In many portions of the state, Chapters have been unable to meet and work, owing to the unsettled condition of public affairs; but we have reason

to hope that, ere long, encouraging reports will be received from zealous Companions laboring among the ruins. * * * *''

"And now, my Companions, we have passed through a severe ordeal of Civil War and disorganized society; and Royal Arch Masonry, I am proud to say, though it has not advanced much in this state, has stood firm, resolute and unshaken. Its bond of faith has been held inviolate, and its sacred places have been respected. In many sections of the jurisdictions the Brotherhood has been sorely tried; and we have abundant cause to thank the Grand High Priest over all that He hath kept us so well together in the midst of discord and calamity."

"The Spirit of Peace which now 'sits' brooding, with 'dove-like wings outspread' is in harmony with the interests of Masonry everywhere; and none will hail the consummation of her happy mission with truer gratitude of joy than the Royal Arch Masons of Missouri."

The Committee on Grand High Priest's address approved the remarks of the Grand High Priest concerning the establishment of military or field Chapters and a resolution was adopted, which read:

"That persons professing to have been made Royal Arch Masons in these Field or Military Chapters should not be recognized as such by regular Companions of this jurisdiction and that citizens of Missouri so made should be treated as clandestine-made Masons and dealt with accordingly."

Times were extremely difficult for most Masonic bodies, especially in the south, during and following the War.

"Foe met foe in mortal combat, but foes were turned to Brothers as soon as they met as Masons; and our Companion, we feel assured, from good authority, had he been in danger at any time of losing his digestive organs through the thrust of a rebel bayonet, would have been the first to give Masonic recognition would have saved the unwinding of his 'mortal coil.'"

Strangely, the War had little effect on the number of exaltations or the total membership of the Grand Chapter: In 1860, we entered the War with 882 members. Included were 138 exaltations. In 1861, there were only 62 exaltations and our totals dropped to 717. Thirty-five were exalted in 1862. In 1863, there were 107, in 1864, we exalted 98. In 1865, the exaltations numbered 174 with a total of 834 members and in 1866, at the War's end, 188 were exalted, 32 were admitted, 102 dimitted, 18 had died, 10 were expelled for a total of 1,024 members. Two Chapters did not report in 1866.

Leadership

We have no knowledge of local leadership during the War years but the Grand Chapter had competent leaders at the helm during that time frame. William R. Penick was born in 1829 in Boone County, Missouri. He was made a Master Mason in St. Joseph Lodge No. 78 in 1856. He was made Master two years later and in 1861 was elected Grand Master of Missouri Grand Lodge. He joined St. Joseph Chapter No. 14 and became High Priest in 1860, and Grand High Priest in 1861. In 1877, he was Grand Master of the Grand Council, being a charter member of St. Joseph Council No. 9. At the time he was Grand High Priest, he was also Grand Commander, having aided in the organization of St. Joseph Commandery No. 4 in 1859. He was a 32 degree Scottish Rite Mason and at the time of his death in 1891 was the oldest Past Grand High Priest in point of service. He had been a Mayor of St. Joseph. Most of his life was spent in the drug and

book business. He became President of the St. Joseph and Denver Railroad Company and it was through his influence that the work of completing the line was resumed after the War.

James Carr became Grand High Priest in 1862. He was born in Pennsylvania and came to Monroe County, Missouri in 1845. He taught school, studied law, and became General Attorney for the Hannibal and St. Joseph Railway Company. He moved to Hannibal and then to St. Louis where he died on Christmas Day 1891. He had been Commander of Excalibar Commandery No. 5 in 1871 and Grand Generalissimo in 1869 and 1870.

James N. Burnes was born in Indiana, August 22, 1827, moved to Missouri in 1837. He received his law degree from Harvard in 1853, practiced law for twenty years, was Circuit Attorney in 1856, and Judge of the Common Pleas Court from 1868 to 1872. He was a Presidential Elector in 1856 and was elected to Congress for four terms where he held prominent positions on leading committees in the House of Representatives. He presided over the Lodge, Chapter, Council, and Commandery in Weston, Missouri. After his removal to St. Joseph in 1875, he was Commander of St. Joseph Commandery No. 4 and later became a charter member of Hugh de Payens Commandery No. 51. He was elected Grand High Priest in May 1863, Grand Master of the Grand Council in 1877, and Grand Generalissimo of the Grand Commandery in that same year. As a public citizen, he was the main promoter of the Atchison Bridge, the Rock Island-Leavenworth Bridge, the National Bank of St. Joseph, and the St. Joseph Water Works. He had a national reputation because of his mental faculties, his indomitable will, and charitable disposition. His public life was one of strict integrity. His death occurred suddenly at Washington, D.C., January 24, 1889.

James A. H. Lampton was born in Columbia, Kentucky, February 21, 1824, and died in St. Louis, February 3, 1879. He came to Ralls County, Missouri as a boy and settled there. By profession, he was a physician but early in life, he abandoned this profession for vocations that were more congenial to his inclinations. He was a cultured gentleman of large experience, and the brethren of the Masonic fraternity knew and appreciated his qualities. He was a perfect ritualist, a pleasing worker, and ready to do what he might be assigned him. He was made a Mason in New London Lodge No. 21. He affiliated with George Washington Lodge No. 9, June 23, 1857, serving as Master in 1865, 1867, and 1871. He became a member of St. Louis Chapter No. 8, St. Louis Commandery No. 1 and Hiram Council No. 1, serving his Chapter as High Priest and in 1863 began his career in the Grand Chapter as Grand Scribe and served as Grand High Priest in 1864. In the Grand Lodge, he served on numerous committees with zeal and fidelity and in 1869-71 filled the position as Grand Lecturer of the Grand Lodge.

Thomas Elwood Garrett was a native of Chester County, Pennsylvania. In 1851 at the age of 23, he came to St. Louis and entered newspaper work as a dramatic critic. He died June 29, 1905.

His Lodge membership was in Pride of the West Lodge No. 179, which he joined in 1861; he served as Grand Master of Missouri in 1870 and in 1871. He dimitted from Missouri Chapter No. 1 and affiliated with St. Louis Chapter No. 8. He was elected Grand High Priest in 1865, and three years later was President of the Grand Convention of High Priests. For three terms, he was Master of Hiram Council No. 1, and in 1867 became Grand Master. He was also a member of St. Louis Commandery No. 1 and a 33rd degree Scottish Rite Mason. Companion Garrett was a rare literary genius; his activity as a writer on the "Intelligencer," "Evening News," and "Republic" and as a

dramatic critic was only the forerunner for the distinguished service which he gave the fraternity in Missouri. He was the organizer of the first Elk Lodge in Missouri and is said to have been largely responsible for the arrangement of the present funeral service used by the Grand Lodge of Missouri. For many years, he was the oldest living Past Grand High Priest; he was a member of the Masonic Conservators, an organization for the control of the Masonic ritual.

Samuel Russell was born in the historic Shenandoah Valley, Virginia, February 1814. He was an orphan at the age of ten years and his early life was spent in Louisiana and Mississippi where he learned the tailor's trade. In 1849, he sailed for California on a sailing vessel and after a long and perilous voyage around Cape Horn; he arrived in the land of gold. He returned and settled in Vicksburg, Mississippi where he engaged in merchandising; in 1855, he came to St. Joseph, Missouri, where he sold lumber. In 1861, he was in Denver and later in Montana. He was President of the Constitutional Convention of Montana in 1868. He returned to St. Joseph and engaged in the grain business and on December 7, 1874, he died. He was the first Master of Zeredatha Lodge No. 189, and served the Grand Lodge as District Deputy Grand Lecturer and District Deputy Grand Master until the time of his death. He was High Priest of St. Joseph Chapter No. 14 and became Grand High Priest in 1866. He became a member of St. Joseph Council No. 9 and later affiliated with a Montana Council. In 1862, he became Commander of Hugh de Payens Commandery No. 4 in St. Joseph and held the position for three years. In 1869, he served as Grand Captain General of the Grand Commandery of Missouri. He is buried in Mt. Mora Cemetery in St. Joseph.

STATE OF THE CRAFT

Companions, I am a firm believer that Masonry will be here for a very long time. We need to remember that we are good men who want to become better, and in becoming better, we will attract others of a similar nature. I believe the good Masons of the state of Missouri will continue to practice our Masonic art and pass it on to the next generation. I will be honored to work with these companions to this end. Companions, let us not forget that "change is the universal law" and we need to be on the front edge of this change so that we are ready to accept the changes that will benefit the craft for the next wave of Masons. I have seen some of the best Masons of the state during my travels and I believe that this core of individuals will continue the Masonic ideals forward to the next generation. We have many members but how many truly Masonic members do we have? Masonry is one man serving his fellow creatures, not someone who is looking to receive honor and glory for doing something. Masonry is best practiced in secret; and letting God who sees in secret reward us in His good time. My philosophy through the years has been "If you are doing this for the rewards and honors then you better get out; because there are not enough rewards and honors to satisfy a self serving individual." Companions let us strive to be of service to others instead of ourselves. "He that would be greatest among you let him be as the younger and he that is chief as he that doth serve." Based on previous ledgers, general fund receipts and expenditures are being projected on a monthly basis, so as to keep investments at the highest practical level for the longest practical time frame.

REPORTS OF GRAND RECORDER

SUMMARY

To the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of Missouri:

Companions, the membership records are getting closer to those reported by Council Recorders. Our records differ from recorders by about 125. Many recorders are still not providing us with accurate membership records—meaning that they do not have them themselves. Joyce is working with them each and every day to try to get these numbers together. It is extremely important that recorders keep accurate records of their membership to include full names, addresses, phone numbers, degree dates (all of them, not just the Select Master, and they need to keep track of who has/has not received the Super Excellent Master Degree), and keep up with suspensions and reinstatements, dimits, etc. It is also extremely important that they report any changes in their membership as soon as it happens, not just during the annual return. We have about half of the recorders that keep us up to date with that information and we thank them for their hard work.

There is a situation with the membership database hired to be developed for the Grand York Rite. The vendor hired has refused to provide us with the application developed, work with us to move the membership records over, and has gone out of business. Legal action is taking place at this time.

At the time of this communication, we are still waiting on annual returns from Westport No. 38 and El Camino No. 52. The Recorder of Westport has had health problems and was given an extension.

Seven annual reports were late this year, the last being received on April 27. The continued tardiness of these reports makes it impossible for us to provide the membership numbers needed to develop budgets and long-range goals for the Grand Council. Council Illustrious Masters, Regional Deputy Grand Masters, and the Grand Officers are now being informed of these delinquencies.

Liberty Council No. 50 has still refused to pay late fees for 2000, 2001, and 2002. All other Councils are working with this office to complete their annual return fees.

The reports on council audits and bonds can be found in the tabular statements of councils. Annual audits are good for the most part, but some chapters simply refuse to complete the annual audit. Council reports still identify that monies of the councils are not deposited in accounts with at least two signatures.

General information about the York Rite and the publication of the proceedings can be found in the Report of the Grand Secretary of the Grand Chapter.

Joyce and I thank the Grand Master, and all the grand officers and members of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of Missouri for a most enjoyable and productive year. It has been a distinct pleasure to work with MIC Phillips. We also thank Teddie Harrison for his continued support of this office in his donation of paper; and a very special word of thanks goes to Paul Cannon who has so graciously given of his time and money to volunteer in the office and assist with a great many things in the day to day operations of the Grand York Rite. We thank all those who volunteer their time to help with the Grand York Rite Session—we could not do it without them. We all look forward to working with each and every one in the future.

Proposed Legislation Laid Over from 2003

To the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of Missouri:

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: *Article IV Grand Secretary, Section 20 part 4*, retirement plan, be repealed in its entirety.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: To save the Grand Council money and convert the money from the present retirement fund to the general fund and be used to prevent future per capita increase. The Secretary's job is a supplemental job, not a job from which he can retire.

Proposed Amendment Ruled Out of Order, May 13, 2004

Proposed Legislation to Laid Over from 2003

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: *Article XVI, Life Membership, Section 135*, of the by-laws of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of Missouri, be amended as follows:

1. By striking paragraph 2 and inserting a new paragraph.

Paragraph 2 currently states: Any member may purchase a life membership using the following method of computing the fee. Divide his council dues by 5% which will be the cost of a life membership if purchased between January 1 and June 30, if purchased after June 30, add one year's dues.

New paragraph 2 would state: Any member may purchase a life membership by computing the fee as 20 times the member's Council dues at time of purchase of said life membership, provided that no life membership fee shall be less than \$300.00.

2. By striking paragraph 12 and inserting a new paragraph.

Paragraph 12 currently states: The Grand Recorder shall annually remit to the recorders of participating constituent Councils their prorated portion of the earnings of the Life Membership Fund. The per capita tax charged to a Council on one of its member's participation in the Life Membership Program shall be that as existed at the time the individual entered the Life Membership Program. It will be the responsibility of the Constituent Council to pay the per capita tax for each Life Member. When a Life Member dies, his council will continue to receive his prorated earnings, less 10% which will be added to the Funds principal to provide for growth in the Fund.

New paragraph 12 would state: The Grand Recorder shall annually remit to the recorders of participating constituent Councils their prorated portion of the earnings of the Life Membership Fund minus per capita. This is provided that no earnings shall be distributed on any Life Membership until January 1 of the second (2nd) calendar year after such fee, paid in full, is deposited with the Grand Recorder. When a Life Member dies, the Grand Council will continue to receive his per capita, less 20% and his council will continue to receive his prorated earnings, less 20%. The retained 20% will be added to the Funds principal to provide for growth in the Fund. Prorated earnings shall be

based on the members' council dues that existed at the time the individual entered the Life Membership Program. Per capita shall be the per capita that existed at the time the individual entered the Life Membership Program.

3. By deleting paragraph 15 in its entirety.

Paragraph 15 currently states: The Governing Body of the Life Membership Program shall be empowered to establish a minimum fee for life membership. However, no minimum fee shall be less then \$125.00. The fees shall be reviewed annually by the governing body of the Life Membership Program and a report made to the Annual Assembly. If found necessary to change the fee, it will be proposed in writing and submitted in accordance with Article XV: Amendments.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: It is our understanding that the purpose of having a member pay an additional year's dues, who purchased a Life Membership after June 30, was due to the fact that the Grand Council could not generate a return on that Life Membership in less than six months time. Therefore, the additional year's dues should not have been part of the endowment, but used as a part of the earnings for distribution for that year. However, due to the wording of the existing by-law, the additional year's dues were deposited as part of the principal of the fund. This has not been all bad as it has allowed the fund to grow, but in turn has caused unnecessary paperwork, confusion and concern with many Recorders of the constituent Councils.

Currently, the fund must achieve annual earnings in excess of 5%, in order to provide for a 100% distribution. By establishing a minimum of one (1) year for the earnings from any new Life Membership investment (participant), it allows that investment to have earnings for at least a full year.

The principal of the fund must grow, in order to provide for greater earnings. The return of 20% of a deceased members earnings to the principal of the fund will allow the fund to grow, without greatly hampering the Grand Council and constituent Councils. It is not in the best interest of the Council Recorders and the Grand Recorder's office to require Councils to pay per capita on their Life Members and then receive a return from the Grand Council of that per capita. The Grand Council can simply transfer its share (per capita on Life Members) to the General Fund and return the remainder of the earnings of that fund to the Councils, saving much time in the transfer of paperwork and money. Stated simply, the Councils should not be required to pay per capita on their Life Members; that is the designated purpose of the Life Membership Fund from a Grand Council perspective.

The necessary items in paragraph 15 are adequately covered elsewhere in this section and need not be duplicated.

By establishing an increased minimum participation fee, doing away with the additional year's dues, and eliminating unnecessary paperwork, the fund can grow, be less confusing for the Councils, and ease the management of the fund by the Grand Council.

Trabue, PIM, Ezra Council No. 32 With respect to the proposal as to Paragraph 2 in Section 135 the Jurisprudence Committee recognizes the potential questions in the event that a member holds dual or plural memberships involving two or more Missouri Councils or perhaps one Missouri Council and a Council in another State. In order to avoid unnecessary controversy in any such situation the Jurisprudence Committee recommends that the dues of the member's "original" Council should be used in computing the life membership fee. Thus, in the interest of clarity the Jurisprudence Committee offers a substitute proposal the following language:

Substitute Motion for New Paragraph 2: Any member may purchase a life membership by computing the fee as 20 times the member's Council dues at the time of purchase of said life membership, provided that if a member shall hold Dual or Plural membership and if his "original" membership is under the Grand Council of Missouri, the dues of that Council shall be applicable in computing the amount of the life membership fee, and provided further that no life membership fee shall be less than \$300.00. For the purposes of this paragraph, no membership dues assessed by a subordinate council under the jurisdiction of any other Grand Council shall be considered.

Substitute Motion for New Paragraph 2 Passed, May 13, 2004

With respect to the proposed amendment of Paragraph 12 of Section 135 of Article XVI, it is the judgment of the Jurisprudence Committee that as to any existing life membership the proposal violates the basic fiduciary standards in that it would substantially change the handling of life membership funds following the death of a life member. To put it another way, the proposal would violate basic rules in advertising. Furthermore, even if the proposal was to be considered only for the purpose of applying its provisions to future life memberships it is the judgment of the Jurisprudence Committee that the proposal is not consistent with other existing by laws. For example, it introduces a new concept in that it refers to per capita after death. Among other provisions affected by it would be Paragraph 21 (3), which refers to a per capita tax applicable to all members on the rolls of the Council as of December 31 of each year. The latter clause refers to living members.

Presumably, the proposed change of Paragraph 12 would require Recorders to keep two sets of books, one for living members, and one for dead members.

In short, it is the judgment of the Jurisprudence Committee that the said proposal not only substantially modifies the handling of funds derived from existing life memberships but also it would be inconsistent with existing by laws if the proposal was adopted to apply to future life memberships. Accordingly, it is the judgment of the Jurisprudence Committee that the said proposal is out of order and is not in condition to be considered by this Grand Council.

Proposed Amendment with regard to Paragraph 12 Ruled Out of Order, May 13, 2004

With respect to the proposed deletion of Paragraph 15, if the proposed amendment providing for Paragraph 2 of Section 135 is adopted, the Jurisprudence Committee has no objection to the deletion of Paragraph 15.

Proposed Amendment with regard to Paragraph 15 Passed, May 13, 2004

Proposed Legislation

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: *Section 132 of Article XV* be deleted and a new *Section 132* be added.

SECTION 132 CURRENTLY READS: *Amendments, Procedure.* Any additional section not conflicting with these By-Laws, or any proposition to repeal or alter any of the foregoing By-Laws, shall be presented in writing at an Annual Assembly, and, if adopted by a two-thirds vote, shall become a part of these By-Laws.

NEW SECTION 132 WOULD READ: *Amendments, Procedure.* Any additional section not conflicting with these by-laws, or any proposition to repeal or alter any of the foregoing by-laws, shall be presented in writing and submitted to the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee and Grand Recorder not later than 30 days prior to the Grand Assembly at which it is to be proposed, and, if adopted by a majority vote, shall become part of these by-laws. Any proposal not meeting this timely submission shall be read at the Annual Assembly and lay over to the next Annual Assembly.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: As was outlined last year in the Grand Chapter and Grand Commandery, it is in appropriate that the Jurisprudence Committee should be expected to review and prepare legislation coming before a Grand Assembly when its first knowledge of its existence is on the very day it is to be proposed. The Jurisprudence Committee must have time to review and analyze the content of a proposal to assure accuracy, proper format, and to assure the Grand Council line officers that it does not conflict with existing by-laws. Finally, any proposal meeting the new guidelines may be adopted by a majority vote.

(8) Investments. The Grand Treasurer, Grand Recorder, and Chairman of the Committee on Finance are authorized, for and in behalf of this Grand Council, and in the name of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of Missouri, to invest any surplus funds of the Grand Council in an amount not less than one-half of all investments in obligations of the United States, or in the securities or accounts fully insured or guaranteed by the United States or an agency of the United States, except for those received by gift or bequest which may be retained in kind. The remainder may be invested in common stock or equal securities in nationally known corporations traded on the New York Stock Exchange, and rated "A": or better by Standard and Poore's or Moody's or by some equally well recognized investment rating service.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: In order that we may be able to earn more interest income and be therefore able to reduce the need for future per capita increases.

IF ADOPTED, THIS SECTION WOULD READ: The Masters, Deputy Masters, Principal Conductors of the Work, Recorders, for the time being, of subordinate councils in its jurisdiction, and of all Past Masters of such subordinates, so long as they remain members of Councils, in this jurisdiction; provided that a Past Master of another jurisdiction, who shall have affiliated with a Council under the jurisdiction of this Grand Council may become a member of the Grand Council by a majority vote at any Annual Assembly.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: The office of Recorder is an integral part of each subordinate Council and at times the only representative at the Annual Assembly. This very important officer is not currently entitled to vote unless he is a Past Master of a subordinate Council. Some Recorders are NOT Past Masters even though they maintain the most significant responsibilities of the Council; that officer should be entitled to vote as such.

To the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of Missouri:

Companions, it has been quite some time since a report was filed by this committee. Missouri York Rite has definitely moved into the electronic communications age with the advent of email and the World Wide Web. I understand that the new terminology for

"w.w.w" is now "dubba, dubba, dubba" in an effort to even shorten the pronunciation of letter "w". When, one thinks, will it ever end?

The ever increasing proliferation of technology causes me wonder how, less than 100 years ago (and some of you in the room well remember,) people dealt with the changing technology; what it was like when the first car rolled down the street, when the gas lights were changed to electric, when tape and ferrite core memory and shift registers changed into these little black boxes setting on almost 65% of desks in U.S. homes. Yes, that was a heck of a jump, but I was not around when you still hitched your horse to the courthouse post.

The Grand York Rite of Missouri also jumped on the web and as many as 6 or 7 years ago and starting using email. The grand officers, committee members, and more importantly the jurisprudence committee knows the value of these instant communications. It is nice to be able to get a request for information, forward it to the appropriate knowledge base, and get a response back to the individual in question in a matter of minutes. It also helps to serve as a time-line of activities when filed accordingly.

The only draw back to all this technology is that we may be loosing our ability to interact with people in groups—it is much easier to write, even words that hurt, and push the send button before we think. Even though I love all this technology, it is important for us to sometimes pick up the phone and call someone, or write a letter by hand, (even though I cannot even read my own writing these days.)

Technology can never replace the companionship and relationships we have with each other in our meetings. Each has its proper sphere and each should be respected.

In the last few years, we have made available on our web site all of the most used forms and documents needed in the day-to-day activities of the Chapters, Councils, and Commanderies. Many of our Secretaries and Recorders, and even the membership, use these forms regularly. You do not have to wait for the forms to be distributed the old-fashioned way. Although not everyone has access, someone in your organization surely does and can be tasked to help with the retrieval of those documents.

There has been much discussed with the evolution of the annual return. Before we go there, some serious thought needs to be given as to what is needed, how soon it is needed, and how it can be accomplished. About 90% of this year's committee reports have been distributed via email. There are still problems with software applications and some of our user's ability to type. However, we have made progress in spite of ourselves.

I am looking forward to the rollout of the new web site by our web master Aaron Shoemaker. Although his report is not available, I can assure you that the Grand York Rite of Missouri will be proud of the completion of this long awaited project. Companion Shoemaker and his colleagues are about to deliver a service that would have cost a private company thousands of dollars, if not over twenty thousand. In order to do things right, they must be tried and proven; please give us the time to make this one right, it will be with us for a long time.

Finally, if anyone has suggestions for things that need to be available in our on-line document library or in the automation of documents, please share your thoughts with us.

Biographical

THOMAS CHESTER YUNICK

Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri 2003-2004

Thomas Chester Yunick was born, Chester Thomas Vanhorn in Plattsmouth, Nebraska, 11 November 1941 to Lt. Eugene Stanley Van Horn (US Army) and Mary Katherine (Reeves) Van Horn. Thomas has been active in community service serving on the Putnam County Extension Council, the Putnam County Ambulance Board of Directors as a member and the Chairperson, the Elm Township Volunteer Fire Department as a member and the Assistant Fire Chief for twenty years, as a member and Chairperson of the University of Missouri Master Gardener State Advisory Board for six years and for the past ten years has been an instructor in the Missouri Hunter Education Program.

Thomas is owner of "Tom's Tire and Tube" (A retail tire store), of "Heartland Waterscapes" in Kirksville, Missouri, and of Dewberry Hill farm (175 acres) where visitors find an ever-changing cornucopia of row crops, meadows, woodlands, fishing ponds, horses, cattle, a greenhouse, plant nursery, iris gardens, vegetable gardens and various other activities including the occasional production of sorghum molasses and maple syrup.

The "At Large" asylum drill team has been authorized. Selected Sir Knights in positions of trust and responsibility were authorized to wear a distinctive shoulder cord. In particular, the red shoulder cord of the Regional Grand Commander has received a positive and widespread reception. Additionally, the Line Officers have adopted, worn, and presented a distinctive and uniform appearance at functions where the full Commandery uniform or other formal dress is not required.

The presence of Missouri Knights Templar has been seen throughout the state on a continuing basis. The year was distinguished by our presence as an honor guard at the cornerstone ceremony and dedication of the new Masonic Home of Missouri in Columbia. You have opened your homes, your hearts, and your arms with generosity and loving sincerity. You have made this Commandery Year a memorable experience that

will be savored in our memories until we cross to that distant shore. We thank you and ask for your kind remembrances.

With each passing of a Sir Knight, we have lost their physical presence. Yet, in their years of service to Templary, they have left a rich tapestry of accomplishments that are now woven into tomorrow's destiny. We walk into tomorrow with the lessons we have learned at their sides, wisdom of their advice, and the memories in the pleasure of their company. May we ever honor and remember them; may the sounds of their names make our heart to smile. Please join with Sir Knight Lewis C. Odneal, our Eminent Grand Prelate as he delivers the necrology service in honor of the valiant and magnanimous Sir Knights that have pasted on to that distant shore.

CHARITIES

Your continued support is requested for the Holy Land Pilgrimage and the Holy Land Pilgrimage Endowment Fund. Missouri did not send a minister to the Holy Land this year as Grand Encampment did not sponsor a trip. Please continue to support these funds and build them to the point that Missouri can send two ministers each year, when

the sponsorship is resumed. Your sponsorship helps to build Templar membership, spread the message of Christianity, and the Eternal Salvation of the Soul provided through a belief in Jesus Christ.

One of our own, Grand Prelate Lewis C. Odneal did travel to the Holy Land this spring. There was considerable discussion on the subject of Missouri Grand Commandery financial assistance. It was determined that because the possibility of an incident could occur, Missouri Templary possessed no insurance to cover the legal costs and payment of any financial determination that might be ruled on by the Courts, because of our sponsorship. Missouri Grand Commandery should determine the procedure that would allow sponsorship of a minister to the Holy Land on an annual basis with the approval of the Sir Knights at Missouri's Grand Session, in the absence of Grand Encampment sponsorship. There are several other organizations that continually sponsor group tours to the Holy Land.

Please remember that the sponsored minister in not required to be a Knight Templar. This provision allows the Templar Christian message to reach others that may not know what we stand for, and may encourage them to join our numbers, or in the least look upon the Missouri Knight Templar with a favorable opinion.

The Missouri Knights Templar Eye Foundation Committee Fund is much less than it should be. Missouri has for several years received Eye Foundation assistance generously in excess, of what we donate. If it was not for the \$3000.00 in interest accrued from Missouri's Eye Foundation Endowment Fund being added to the campaign, it would be an absolute embarrassment to Missouri Templar.

It should also be noted that the Audit Committee reports that no financial statement has been submitted from either of the chairmen of these committees.

While every penny you donate is appreciated, continued support is vitally necessary in the treatment of Eye Disorders and the funding of research. As is usually the case, the few support the many. Some of the most generous contributions come from the smaller Commanderies who take the time and effort to have fund raising events and spread the Templar Light. Please remember, what a wonderful gift sight is and open your hearts and pockets to aid those in need. The Eye Foundation is the primary charity of Missouri Knights Templar.

CONDITION OF THE ORDER

A review of the past ten years "Condition of The Order" or "The State of Templar in Missouri" leaves an impression that we are stuck in a time lock.

From 1993 — "Although we have Commanderies around the state which are struggling, we also have Commanderies that are thriving." "In the case of the struggling Commandery, it is but one or two hardworking and dedicated Sir Knights that are holding the Commandery together." "In the case of the thriving Commandery, most all of the active Sir Knights are working as a team to get things done and because of that effort, no one is overburdened."

From 1994 — "There are areas where Templary is strong, leadership is forceful and effective, and Templary is on the move. But on the other hand, there are areas where Templary is lacking and Templary is on the wane." "There are areas in the state where Templary is a non uniformed body with no ritual." "Many Commanderies had more and more Sir Knights in office who were without uniforms." "Some of our Commanderies frequently do not have a quorum and a few almost never do."

From 1995 — "Our order is suffering from a lack of positive, motivated, and understanding leadership." "We have serious problems with loss of membership and low attendance. Our largest membership losses are deaths and suspensions. We must pass off on death as that item for which we have very little control. For some reason we also seem to pass off suspensions in a like manner. We talk membership, but generally do little except talk."

From 2000 — "There are ... Commanderies in the state that are not meeting on a regular basis. In some instances, members are still interested, but they cannot open their own Commandery." "One Commandery says that they cannot do the work, so they send them through the Scottish Rite. Not once have they asked for help." "Grand Officers, when elected, you have an obligation to the Grand Commandery."

From 2001 — "There are many areas where our craft has suffered from long neglect." "Templary is strongest where the Commanderies still meet in uniform and work at formal openings and closings. This was mostly in the major metropolitan areas." "I have encouraged every Commandery to try to put a drill team together. Not because the drill is all-important but because it pulls the members together for a common cause and creates camaraderie within their ranks. It also gives younger members a reason to be in their Commandery. Without reason to be there and without cause to be involved and friendship to bring them back, very few will trade their other diversions for what we have to offer. Obviously the answer is to recruit younger members, but the solution requires precisely what we don't have, younger members."

From 2003 — "The condition of our order is not good." "We are close to the point where entire regions cannot confer the order. Many of our Commanderies are also dangerously close to a point where they will be unable to field a quorum a sufficient number of times during the year to comply with our bylaws."

Sir Knights, the past is still the reality of today's condition of the order. Yet, there is indeed cause for optimism. While our ranks have diminished because of deaths and suspensions, we are taking in new and younger Sir Knights. There are numerous Sir Knights still active that are providing the leadership, training and mentoring of these new members. Those of us left have an obligation to replace ourselves in the ranks and to insure the financial stability of our Commanderies. We have sold the York Rite too cheaply over the years and neglected, in many cases, our ritual equipment, and the buildings where we meet. Each of you is dedicated to the cause of York Rite Masonry and to the constituent and Grand Commandery of Missouri. Your presence here today is a statement to that fact. The future of Missouri's Commanderies rests in your hands. No one of you can do all the work needed alone. It requires a team effort of work and use of our accumulated years of wisdom. It requires a proactive leadership in the constituent Commanderies. It requires forward-looking changes in financial planning. It requires a flexible, long-range plan that sets realistic goals for the future. It requires a committed, involved, informed, active, progressive, responsible, and caring line of Grand Commandery Officers. It requires future Grand Line Officers to work together as a team toward a common goal, other than that of becoming a Past Grand Commanders.

Sir Knights of Missouri, you have a lot to be proud of. In every cloud, there is a silver lining. Your numbers provide members to the related Masonic Bodies. Your numbers are still larger than many other states. Your Grand Sessions are conducted in a professional manner that are the envy of and the recipient of numerous compliments from Grand Encampment Officers and members of other state Grand Commanderies. You have a Grand Secretary/Recorder which is second to none. You are privileged to

continue to have printed proceedings in a book form rather than the copy-machine version of several states. You have a responsible Grand Treasurer who provides accountability and financial service far and beyond the enumeration received. Most of all, you have the love of Knights Templar in your heart and soul. Join hands and hearts. Lay aside old grudges. Be for something, instead of against everything. Some changes in the old way of doing business will have to come about if we are to grow in membership or perhaps even survive as a fraternal organization.

GENERAL ORDERS

General Order No. 1, Effective during the 2003-2004 Missouri Templar Year

It is my order that all Missouri Regional Grand Commanders are authorized and required to wear a red shoulder cord on the left shoulder of the Missouri Commandery uniform during the 2003-2004 Missouri Templar year.

It is further ordered that the Aide-de-Camp be authorized and required to wear a silver shoulder cord on the left shoulder of the Missouri Commandery uniform during the 2003-2004 Missouri Templar year.

It is further ordered that the Guards be authorized and required to wear a white shoulder cord on the left shoulder of the Missouri Commandery uniform during the 2003-2004 Missouri Templar year.

General Order No. 2, Effective during the 2003-2004 Missouri Templar Year

It is my order that there be posted in each constituent Commandery:

- 1. A listing of the current line officers of the constituent Commandery, elected and appointed to include telephone number, email address, and mailing address
- 2. The date of election and appointment of the constituent Commandery
- 3. The date the officers of the constituent Commandery were installed
- 4. The name of the Regional Grand Commander including telephone number, email address, and mailing address
- 5. The name of the Grand Commandery line officer appointed to serve the constituent Commandery area including telephone number, email address, and mailing address

General Order No. 3

It is therefore my order that the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America be given prior to the opening of a Commandery of Knights Templar. The

I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

General Order No. 4

Whereas the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri authorizes the opening of a Commandery using the Full Form Opening and the Short Form Opening.

It is my order that Commanderies, having requested in writing from the Grand Commander and received in writing individual authorization, may open their Commandery without swords or uniforms.

This General Order No. 4 will expire at the completion of the term of office of the current Grand Commander.

General Order No. 5

Whereas the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri has customarily conducted Commandery Drill Competition on the day of the Grand Commandery Conclave, and

Whereas the expanding time constraints of the drill competition has affected the conduct of other activities held on that day,

It is my order that the Class "B", Class "C", and Class "At-Large" drill competition will be held on April 17, 2004 in the city of Columbia. The Class "A" drill competition will be held on the day of the Grand Commandery Conclave, May 15, 2004, in Jefferson City, Missouri.

This General Order No. 5 will expire at the completion of the term of office of the current Grand Commander.

General Order No. 6

It is my order that all contributions to Missouri Grand Commandery charities and charitable activities will be forwarded to the Grand Recorder. The Grand Recorder will record the contributions and (1) forward to the Grand Treasurer for deposit in said charity account, or (2) forward to the appropriate committee chairman for follow-up action.

General Order No. 7

It is my order that the following Missouri Knights Templar act as an Independent Audit Committee, responsible for the audit of the financial transactions and accounting methodology for the 2003-2004 Grand Commandery Year:

Each Independent Audit Committee member shall be entitled to a maximum of \$200.00 for documented and related expenses to include mileage @ \$0.20 per mile, lodging, and meals related to or in the performance of the Audit Committee duties.

Said committee shall be provided complete and unrestricted access to the financial records of the Grand Commandery from both the Grand Treasurer and Grand Recorder. Any fees involved in obtaining records will be provided for by the Grand Commandery through the Grand Recorder by warrant to the Grand Treasurer.

Said committee shall, upon completion of the audit, submit a finding, oral or written, to the Grand Commander.

Said audit shall be concluded at or as close as possible to the conclusion of the 2004 Grand Conclave, not to exceed 90 days.

Said committee shall submit by personal representation and written report their findings and recommendations at the 2004-2005 Grand Conclave.

General Order No. 8

It is my order that, on or before October 31, 2004, Maryville Commandery No. 40, Coeur de Leon Commandery No. 14, and Boanerges Commandery No. 34 take one of the following actions to avoid the arrest of their individual charters and subsequent loss of membership:

Missouri's Grand Line Leadership was represented by several Past Grand Commanders, the Grand Commander, the Grand Sentinel, the Grand Recorder and two of the three required dais officers.

I attended the DeMolay State Conclave, the Job's Daughters Grand Session, and the State Assembly of the Missouri Rainbow for Girls. At each of these assemblies a framed certificate and a medal signifying the honor was presented to the outstanding young man or lady. Additionally, I was privileged to present each organization a check for \$500.00 from the Grand Commandery of Missouri. The full-dress Commandery uniform, the awards, and monetary presentation were well received.

The quality of leadership, enthusiasm, and dedication of the youth of Missouri were inspiring. I came away from each deeply and emotionally impressed. The support of

Missouri's Sir Knights and their ladies is deeply appreciated by the youth and your continued support is vitally necessary. Thank you, to each of you, for the uncounted hours of love, time, and financial support that you give the youth of our MISSOURI MASONIC FAMILY. Your efforts are a labor of true love and your reward is the knowledge that you have been one of the keys that has unlocked the talents and abilities of the youth who will be tomorrow's leaders. You have earned the right to walk proudly into your tomorrows.

VISITATIONS

During the years in line, as an advancing line officer, I visited the majority of Missouri Commanderies. For the Commandery year 2003-2004, individual visits were made on an invitational basis. Each was an enjoyable experience, an opportunity to meet and fellowship with old friends and Missouri's Sir Knights. A particularly noteworthy and enjoyable visit was had with the Knights and ladies at the Commandery Table Lodge sponsored in Liberty by Commandery No. 6.

With the exception of Springfield, I attended all Regional York Rite Conferences. Attendance at the conferences was generally considerably less than it should have been. At one conference, I asked the Sir Knights that were not Past Grand Officers, Grand Officers currently serving on a committee or in an appointed position, to stand up. Three Sir Knights out of approximately thirty stood.

The Regional Conferences may be preaching to the choir, but at the least, they are a method of disseminating information to those who are voices of respect and authority in their areas, did not attend the Grand Session, do not have access to a computer or may have overlooked the information in the Knight Templar monthly "Missouri Section".

I represented Missouri Templary at the annual Grand Lodge session of the Grand Lodge of Missouri and the breakfast in St. Louis given to honor Most Worshipful Stanley M. Thompson. Additionally, I attended the Grand Lodge of Missouri Area Meetings where our Commandery presence was received with the Grand Honors. The Grand Lodge of Missouri has taken bold and progressive measures to unify support and build membership in all Missouri Masonic Bodies. They have opened the Blue Lodge doors to aid in our membership retention and recruitment May we use the opportunity to bring new members into our York Rite fraternity

Out-of-state visits included the Grand Commandery of Arkansas, the Grand Commandery of Illinois, the Grand Encampment Easter Sunrise service in Washington D.C., and the South Central Department Conference. (A complete listing of visits is on file with the Grand Recorder and will not be listed herein.)

RECOMMENDATIONS

A review of the past several years' recommendations leaves me with the feeling that we are not going anywhere very fast. During this Commandery year, a few of the past recommendations have been implemented but we still are sadly lacking in a long-term plan to do much of anything. It is difficult to always maintain a positive tone and put a smile on everything. The facts are, I could have and should have done more in the Line Officer years. A lot more could be accomplished with the commitment of Officers, elected, and appointed. A smile and a positive attitude are always important. If one has had a crippling-to-fatal disease that is treatable and chooses to ignore it, the

smiles and positive attitude with no action would end in an untimely and unnecessary death. It is time that we come together in a positive manner and attempt to map out the future. We are a volunteer organization and no one likes to be told what to do. That aside, we are also committed to the causes of Fraternal York Rite and Christian Masonry. Progress requires time, money, commitment, vision, and leadership. The recommendations listed below are but a portion of my original list. There remain many good, reasonable, and obtainable recommendations in the past ten-plus years' proceedings. No one can do it all. We each can do a little. Together, we can accomplish the seemingly impossible.

- That the Grand Officers show a larger degree of interest in the activities of the Grand Commandery by remaining aware of and attending called formations. The Grand Commander cannot fulfill his duties without their active support. Grand Officers should attend, in uniform, all Commandery degree work, as a minimum, in the area surrounding where they reside.
- That the Grand Chapter, Grand Council and Grand Commandery continue to work together to streamline the Grand York Rite Session. All reasonable ideas should be considered to unify and streamline the Grand Sessions.
- 3. That the Ritual Committee modify the by-laws to allow individual Commanderies to utilize a uniform consisting of black trousers, black shoes, black tie and white shirt in opening Commanderies at stated meetings. It is a fact that less than five percent of Missouri Sir Knights own or have ready access to a complete Templar uniform. If Missouri and Grand Encampment by-laws were enforced, there is not one Commandery that could remain open. Almost everyone has the ability to attend meetings in the suggested dress. This would be a major step toward encouragement of pride in appearance and the utilization of the proper format in opening and closing the Commanderies.
- That all monies coming into the Grand Commandery be receipted for by the Grand Recorder.
- That a complete inventory of equipment and property belonging to the Grand York Rite be annually conducted; that the inventory/audit be made a portion of the annual report.
- 6. That a Long Range Planning Committee be established with varying terms of office; that a two-year, four-year, and nine-year plan be designed, reviewed, and updated semiannually, and presented at each Grand Session.
- 7. That the Grand Commandery work with the Masonic Home Board and the Grand Lodge of Missouri to obtain an agreement on the storage/utilization of library space for the preservation of historic materials in the Masonic Home Complex.
- 8. That the Grand Commandery work with the other York Rite bodies, the Masonic Home Board and the Grand Lodge of Missouri to implement a future plan to move the Grand Recorder/Secretary's offices to the Masonic Complex basement.
- 9. That immediate steps be taken to move York Rite records to an environment-controlled location from the current storage shed.
- 10. That an "At Large" Commandery be established with the Grand Recorder and Grand Treasurer acting as Recorder and Treasurer. The purpose and function would be to give Missouri Sir Knights a "Home of Record" to remain or become a Sir Knight when there is no viable Commandery within a reasonable commuting distance. It is to be expected that the next ten years will see many of the smaller and rural

- Commanderies close or attempt to consolidate. The "At Large Commandery" will give a home of record to those in need.
- 11. That "Outpost" Commanderies be established for Commanderies that are able to minimally function and wish to retain their name, number, and presence at their current location. Guidelines are available from several of our sister state Grand Commanderies.
- 12. That the Eye Foundation Committee be disbanded and the Line Officers, Grand Recorder, and Grand Treasurer assume the duties and accountability responsibilities.
- 13. That the red shoulder cords for Regional Grand Commanders be approved by the appropriate committees. The "cords" set them apart from the rank and file, as they should be. The responsibility they carry and the duty they perform make them more important to Missouri Templary than several of the Line Officer positions.
- 14. That the current "Line Officer" election procedures and terms of office be reviewed and modified. Consistent quality/trainable, leaders must continually be elected.
- 15. That a "report card" be issued for each Grand Officer below the rank of Deputy Grand Commander. The report card reflecting activities attended and mandatory and assigned duties performed would assist in the election of committed Line Officers.
- 16. That the current "Election" ballot be modified to an understandable format. The truth is many Sir Knights find it difficult to use the first ballot particularly if they want to replace someone in the current line.
- 17. That Sir Knights be allowed to voice their desire to be nominated for election to an advancing line position.
- 18. That Sir Knights nominated for an advancing position be allowed to be recognized by the membership at the time of nomination acceptance.
- 19. That the recommendations of the 2003-2004 Audit Committee be implemented.

MOTTO

My battle cry this year was "Five High". This "battle cry" will remind each of us who and what we are, if we will use it. It is a composite of five of the elements that make us a family in the Masonic fraternity and Christian Knights.

The "High" refers to the raised hand, palm-out position of your right hand in portions of the Commandery orders. The "Five" are the individual digits of that hand, each finger acting as a symbolic reminder of the elements of Faith, Forgiveness, Fortitude, Friendship, and Family.

FAITH: This is from faith to family—from family to faith. The Alpha and the Omega—the beginning and the end. Our fate was sealed with a libation in which we expressed our belief in the immortality of the soul. Upon this belief is based everything that we stand for. The faith that carries us through clouds of doubt and the vicissitudes of daily life that falls on our shoulders. It is faith that allows us to walk unafraid into each tomorrow. Let us not falter or fail, but rather let us symbolically wield our sword in the upraised hand, proudly renewing and sharing our faith with the world and with each other.

FORGIVENESS: Such a powerful word! A word easily used and misused in our everyday lives. As Knights Templar, we are bound by a vow that was freely taken. When asked by the Commander, "What declaration have you to make in testimony of our fitness to become a Knight among us?" did we not declare in truth and soberness that we

entertained no enmity nor ill will against a soul on earth, which we would not freely reconcile, finding them in a corresponding disposition? Sir Knights, I would remind each of us of that vow. It is so often obvious to our ladies and others whose lives touch ours that we often forget our vow or do not practice it in our daily lives. I have seen the result and felt the shame and heartfelt hurt of that neglect in the actions of Sir Knights in some of the appendant bodies to which many of us belong. As our Lord Jesus Christ forgave those who trespassed against him, we should do no less than to emulate His example. Our fraternity needs a full measure of forgiveness in each of our hearts and actions.

FORTITUDE: "Fortitude" [Fr.; L. fortitude <fortis, strong]. permits one to endure, patiently, misfortune, pain and the vicissitudes of life. obstinate sort of courage that refuses to succumb under any circumstances. A personality trait that is worthy of cultivation. A trait that is learned and reinforced by life's experiences and one's own commitment to a particular way of life, belief, or faith. Each of you, have exhibited fortitude, in your commitment to the York Rite way of life. Each of you has faced daunting obstacles in supporting Masonry and in melding your personal and family needs. You have been challenged to regularly attend meetings, to find Sir Knights to fill local offices, to meet the Commandery's financial obligations or to work with personal agendas. It will continue to take fortitude to meet head on, the challenges of declining membership and the losses of ritual proficiency with the passing of our aged Sir Knights. It will take fortitude to find solutions in paying your Commandery's share of the cost in meeting places and in maintaining or purchasing ritual equipment. It will take fortitude to overcome the deficit budgets in our Grand Body, the aging equipment in the Grand Recorders office and the meager salaries that are paid to our Grand Recorder and Grand Treasurer. You displayed fortitude at the 2002-2003 Grand Session when you stood fast, and voted for the raise in per capita, effective with 2003 assessment. That should give the Grand Commandery two years of maintaining the status quo. As your Grand Commander, it is my duty to lead, to direct, and to guide the Grand Body and the constituent Commanderies in a manner that will insure their continued existence into the future. Where do we go from here? A long-term planning committee has been appointed to take a hard, no nonsense, look at where we are now and where we need to be in three, five, and ten years. A committee has been appointed to determine a course of action concerning some of our smaller and failing Commanderies. Rather than consolidate them, we hope to find a solution that will allow them to maintain their Charters and continue to function as an Outpost Commandery. Changes are in the works in Commandery Ritual Drill, to include adding "At Large" drill teams and a drill workshop. A "York Rite" historical and informational display is in the planning stages for the new Masonic Home Offices on Hwy 63 North of Columbia, Missouri. Active efforts are being taken to locate the Charter for the Grand Commandery that has been misplaced in the movements of the Grand Recorder's offices over the past years. If not located within a reasonable time, steps will be taken to replace it. Grand Officers and Regional Grand Commanders will be accessible to each of you by telephone, e-mail, personal correspondence and by visits, official and otherwise. For our time to be spent wisely on your behalf, we ask for and must have your support, assistance, and advice. As Grand Officers, we serve you. You have our ear to hear your difficulties, to share your joys and to listen to and apply your advice. "Fortitude" Sir Knights. Let us stand fast and shoulder-to-shoulder. What we have is worth being flexible in our agendas, worth giving extra time to, worth giving up a personal luxury for, worth working to insure financial stability of your Commandery and your Grand Commandery. No one can do it all: We each can do something: Together, we can accomplish the unbelievable.

FRIENDSHIP: A description of a state of being; a condition or relation of being friends; a person who one knows, likes and trusts; a favored companion; one with whom one is allied in a struggle or cause; one who supports, sympathizes with, or patronizes a cause or movement. "Friendship," a word that defies a single definition. Yet, it has a personal definition to each of us in our relationships, both personal and fraternal. We might agree that after our personal survival needs are satisfied, the need for friendship is exceeded only by the need for love. "Friendship," say the word aloud. Roll it off your tongue; savor the sound and feel its personal meaning in your soul where its value is more precious than gold. Truly, it is intangible, without price. It cannot be bought, sold, or exchanged. As Knights Templar, we share fraternal friendship. It is hearing your name spoken, being greeted with a warm smile, and a clasping of hands. It is seeing familiar faces, sharing meals, working together in degree and ritual work. It is the joy we feel when a friend receives honors and preferment. It is respect for a Sir Knight's view and opinions, even when they differ in the extreme from ours. It is a condition that bridges individual social and financial standings, allowing us to share values, and to learn from each other. "Friendship," a state of condition or being that is slow in maturing, yet so easily and quickly damaged or destroyed with personal actions or poorly chosen words. As Knights Templar, we are united in the cause of Christian Masonry. By definition, that makes every Sir Knight our friend. It requires that we treat each other with the respect that one friend freely gives another. We pledged to walk forty miles without shoes to aid another Sir Knight. Yet, how often have we spoken in a disparaging manner of another Sir Knight or allowed others in our presence to do so? Are all our actions and words extended in the manner that we would expect to give and receive as friends? The mirror is so unkind. I fear that as men, we have erred. The face we see is not the one that has freely taken numerous vows, vows that make each and every one who has taken the same vows a friend. May each of us search our souls and step into tomorrow with the determination that our actions and words reflect our love for the York Rite, our desire to share that love, to see our fraternity grow, and to spread Christian Masonry's light. That determination and sense of purpose requires that we work together

FAMILY: The most fundamental social group in mankind; a group of like things having a common source or similar features; a special or particular world of something: fellowship. A physical state of being that humanity holds equally sacred as faith and love. Humanity's raison-d'etre. Sir Knights, fraternally, we are all family. Brothers all! From family to faith. Faith to family. The alpha and the omega that give us the fortitude to face tomorrow. The Grand Commandery message this Templar year is "FIVE HIGH." It is my hope that each of you will carry that message in your hearts. That each of us will give to the other as we would like and expect to be given to in our personal biological and legal family. If a member of your family grieves, will you not comfort them? If one is hungry, will you not seat them at your table? If one acts and speaks from an impoverished heart, will you not forgive them? If one has fallen and needs a hand to rise, will you not extend yours? Family: a concept taught from the first lesson in Freemasonry, to the yows as a Knight Templar. As we bow our heads in adoration of our Savior and Heavenly Father, let us join hands as brothers. Take your brother's hand in yours, both physically and metaphorically. Search out the brother lost or left behind. Greet each other as friends, family, and brothers. Strengthen and extend our family by regular attendance at stated meetings. Two can make a circle, but the 6,139 of us make a

circle encompassing a vast reservoir of knowledge, values, beliefs, and abilities. No one can do it all; together we can accomplish the impossible. Let our circle be unbroken.

Matthew 7:9-10: Or what man is there of you, whom if his son ask bread, will give him a stone? Or if he asks for a fish, will you give him a serpent?

CONCLUSION

Thank you again for electing me to this highly honored position of Grand Commander. I have attempted to work faithfully to represent the State of Missouri and to fulfill the inherent obligations of the office. It has been a challenging year, filled with opportunities and learning experiences. Some decisions have been made that were good. Some have been made, that, in looking back, would probably have been best not made. The intention was to do no harm, yet to leave this Grand Commandery with another solid stepping-stone into the future. May the tomorrows prove that assessment correct.

A review of the Missouri Supplement in the monthly Knight Templar magazine will give a good overview of where I had hoped to go and where we ended. A year may feel like a lifetime and it is too short of duration to accomplish many of the objectives that were envisioned. Their completion, revision, or abandonment is in your hands and those of the continuing line of elected officers.

Several committees did not function at all or as intended. Some excellent choices were made in appointments and some were made that were not in the best interest of the Missouri York Rite. Many officers, elected and appointed upheld the commitment they voluntarily made upon accepting the position. Several were never heard from or were minimally involved throughout the year. To the many of you who gave so much, I am grateful beyond expression. I thank you and Missouri Templary thanks you.

I say "thank you" to Sir Knight Robert H. Bray for his design and donation of the new Grand Commandery altar cloth. We will use it with pride and honor for many years to come. We all owe him a debt of gratitude for his design of the new Honor Commandery Award Medallion and financial contribution. We also owe Oriental Commandery No. 35 for their financial contribution to the purchase of the new medallion.

The Regional Grand Commanders were a tremendous strength in supporting and representing the Grand Commandery. Each is a credit to the region represented and I thank them for their sincere hard work and continued cooperation.

As the Grand Commander, there is cause to depend on many people. I thank the Line Officers for their support and participation. I sincerely hope in the future that the full line of officers will remain involved in the planning and activities of this Grand Commandery. IN THE FUTURE, WE WILL ALL WALK IN YOUR SHADOWS. Plan well so that the shadow may be long, straight, and wide.

To the three Officers who were indispensable: the Grand Recorder, Kevin B. Sample, the Grand Treasurer, Donald L. Trabue and the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, Robert W. Schlichter, without you the entire year would have been impossible. Without you, nothing of consequence would have been accomplished. Without you, the title of Grand Commander would have been an empty echo. Gentlemen, I truly know of the countless hours you have given this Grand Commandery. I recognize your love of and unfailing commitment to the good of the order. This has not been my Commandery year, it has been yours. Your actions and hard work are ever to be enshrined in the proceedings of the 2003-2004 Commandery Year. For all of Missouri

Knights Templar, I thank you and recognize our debt to you.

To Richard L. Mansfield, the Grand Sentinel, who was also know as "The Grand Driver," my Lady Christopher and I will be forever appreciative of you for your companionship and careful driving that carried us thousands of miles in the service of Missouri's Sir Knights. REPORTS OF GRAND RECORDER

SUMMARY

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri:

Sir Knights, the membership records are getting closer to those reported by Commandery Recorders. Our records differ from recorders by about 89. Many Recorders are still not providing us with accurate membership records—meaning that they do not have them themselves. Joyce is working with them each and every day to try to get these numbers together. It is extremely important that Recorders keep accurate records of their membership to include full names, addresses, phone numbers; degree dates (all of them, not just the Order of the Temple, and keep up with suspensions and reinstatements, dimits, etc. It is also extremely important that they report any changes in their membership monthly on the Commandery Monthly Reports, not just during the annual return.

There is a situation with the membership database hired to be developed for the Grand York Rite. The vendor hired has refused to provide us with the application developed, work with us to move the membership records over, and has gone out of business. Legal action is taking place at this time.

At the time of this communication, we are still waiting on annual returns from Cour de Leon No. 14, Boanerges No. 34, Maryville No. 40, and Westport No. 68. The Recorder of Westport has had health problems and was given an extension.

Eight annual reports were late this year, the last being received on April 1. The continued tardiness of these reports makes it impossible for us to provide the membership numbers needed to develop budgets and long-range goals for the Grand Commandery. Commandery Commanders, Regional Grand Commanders, and the Grand Officers are now being informed of these delinquencies.

Liberty Commandery No. 6 has still refused to pay late fees for 2000, 2001, and 2002, now totaling over \$400.00. All other Commanderies are working with this office to complete their annual return fees.

The reports on Commandery audits and bonds can be found in the tabular statements of Commanderies. Annual audits are good for the most part, but some chapters simply refuse to complete the annual audit. Commandery reports still identify that monies of the Commanderies are not deposited in accounts with at least two signatures.

General information about the York Rite and the publication of the proceedings can be found in the Report of the Grand Secretary of the Grand Chapter.

Joyce and I thank the Right Eminent Grand Commander, and all the grand officers and members of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri for a most enjoyable and productive year. It has been a distinct pleasure to work with Grand Commander Yunick and his lady Christopher. We also thank Teddie Harrison for his continued support of this office in his donation of paper; and a very special word of thanks goes to Paul Cannon who has so graciously given of his time and money to volunteer in the office and assist with a great many things in the day to day operations of the Grand York Rite. We thank all those who volunteer their time to help with the Grand York Rite Session—we could not do it without them. We all look forward to working with each and every one in the future.

GRAND COMMANDERY STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ADDRESS OF GRAND COMMANDER

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri:

Sir Knights: The Committee on the address of the Grand Commander has met, reviewed the Address of the Grand Commander and report that we find the Address of the Grand Commander to be in order. We refer all decisions, dispensations and General Orders made by the Grand Commander to the Committee on Jurisprudence. We encourage the Grand Commandery Officers and the Grand Commandery to give favorable consideration to the recommendations of the Grand Commander as follows:

- 1. That the Grand Officers show a larger degree of interest in the activities of the Grand Commandery by remaining aware of and attending called formations. The Grand Commander cannot fulfill his duties without their active support. Grand officers should attend, in uniform, all Commandery degree work, as a minimum, in the area surrounding where they reside.
- 2. That the Grand Chapter, Grand Council and Grand Commandery continue to work together to streamline the Grand York Rite Session. All reasonable ideas should be considered to unify and streamline the Grand Sessions.
- 3. That the Ritual Committee modify the by-laws to allow individual Commanderies to utilize a uniform consisting of black trousers, black shoes, black tie and white shirt in opening Commanderies at stated meetings. It is a fact that less than five percent of Missouri Sir Knights own or have ready access to a complete Templar uniform. If Missouri and Grand Encampment by-laws were enforced, there is not one Commandery that could remain open. Almost everyone has the ability to attend meetings in the suggested dress. This would be a major step toward encouragement of pride in appearance and the utilization of the proper format in opening and closing the Commanderies.
- 4. That all monies coming into the Grand Commandery be receipted for by the Grand Recorder.
- 5. That a complete inventory of equipment and property belonging to the Grand York Rite be annually conducted; that the inventory/audit be made a portion of the annual report.
- 6. That a Long Range Planning Committee be established with varying terms of office; that a two year, four year, and nine year plan be designed, reviewed/updated semiannually, and resented at each Grand Session.
- 7. That the Grand Commandery work with the Masonic Home Board and the Grand Lodge of Missouri to obtain an agreement on the storage/utilization of library space for the preservation of historic materials in the Masonic Home complex.
- 8. That the Grand Commandery work with the other York Rite bodies, the Masonic Home Board and the Grand Lodge of Missouri to implement a future plan to move the Grand Recorder/Secretary's offices to the Masonic complex basement.
- 9. That immediate steps be taken to move York Rite records to an environment-controlled location from the current storage shed.
- 10. That an "At Large" Commandery be established with the Grand Recorder and Grand Treasures acting as Recorder and Treasurer. The purpose and function is to give Missouri Sir Knights a "Home of Record" to remain or become a Sir Knight when there is no viable Commandery within a reasonable commuting distance. It is to be expected

that the next ten years will see many of the smaller and rural Commanderies close or attempt to consolidate. The "At Large Commandery" will give a home of record to those in need.

- 11. That "Outpost" Commanderies be established for Commanderies that are able to minimally function and wish to retain their name, number, and presence at their current location. Guidelines are available from several of our sister state Grand Commanderies.
- 12. That the Eye Foundation Committee be disbanded and the Line Officers, Grand Recorder, and Grand Treasurer assume the duties and accountability responsibilities.
- 13. That the red shoulder cords for Regional Grand Commanders be approved by the appropriate committees. The "cords" set them apart from the rank and file, as they should be. The responsibility they carry and the duty they perform make them more important to Missouri Templary that several of the Line Officer positions.
- 14. That the current "Line Officer" election procedures and terms of office be reviewed and modified. Consistent quality/trainable, leaders must continually be elected.
- 15. That a "report card" be issued for each Grand Officer below the rank of Deputy Grand Commander. The report card reflecting activities attended and mandatory and assigned duties preformed would assist in the election of committed line officers.
- 16. That the current "Election" ballot be modified to an understandable format. The truth is many Sir Knights find it difficult to use on the first ballot particularly, if they want to replace someone in the current line.
- 17. That Sir Knights be allowed to voice their desire to be nominated for election to an advancing line position.
- 18. That Sir Knights nominated for an advancing position be allowed to be recognized by the membership at the time of nomination acceptance.
 - 19. That the recommendations of the 2003-2004 Audit Committee be implemented. However, the following reservations would apply:

Recommendations #3, #10, and #11

All care should be taken to make sure that any new "approved uniform" is in compliance with all Grand Encampment regulations.

Recommendation #4

The Committee is not sure that this will satisfy the Grand Encampment and the Knights Templar Eye Foundation as they have a procedure for sending all money for the voluntary campaign through the state chairman who then sends the money and forms on to the Knights Templar Eye Foundation.

Recommendation #12

Again, we are not sure that this will satisfy the Grand Encampment and the Knights Templar Eye foundation.

Recommendations #14, #16, #17, and #18

The Committee feels that these recommendations would require substantial amendments to the By-Laws before they could be implemented.

We move that the Address of the Grand Commander be approved and be printed in the proceedings of this Grand Conclave. We further move that this report be adopted and that the Sir Knights who would vote favorably on these motions please give our Right Eminent Grand Commander a standing ovation.

Proposed Legislation

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Article XVIII, Change of By-Laws, Sec. 215. By Alteration or Repeal, be amended by striking, "on one day of this session, be published in the proceedings of this Grand Commandery, and lie over until the next annual conclave, when it shall again be read;".

THIS SECTION CURRENTLY READS: Any alteration or proposition to repeal any of the foregoing By-laws shall be reduced to writing, read on one day of this session, be published with the proceedings of this Grand Commandery, and lie over until the next annual conclave, when it shall again be read; and, if approved by the majority of the members present, shall become a part of the By-Laws of this Grand Commandery.

IF ADOPTED, THIS SECTION WOULD READ: Any alteration or proposition to repeal any of the foregoing Laws and Regulations shall be reduced to writing, read, and, if approved by the majority of the members present, shall become a part of the Laws and Regulations of this Grand Commandery.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: Adoption of this amendment negates the requirement that a proposal to amend a currently existing Rule or Regulation, or a proposal to repeal a currently existing Rule or Regulation, have to lie over until the following session of the Grand Commandery. The several steps and delay required of the existing By-Law are unnecessarily burdensome, create needless additional paperwork, and needlessly hinder legislation that frequently is urgently necessary to conduct the business function of the Grand Commandery. Adoption of this amendment proposal does not remove the requirement of timely filing with the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee as stipulated in Section 35(c).

Proposed Legislation

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Article I, THE GRAND COMMANDERY, Section 12. Annual Conclave, of the Laws and Regulations of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri be amended by striking ", to be effective beginning with the Templar Year of 1995" and all wording following "and" and substituting the following wording, "/or Saturday in May in the city of Columbia or Jefferson City in the State of Missouri. The time and place of the Annual Convocation will be designated in the official notice of the Conclave."

THE LAW CURRENTLY READS: Section 12 Annual Conclave. So as not to conflict with the Annual Conclave of any sister jurisdiction in the South Central Department, to be effective beginning with the Templar Year of 1995, the Grand Commandery shall hold an Annual Conclave on the third Friday and Saturday in May in a city in the State of Missouri to be determined by the Grand Commander with the approval of a majority vote of the Deputy Grand Commander, Generalissimo, and Grand Captain General. The time and place of the Annual Conclave will be designated in the official notice of the Conclave.

IF AMENDED THE LAW WILL READ: *Section 12 Annual Conclave.* So as not to conflict with the Annual Conclave of any sister jurisdiction in the South Central Department, The Grand Commandery shall hold an Annual Conclave on the third Friday and/or Saturday in May in the city of Columbia or Jefferson City in the State of Missouri. The time and place of the Annual Conclave will be designated in the official notice of the Conclave.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: In consideration of the expense, both in time and money, of the Drill Teams who compete in the annual competition and as an incentive for more participation and attendance, a central location for the Annual Conclave is essentially necessary. The Grand Commandery must be sensitive to the needs of our members throughout the state.

Further, this amendment offers the option to open the Grand Commandery either on Friday or Saturday. The current By-Law requires that we open on Friday, and the Grand Commandery is not in compliance, because it is not opened until Saturday. Should the Grand Commandery hold its Annual Conclave apart from the Grand Chapter and Grand Council, this amendment allows for a two-day session if needed.

Proposed Legislation

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: the following sections be added to the Grand Commandery Laws and Regulations, to wit, *Section 201. Honorary Titles*.

- (a) Any Sir Knight considered qualified to meet the qualifications of Section 237(a) of the Constitution and Statutes of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the United States of America may be considered for a proposal as an Honorary Past Grand Commander.
- (b) The Grand Commander shall get the written approval of the Grand Master of the Grand Encampment before proposing that the Sir Knight be so honored with that title.
- (c) The Grand Commandery at an Annual Conclave may approve the title by a vote of 2/3 of those present and eligible to vote.
- (d) Any Sir Knight so honored will be entitled to wear the shoulder straps of a Past Grand Commander. The shoulder straps shall be engraved with the letters "HPGC" on each of them in gold to designate his honor.
- (e) The honoree shall also be entitled to wear the jewel of a Past Grand Commander with the words "Honorary Past Grand Commander" engraved on the back.
- (f) The honoree shall assume the cost for purchase of the shoulder boards and the iewel.

The possession of a uniform by the members of constituent commanderies shall not be required, but shall be at the option of each member.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: To recognize, in a tangible and visible way, the lifelong

service of our veteran Knights Templar.

IF ADOPTED, SECTION 16(i) WOULD READ: (1), It may prescribe a uniform and change it from time to time. If it fails to so prescribe, the uniform shall be that as prescribed by the Grand Encampment for members of the constituent commanderies. The possession of a uniform by the members of constituent commanderies shall not be required, but shall be at the option of each member.

(2), Any Sir Knight who achieves fifty (50) years of membership in good standing, as certified by the Grand Recorder, shall be awarded a Veteran's Jewel. Said Jewel is designated as meritorious to reward the Sir Knight for his loyalty, devotion, and service to his Commandery. The Jewel shall be worn on the left breast of the uniform as specifically authorized and directed by Section 257 of the Constitution and Statutes of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar. The Annual Conclave shall include a Commandery Drill Competition as long as there are Drill Teams to Compete. The Annual Conclave shall be a Part of a Grand York Rite Session held in conjunction with the Grand Chapter and the Grand Council of Missouri. The location shall be determined by a Committee on Time and Place that shall consist of the Grand King of the Grand Chapter of Missouri, the Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Council of Missouri, and the Deputy Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Missouri. If the Committee cannot come to a unanimous decision a General Session of the Grand York Rite will be called on the Friday preceding the third Saturday in May at 9:00 a.m. during the Grand York Rite Session and the matter will be voted on by all voting members of all three Grand York Rite Bodies. The proposal receiving the most votes will be binding on all three York Rite Bodies. Thus, the Grand York Rite Session shall be held on the third Saturday in May along with the preceding Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. Wednesday shall be Grand Council Day, Thursday Shall be Grand Chapter Day, Friday shall be Grand York Rite Day and Saturday shall be Grand Commandery Day. ARTICLE 1, SECTION 12, ANNUAL CONCLAVE CURRENTLY READS: So as not to conflict with the Annual Conclave of any sister jurisdiction in the South Central

Department, to be effective beginning with the Templar Year of 1995, the Grand Commandery shall hold an Annual Conclave on the third Friday and Saturday in May in a city in the State of Missouri to be determined by the Grand Commander with the approval of a majority vote of the Deputy Grand Commander, Grand Generalissimo, and Grand Captain General. The time and place of the Annual Conclave will be designated in the official notice of the Conclave.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: To promote York Rite Unity, to provide for a means of appointment and function of Joint Committees of the Grand York Rite, and to cause the Drill Competition to be a part of the annual Grand York Rite Session. This would also relieve the time constraints placed on all of the Grand York Rite Bodies during their annual meetings. Finally, to avoid the possibility of extra expense that would be incurred should the Grand York Rite Bodies have separate sessions at separate times and location. This amendment should not become effective until and if all three York Rite Grand Bodies have passed similar legislation.

This very important officer is not currently entitled to vote unless he is a Past Commander of a constituent Commandery. Some Recorders are NOT Past Commanders and do maintain the most significant responsibilities of the Commandery; that officer should be entitled to vote as such.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RETURNS OF COMMANDERIES

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri:

Sir Knights: Your Committee on Returns of Commanderies has examined the returns of the 46 Commanderies in this jurisdiction and presents the following report:

During the past year, St. Charles Commandery No. 73 consolidated with Ivanhoe Commandery No. 8. Couer de Leon Commandery No. 14, Boanerges Commandery No. 34, Ascension Commandery No. 39, Maryville Commandery No. 40, and Westport Commandery No. 68 have not filed returns at the time of making this report and will be assessed penalties by the Grand Recorder when received. The returns of Liberty Commandery No. 6, Kansas City Commandery No. 10, St. Graal Commandery No. 12, Temple Commandery No. 38, and Harve de Grace Commandery No. 63 were received late and were assessed penalties. St. Graal Commandery No. 12 did not include the Audit Report with the returns due to the meeting of their Audit Committee being delayed on account of serious illness of one of the committee members. Eleven of the returns did not include the seal of the Commandery.

With very few exceptions, the returns were typed or neatly hand printed although several contained errors, many of which were caused by Recorders evidently not keeping a current updated roster of their membership as changes occur during the year.

The Monthly Update Reports continue to be a problem although there appears to be some improvement during the past year. If this report were made monthly as requested, it would help eliminate the problem of errors in membership and mathematic sections of the annual returns as well as eliminating much wasted postage.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES

REPORT OF AUDIT COMMITTEE

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri:

An audit of the financial records of the Grand Commandery was conducted on April 18, 2004, with the Grand Recorder and the Grand Treasurer in attendance. This audit focused primarily upon the record keeping practices and controls placed upon the finances of the Grand Commandery by the Grand Recorder and the Grand Treasurer with limited incursions into actual receipts and expenses from the individual accounts as previously authorized in the approved budget of the Committee on Finance and Accounts. The Committee notes that the Grand Recorder and the Grand Treasurer maintain a successive list of warrants that successively and successfully track income to and expenditures from the various line items contained in the budget. The Committee

further notes that each officer maintains a balance sheet to report such activity on a continual basis. The balance sheets are readily deciphered even by an untrained eye. The lack of balance sheets from Committees having oversight of the income and expenditure of some funds is particularly troublesome especially as these relate to the tax-exempt standing of the Grand Commandery. The Committee observed that some of the equipment utilized by the Grand Recorder in the performance of his duties are leased items. The Committee also observed that some supplies are donated items for the use of the Grand York Rite of Missouri and that some of the office equipment and shelving utilized by these officers is donated for the benefit of the Grand York Rite of Missouri. The audit took into account the amount of space being utilized by the Grand York Rite. The Grand York Rite office is manned on a near 24/7 basis and functions with only the assistance of one other paid employee. Taxes are computed and paid for these employees and adequate records are maintained for that purpose. The Committee did review the 990 forms utilized to document the tax payments of the Grand Commandery and found them in order. The Committee found that some original paperwork documenting the taxexempt status of the Grand York Rite was missing. The Committee notes that a number of Constituent Commanderies have filed no annual returns, paid per capita tax, or have filed late returns. The lack of doing so complicates the maintenance of accurate membership statistics that are used to project and prepare the annual budget. Furthermore, this lackadaisical attitude and lack of record keeping and submission results in unnecessary costs to the general fund of the Grand Commandery. understanding of the Audit Committee that some initial planning has taken place for the conduct of a dollars and cents internal audit following the close of the Grand Session this year. The Committee finds that a policy on the dispersal of monies from the Triennial Fund is seriously lacking. The lack of positive direction in this regard created utter confusion this year. The Audit Committee, through its investigation, learned that disbursement of funds from this account has been viewed by Past Grand Commanders in different ways. The Audit Committee received paperwork from various Sir Knights, some with, some without justifications for expenditures and some with varying amounts indicated for the same listed item. These disparities created some consternation among the troops. Indeed, to the point that the entire matter had to be referred to the Committee on Jurisprudence for a ruling as to which Sir Knights were actually authorized by the Laws and Regulations of the Grand Commandery to receive funds from the Triennial Fund. The question being, "Does one rely on past practice or does one rely on the Rules and Regulations"? Of course, the Laws and Regulations do not address what expenditures are or are not authorized.

Recommendations

- 1. That a complete inventory be conducted of all the property being held in storage. It is recommended that a committee of Past Grand Heads of Bodies be appointed for this purpose.
- 2. That such committee focus on items that are out dated or can no longer be utilized with an eye towards dispersal in order to reduce the necessity to retain scattered storage locations thereby reducing costs to the Grand York Rite. Such material includes desks, typewriters, and printers to name a few.
- 3. That such committee review all documentation currently in storage and determine its intrinsic value for retention or destruction.

- 4. That having done so, the committee explore the means of reducing items (documentation and papers) selected for retention to electronic media thereby again reducing the necessity for retaining and paying for additional storage space.
- 5. That practice be put in place to require financial statements from all committees having oversight of any funds associated with the Grand Commandery, including those of the charities.
- 6. That practice be put in place to enforce the filing of annual returns and payment of per capita and/or penalties in a more timely manner.
- 7. That a paper inventory be established to identify and segregate property actually under the control and ownership of the Grand York Rite as opposed to that being donated by the Grand Recorder and Grand Treasurer.
- 8. That any proposed internal audit be conducted as near as possible after the close of the books for the Grand Session.
- 9. That the Grand Treasurer continues his pursuit of and obtains such documentation as is necessary to corroborate the 501(c)(10) filing status for the Grand York Rite of Missouri.
- 10. That a committee be appointed to develop written policy that explicitly identifies how the monies from the Triennial Fund are to be allocated and to whom.
- 11. That such policy specify the particular form of reporting that will be used to justify expenditures from the Triennial Fund.
- 12. That such policy address what expenditures will be permitted and how those are to be documented.
- 13. That, if necessary, the Laws and Regulations of the Grand Commandery be amended to correct any deficiencies or concerns in relation to the Triennial Fund.

In closing, it should be noted that the one of the names appearing as signatory on this report was not as originally appointed by the Grand Commander. In the waning hours immediately prior to the date and time scheduled for the conduct of the audit, it became quite apparent that the majority of the Committee had dissolved itself. It therefore became necessary to relieve the burden and fill the void by grabbing a willing soul. That was done. So be it!

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHARTER AND SEAL REVIEW

Right Eminent Grand Commander, officers, and members, in early fall of 2003, the Grand Commander ordered the Grand Recorder to contact each constituent Commandery for the purpose of reviewing the status of each organization's charter and seal. The reason for this was painfully obvious with the loss of the Grand Commandery Charter, to see that each Commandery was in possession of their charter and seal and to suggest protective action in order to preserve charters.

On December 8, 2003, that communication was issued. Enclosed with that communication was a 3x5 card with information to be completed and/or corrected including the name & number of the Commandery; the corrected spelling of each Commandery based on the wording of the charter; was there a copy of the charter; was the original charter under archival glass; was the original charter in a vault; if the charter was in a vault, was there two signatures to access; and, was the copy framed and displayed. Also on the card were signature lines for the Commander and Recorder and a place to affix the Commandery seal on gold foil. Finally, due to transfer of records and our inability to locate specific copies of each Commandery's by-laws, each Commandery was to submit a copy of their current by-laws.

Of the 46 Commanderies queried, we received response from the following 21: Weston No. 2, Hugh de Payens No. 2, Liberty No. 6, Ivanhoe No. 8, St. Omer No. 11, O'Sullivan No. 15, Ascalon No. 16, St. John's No. 20, Ely No. 22; Crusade No. 23, Constantine No. 27, Prince of Peace No. 29, Lebanon No. 33, Temple No. 38, Bethany No. 42, Cape Girardeau No. 55, DeSoto No. 56, Rolla No. 59, Albany No. 60, St. Amand No. 64, Poplar Bluff No. 67, and Malta No. 72.

Only Ivanhoe No. 8, O'Sullivan No. 15, St. John's No. 20, Temple No. 38, DeSoto No. 56, Rolla No. 59, and Poplar Bluff No. 67 were returned with by-laws. We received notice that Hugh de Payens by-laws were being updated. Each card was signed by the Commander, Recorder, and impressed with their seal. We are grateful for their assistance with this process.

This office feels that due to time and with Recorder turnover, many Commanderies do not have access to any functional by-laws. Additionally, some of the newer Recorders may not understand that the charter and seal are the property of the Grand Commandery.

The general consensus is that less than 25% of those who responded have copied their charters or have their originals under archival glass. All who responded were in charge of their seal although a couple are quite worn and should be replaced.

In summary, this office feels that each Commandery should have a color copy of their charter made and the original secured in a safe, fireproof location. We cannot account for the status of over 50% of the Commanderies in the state concerning the status of their charter or seal.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DRILL WORKSHOPS

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri:

Congratulations on a very successful term, and we look forward to your continued participation as one of our most trusted counselors. I offer the following as a token of activity of this committee.

Early in the Templar year, a format for the workshop was developed and distributed to the Drill Committee, Drill Judges, and Ritual Committee for their review and suggested revisions. The intent was to establish some formal agreement as to content, and determine pre-defined methodology in the judging of controversial aspects of Asylum Drill, not formally addressed by the Tactics Manual.

A meeting was called on February 22, 2004 of the Drill Committee, Drill Judges, and Ritual Committee, attended by Sir Knights Stanton T. Brown, Marion W. Dey, Chester H. Hazen, Jerry F. Ward, Thomas C. Yunick, and Frederick A. Troxel, Jr.

It was generally agreed by the participants that a more stringent judging program was necessary, and that a return to former practices be implemented. Of particular interest was the relaxation of kneeling requirement, and subsequent omission of certain aspects of the drill routine.

Several factors influenced the inability of this committee to organize jurisdictional workshops to present these criteria; moving the "B", "C", and "at Large" drill competitions to April, and the changeover of committee members of the several committees.

It is the opinion of the Workshop Committee that continued effort be expended to ensure that the judging committee be intimately familiar with the Asylum Drill, and that the Drill and Ritual Committee be consulted for clarification of the drill routines when notifying the Commanderies of the Drill Competition.

It was my honor and pleasure to serve this past year as Chairman of the Drill Workshop Committee. It is my hope that this committee will be continued, and that further progress will be made to amplify and encourage participation in the Asylum Drill Competition.

REPORT OF GRAND HISTORIAN

To the Right Eminent Grand Commander and the other Sir Knights of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri:

R. E. Grand Commander, when you called me early in May last year and asked if I would serve as Historian for this body for the ensuing year, I asked what you would expect me to do, and you told me to find something of interest in the history of this Grand Body to report on at this Conclave. That opened the door for me; at the Annual Conclave, I told you that I would do that and that I would take the opportunity and begin a History of this Grand Body, which I estimated that it would require a few years to complete. As a member of the Grand Encampment since 1986 and a member of its Committee on Templar History since 1984, I have been well aware of the very little that is available (in one book) on this subject. I became Chairman of the Committee in 1985 - and took on the job of writing the History of that organization from 1949 to 1997, which was published in October of 1999 as "Book II" of the History of the Grand Encampment, Knights Templar of the United States of America.

I had spent some time deciding how I thought the History of this Grand Commandery should be done, and then I started reading the Proceedings, starting with the Conclave which was called to establish this Grand Body, following its authorization by the Grand Encampment. I copied ALL of the Proceedings of that conclave, and I also copied much of what transpired at the first Conclave of this Grand Body (which was on the day following the "organizational" Conclave). In fact, I copied quite a bit of several of the early Annual Conclaves; the idea being for the reader to hopefully get the feeling of how those Sir Knights thought, spoke and wrote. I have completed a rough draft of the first thirty years or so.

I hope that we can talk the Lodge of Research of the Grand Lodge into publishing it when I have finished it; hopefully, within the next couple of years.

Now, to get to the promise I made to the Grand Commander. Have any of you heard about the "Permanent Grand Encampment Grounds" proposed by the Grand Commandery of Missouri? Sir Knight Robert Bray wrote to me a year ago this past winter and asked me that question. He referred me to a date almost a century ago to check into - if I was curious. I drove into Mountain Grove and looked in the Library in our Masonic Temple.

I found on p. 23, May 23, 1911 Proceedings (extracted from Grand Commander William F. Kuhn's Address, p.33-34) PERMANENT ENCAMPMENT GROUNDS "At the Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery one year ago steps were taken toward securing a permanent Home for the Grand Commandery. Such actions can be found on pages 60, 97 and 98 of the Proceedings for 1910. I therefore immediately issued a circular letter to the Commanderies concerning a map of the proposed grounds and all the information thereto and requested action thereon without delay." Only 32 of the 65 commanderies responded; 19 were for the idea and 13 opposed it. In accordance with the way the proposition had been stated, he declared it carried, and named a Board of Trustees: Solomon E. Waggoner of St. Louis, R.E.P.G.C., for a 3 year term; Von F. Boor of Kansas City, P.E.C. for a 2 year term; and Samuel Smoke of Columbia, P.E.C., for a 1 year term.

On page 130 is a report of two of the Trustees, Waggoner and Boor that they had "formally accepted" the offer of the STL&SF Railroad to sell the proposed land to the Grand Commandery, and requested that "an appropriation of at least \$500.00 be made at the present time to be used in the preliminary work" on the grounds.

On p.26, May 1913 Proceedings: (from Address of Grand Commander Millard F. Faulkner.

"Four years ago it was unanimously conceded that the Grand Commandery, Knights Templar, of the State of Missouri, should have a Permanent Encampment Ground, and a committee was appointed to find suitable location."

"Canvassing varied sections of the state and considering several propositions made, the committee accepted a site covering 279 acres in Pulaski County, lying along the banks of the Gasconade River.

"Two years ago the Grand Commandery voted a per capita tax of fifty cents per annum, extending through a period of five years for the purpose of raising funds for improvement.

"The second payment of the annual tax has now been made by all of the Commanderies of the state, and there is yet in the Grand Treasury at credit of this fund, \$1,063.50.

"The Board of Trustees have performed unselfish labor in framing matters so as to commence building at the earliest possible moment that funds in hand are sufficient to justify a contract.

"I extend hearty endorsement of the Permanent State Encampment proposition, feeling assured that when once attained it will be the pride of all Knights Templar of Missouri."

On p.119, of those same Proceedings: Report of Trustees of P.S. Encampment showed \$6453.66 on hand.

Pages 58-62, May 1914 Proceedings: from Address of Grand Commander William H. Glancy.

Permanent Encampment Grounds

As a result of the proposal in 1911, of the 62 Commanderies, 19 voted in favor of obtaining and developing the site (with the 50 cents per Templar "tax" per annum for 5 years) and 13 opposed (NOTE: only ½ of the Commanderies responded.) As of this date there was \$9,589.41 on hand for the Trustees for use in development of the Grounds; (surveying, building a cabin, "working tools" had already been paid for). It took 50 minutes for the 4 mile trip from the Rail Road Station on the only road (unimproved, dirt) road to go from the railway station to the site. While visiting around the state the Grand Commander was convinced that only a few of the Templars were for the proposition and would make use of the Grounds. "I therefore recommend that the Trustees be instructed . . . to dispose of all tools, etc. . . ." and all of the monies be refunded to the Commanderies and that the contract with the St. Louis and San Francisco Railway be canceled."

Page 101, May 1915 Proceedings: Permanent State Encampment. Resolution "... which upon being submitted to a vote received affirmative sanction." The Resolution - much as stated in the preceding paragraph was adopted. The proposal for a Permanent State Encampment was thus "laid to rest".

Pages 32-34, May 1916 Proceedings: from Address of Grand Commander Ernest Fowkes.

Permanent State Encampment

... "The Grand Treasurer reported distribution completed October 19th, 1915. Thus, and this, with your approval, brings the Permanent State Encampment proposition to a happy conclusion."

As I indicated earlier, I am indebted to Sir Knight Robert Bray for calling my attention to this affair.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMBERSHIP

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri:

The membership reports I have been receiving from the Grand Encampment have been very disturbing. In May of 2000, Missouri had a membership of 7,305. As of March 1 of this year, our membership has declined to 5,859. That is a decrease of 1,446 members in a little less than four years. At this rate of decline, will there even be a Grand Commandery of Missouri in twenty years?

So far this year through February, we have only knighted sixty and seven affiliated. Twenty-two were reinstated, but forty-two demitted. This year through February, we have suspended 246 and lost 122 to death. I attended the York Rite Conferences in Springfield and Farmington, reporting facts and trying to motivate membership.

In September, I sent a letter to all Commanderies asking them to make a dedicated effort to contact the newly made Master Masons in their area, and invite them to join the York Rite. So far, our reports have not reflected any increases, only decreases.

I encourage each of you to replace yourself with at least one new Sir Knight. I continue to see many Lodges doing degree work, the one-day classes are continuing. We should be attending these classes and putting in a good word for York Rite. The Shrine is present to shake hands and welcome everyone in the morning. What are we as York Rite Masons doing? I believe that our Regional Grand Commanders should be present or make arrangements to have someone present when there is going to be a one-day class in their area. Please, attend your Blue Lodges, sell York Rite Masonry, and let's get some of our younger people involved to carry Masonry into the next millennium. We need to make our Commanderies more visible in the community.

Sir Knight Billy J. Boyer, past Department Commander and a trustee of the Knight Templar Eye Foundation, of which we are very proud. Sir Knight Jacob C. Baird is our Grand Historian and is chairman of our Historical Committee on the History of the Grand Encampment, and we appreciate you Jake for all that you have done. Sir Knight Vern H. Schneider, who is and honorary past Department Commander and General Council (and Blair is General Chairman), for the 60th Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment, did a wonderful job in St. Louis on that occasion. Sir Knight Lon Goede who has served two Grand Masters as Registration Chairman of Grand Conclaves, both Blair's and William Jackson Jones'. I

would recognize Teddie E. Harrison; Teddie is Mr. Membership of Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the United States of America. Teddie, you have done a wonderful job, thank you.

Sir Knights, we started this 63rd Triennial of the Grand Encampment by my sharing of my vision at least, and I would like it to be everyone's vision for the Grand Encampment, that Templary as we know it in the United States of America, is returned to being the premier organization or York Rite, if not all of Masonry. That is my vision and if I had any other vision, I would assume that you would be disappointed in me. It can be accomplished, Sir Knights. There are many ways that we can do that. Again, part of that vision is that every Christian Mason must be a Knight Templar. Not ought to be, not should be, not it would be nice if they were, they must be given the opportunity to become a Knight Templar. We really need to work on that Sir Knights. We all need to be about that business.

I would like to see this Grand Encampment, your Grand Commandery, and your constituent Commanderies be so good, and so well appreciated, and acknowledged by the general public, that Christian Masons in your jurisdiction would beg to be members of your organization. That is possible Sir Knights. But, it takes that ugly four-letter-word; work. We must all continue to work toward that aim.

How do we do these types of things? There are several points in which we can achieve this vision. Most of you know that I was involved for many years as a drill team captain and I learned many valuable lessons, but three were very valuable. Probably the first and most valuable lesson I learned as a drill team captain is that if you treat every man on your team with dignity and respect, he will do almost anything you ask. Dignity and respect. Second thing is you must train. If you are to be successful in any endeavor, you must train. There is a great lesson there for all of us in Templary. The next thing in achieving these visions is setting your goals and I perceive that you are setting goals within your Grand Commandery. If you do not have a goal, you are not going to accomplish much. In fact, it has been stated pretty succinctly that you never quite achieve your highest goal. If you do not have a goal, what are you going to achieve, you are not going to achieve very much.

The thing that we have preached for the past several trienniums is leadership, and leadership might be a misused word. I would like to ask you to reconsider being good managers. We need, in your Commanderies, in your Grand Commandery, and in the Grand Encampment, to be good stewards of that which we have been given. We need to manage the affairs of our Constituent Commanderies better than we have been doing. Sure, it is simple work, but it is very important work. To manage the affairs of a Commandery of Knights Templar requires all of the efforts of every one of its members and its officers. We need to be about the business of being good managers of our Constituent Commanderies as well as our Grand Commanderies.

Membership, our past Grand Master Blair C. Mayford had a program called Membership, Membership, Membership. It was a great program. Again, to achieve membership, it is that ugly four-letter-word, work. You befriend the Master Mason, you tell him our story, and you lead him to the door. It is not easy, but it can be done. The Masons in many of our meetings tend to have what I call the "whoa is me's", we want to bemoan how bad things are. But, you know it is not all bad, there are success stories, and I want to share a couple of them with you. One that is most recent, the Grand Commandery of Louisiana just reported a net gain of three. That is a high water mark Sir Knights, we have turned the tide. They have turned the tide in the state of Louisiana. We

are going through a downturn, these World War II veterans, and I am sure there are a lot of you here, are kind of reaching the end of their time. We took in over 150,000 Masons in Texas in a five-year period after World War II, now we are paying the debt which we must all pay sooner or later.

That is a theme that I want to go through and it is going to be trying, it is going to be difficult for us all, but it is not the end of this fraternity by any means.

The second success story that I would like to relate to you is a new Commandery which was established in Texas a few years back, which I opposed. I though it was a horrible idea; it was a little Commandery they were going to establish down in the far southeast corner of the state, in a place called Silsbee, Texas and I doubt that anybody in this room ever heard of Silsbee, Texas, based near Beaumont and Port Arthur. We had two Commanderies there; they were large Commanderies. At one time, they flourished, they did great work, but in the last twenty years, they have been declining every year, and they were basically dead. They were just sitting around waiting for the end to show up. So when the Grand Commandery Officers came around and said they were going to charter a new Commandery at Silsbee, I told them they had to be out of their mind. Well, they did it anyway and I am glad they did. They started this little Commandery in a place that is kind of in a no-mans-land, a no-York-Rite-Masonry-land, of southeast Texas with 25 Sir Knights. Today, they have 100 members and have 10 petitions in waiting. Sir Knights, it can be done if you choose to do it. You can turn your Commandery around if it is one of those dead Commanderies.

Membership has two words which describe the work, or how you succeed with membership. One is you work, but the second one is, to retain your members, you must care. If this is to be a successful organization, then we must be an open, caring organization. We must care about every member who is on our rolls and we must show them that we care; we have not done that enough. We rode the good times and we had so many people that we did not have time to keep up with them all. Well now, we have lost a good number of them; our biggest problem has been dimits and suspensions, but I am telling you what you already know.

The Knight Templar Eye Foundation is doing very well and I ready by your report that you have done exceptionally well this year bringing in funds for our 36th Voluntary Campaign. It is over basically at this point. We did not quite reach a million dollars but we beat last year. It makes me feel very good that we have accomplished that. I congratulate you for what you are able to accomplish here with your Knight Templar Eye Foundation funds. I would like to commend the Sir Knight that put together the Golf Tournament for the Knight Templar Eye Foundation or your York Rite charities here in Missouri. I will tell you that we have done something similar in Texas and we have raised as much as \$1,500 to \$2,000 out of a golf tournament.

Holy Land Pilgrimage, unfortunately with the problems in the Middle East, I have to take the stand that as long as the United States State Department says do not go there, we cannot go there. We have investigated alternate trips to parts of the world where maybe Paul journeyed, Greece and Turkey.

On behalf of Dr. William Jackson Jones, he asked me to please, again, express his thanks to all of you good Sir Knights from the Grand Commandery of Missouri for your support for the 62nd Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment this past August.

Some of you may know, there are some new rules and regulations, if you will, for the Knights Templar Education Foundation. If you have not seen them, you will be seeing them shortly. We are encouraging, not demanding, those Grand Commanderies who no longer wish to be in the loan business to get out of it and get into a grant/scholarship business. But, that is your choice, it is your Grand Commandery, your division, your funds, and you must make that decision

Most Worshipful Grand Master, it is wonderful to see the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of any jurisdiction sitting in a Grand York Rite meeting as you have done, and showing support for the York Rite bodies of your state. We do commend you, wish you well, and congratulate you for a wonderful term.

Right Eminent Sir, thank you and your lady. On behalf of my lady Arlene and me, it has been wonderful to be here. I will have other words for you later tonight relative to your grade on your inspection. I am here to inspect your Grand Commandery. Sir Knights, we have some Grand Commanderies who are on thin ice. They ought to be about the business of doing their work. You ARE about the business of doing your work. I congratulate you sir on all the things you have done, your presence at many of our meetings, the Easter Observance and the Department Conference. We do appreciate the courtesies and hospitalities that you have extended to Arlene and me.

My final words are the words of our Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Texas. Sir Knights, it is not a song until you sing it, it is not a bell until you ring it, and I can tell you it is not Freemasonry until you live it. So, get out and live it up. May God bless the Grand Commandery of Missouri. Thank you Sir Knights.




