GRAND YORK RITE REPORT

To the Companions, Sir Knights, and Grand York Rite bodies of the State of Missouri:

The attached outline depicts a direction which suggests itself for helping to rescue the York Rite of Freemasonry in Missouri from additional decline and possible demise. That direction rests upon the most solid ground for ensuring future success with any endeavor, and that is education. There seems to be no stronger light at the end of the York Rite of Missouri's tunnel, and that light appears to be growing more brightly as time passes.

Some may not wish to involve themselves in any preservation plan involving education. Education takes time, and people are understandably skeptical of launching on prolonged voyages. But brethren, the fact remains, when we became Freemasons we came aboard together for an exciting, ambitious, long term adventure. Our ship continues to steam toward its destination of improving the world one man at a time beginning with ourselves. This is our mission, and our York Rite crew will either train itself for how to better make it across this ocean together in increasing numbers, or we, together, in ever-dwindling numbers, shall disappear beneath its waves.

Some may choose to envision this plan as being one person's pet project, which it is not. It is simply a series of solutions which suggest themselves from what was discussed at Grand York Rite officers meetings held during the last two years. It is too all-encompassing for any one Freemason or appendant Masonic body to lay claim to it. Again, this is not my plan, nor is it anyone else's plan. But it, or something like it, needs to become integrated into the workings of the York Rite of Missouri or our team might just as well remain in the locker room and forget about taking the field.

What this outline does is define what it is going to take to get our arms around the major areas of concern to our survival. This, as one might expect, is a gradual task which will require beginning at the beginning and occupy several years. My only contribution to it has been to repackage and amplify what was already discussed at the meetings and use it to lay out the goal posts and foul lines of a playing field upon which York Rite Freemasons in Missouri can play and win in the future. The field outlined here did not need me to suggest itself. Any insight reflected in this outline was derived from frank discussions among all attending Grand officers of the challenges facing us and the constructive input of all. While it will take several years to bring any significant blueprint to realization, the time for wondering what it is going to take to get back in the game and take the lead appears to be over. The alternative, based upon present trends, is to find ourselves forever wishing for a brighter future.

REPORT OF AUDIT COMMITTEE

Companions and Sir Knights,

The committees met with the Grand Secretary/Recorder and Grand Treasurer on March 15, 2009 at the Grand York Rite Office to review the financial transactions of the Grand Chapter, Grand Council and, Grand Commandery.

The Committee found no appreciable discrepancies in the tabulation sheets maintained by the Grand Secretary/Recorder or the Grand Treasurer.

Two rather large expenditures, one for \$300.00 and one for \$477.50, were noted by the Committee. These would ordinarily have not been a matter of concern. However, they were not included in the budget adopted in 2007. Furthermore, there was no documentation indicating that these expenditures had been submitted to Finance before they were made.

All elected officers are cautioned that expenditures above that authorized by the adopted budget must be referred to the Finance Committee for review and approval prior to payment.

The Committee laments the loss of one of its long standing members, Companion and Sir Knight Paul Cannon, who has chosen to pursue other endeavors for which we wish him the best. Paul has been a staple on these Committees for quite some time and, with his knowledge of processes, has been quite successful in the training of other members of the Committee, most notably, this Chair. We are very sorry to lose him but respect his decision.

We were most pleased to welcome, and to have in attendance, currently serving elected and advancing Line Officers of both the Grand Chapter and the Grand Commandery. May this not fall on deaf ears in future years.

Recommendations:

1. Move the date for the audits closer to the end of the Grand York Rite fiscal year to avoid scheduling problems. The Committee suggests sometime during the month of July or August.

2. Get serious about resolving the records storage situation.

3. All warrants should include a corresponding document that supports the expenditure.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATIONS:

(Joint Report for Grand Chapter, Grand Council, and Grand Commandery)

To the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri: To the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of Missouri: To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri:

Companions and Sir Knights,

It is with no little anxiety that I begin this report with a recommendation that this committee be discontinued. While in the early years of the development of electronic communication systems, the committee had a well-defined mission of exploring how such systems could be employed to enhance the delivery of correspondence. Currently, the use of email for inexpensive nearly instantaneous distribution of information is routine and really needs no further development.

At some point this committee seems to have taken on the development and delivery of web-based services. While a committee of web-savvy members was undoubtedly useful in the early stages of development, the Missouri York Rite web site is now well established. Management by committee, in my opinion, is a detriment to speedy routine maintenance. This singular duty should be assigned to a member of the York Rite who has demonstrable expertise in web site engineering and will act as the web master for the site with responsibility and authority to make actual changes to the site once such changes have been approved presumably by a combination of the Grand Secretary/Recorder and the corresponding Grand Officers.

More recently it has been suggested that the Committee take on the development of a Missouri York Rite membership data management system. However, with the advent of the Grand Encampment membership data management system, a homegrown solution is no longer necessary. It has also been suggested that the committee focus on the development of an electronic forms system. The aforementioned Grand Encampment system holds the promise of eventually eliminating the need for monthly reporting forms of any kind. In addition, the Chairman researched enterprise-level electronic forms distribution and management systems, but concluded that the autonomous distributed nature of our organization would not allow the implementation of off-the-shelf solutions. In addition, the development of enterprise-scale information technology systems, in my opinion, is best achieved by a design team of trained software engineers who can frequently meet in person. Such development is nearly impossible by a widely dispersed arbitrary committee. That is not to say that there are not several small-scale solutions that are both simple and inexpensive, but development and implementation can easily be managed by the Grand Secretary/Recorder with the help of local members.

In conclusion, my recommendation should not be interpreted as resulting from dissatisfaction with either the current members of the committee or a lack of progress by the committee. I sincerely feel that we were given the task of defining the universe and providing two examples.

Companions and Sir Knights,

Membership Database: Joyce and I are very thankful to Ronald E. Wood, Jr., our previous Grand Secretary/Recorder, and his staff for starting the process of converting the membership cards to Excel for active membership. For those who cannot possibly appreciate the undertaking, I assure you that this was no easy task and it has made our job much easier. Joyce and I have added much to their efforts by merging those three databases into one. For several years, the Grand York Rite of Missouri has toyed with the prospect of developing a joint membership database, develop web based monthly reporting forms, and creating annual returns which would be easier to complete by Secretaries/Recorders.

With regard to the membership database, our unwillingness (or inability) to proceed due to various complexities, many creative aspects, differences in design and development strategies, and more importantly a lack of money, has actually provided the time necessary for a solution to present itself. Although many of us scoffed at the drastic increase in Grand Encampment per capita, they had many plans which may not have necessarily been effectively communicated to all jurisdictions. Although some are forthcoming, one has come to fruition, a membership database.

The Grand Encampment started the design and development of a Commandery membership database several years ago. The new Commandery membership database is already available to all jurisdictions and we (Missouri) are preparing for

a data import and validation process as of the writing of this report. Currently, Sir Knights may already sign in to the new York Rite Information System by logging into <u>https://www.masonic-web.com/membership/gekt/Login.aspx</u>, entering your name, Grand Commandery, and date of birth.

Through the efforts and suggestions of several Grand Secretary/Recorders, and the willingness of the Grand Encampment leadership to be flexible in achieving some of its goals, particularly with this project, they have taken into consideration many of the ideas and suggestions and have allowed this project to transform into a total York Rite Membership Database for those jurisdictions who choose to participate.

How does this affect Missouri? Through our efforts in working with the Grand Encampment in the design and development of the database, Missouri will be permitted to "buy-in" at an extremely reduced rate than say other jurisdictions. This reduced rate is much less than that set aside for our project so the "buy-in" is already funded.

This total York Rite Membership Database will encompass all aspects of the membership data which we (GYR Office) track with regards to Chapters, Councils, and Commanderies, and the details of each member.

Where does it go from here? After we merge and validate all of our current (active member) records, we will start training for all Secretaries and Recorders. This training will teach each of you how to make membership changes on line as those changes occur, thus negating the need for any form of monthly reporting (yeah!). Additionally, Secretaries and Recorders will input information such as officers, dues structures, any form of additions and separations of membership, etc. Additionally, new reporting mechanisms will be available such as full membership reports for any organization, printing of membership mailing labels, statistical reports, automatically generated annual returns, and much more. We will address all of this in the training yet to be scheduled. The grand officers will also have access to some of the statistical information as well. Needless to say, we are very excited about this new tool.

The Grand Encampment was already moving into requiring all Commandery Recorders to have access to the database on line. By Missouri's migration of the Chapter and Council records along with the Commandery, this means that all Secretaries/Recorders must have access to the on line database. This does not mean that they have to do it themselves, the organizations may appoint an assistant secretary/recorder to assist those who don't have access. But, it would be in the best interest of each organization if we started the full migration to fully on line secretaries/recorders as we move into the future of reporting processes.

Georgia is scheduled to go first and they have a meeting in June which Joyce and I will attend to see how they handle all aspects of deployment. Missouri is scheduled to be next.

Our understanding is that once Missouri's membership is uploaded, other organizations may also buy in to use, such as York Rite Colleges, AMD Councils, etc. Since your Missouri member is already in the database, you will be allowed to add them to your specific organization and manage them from your standpoint as well. Then, as address and email changes occur, they will be current for all organizations that print mailing labels for that particular member. They won't be able to change any information that does not pertain to them, only their membership in that particular organization. More on this to come.

It will be critical for all secretaries and recorders to start collecting and updating email addresses from all of their members, as well as magazine editors to encourage members to update their own information as it changes.

Companions and Sir Knights, it is unfortunate, but unless someone can explain differently, it appears that some Secretaries and Recorders are not following some very simple instructions outlined in the Edicts and General Orders of our presiding grand officers, that of including line items of dues notices for each of the charities, collecting those monies, and forwarding them to the GYR office. Of course, this does not preclude those donations made during this grand session which we surely hope to see.

Certificates: We can tell from the list of 25/50 year certificates issued that several organization Secretary/Recorders have difficulty in monitoring veteran membership dates as extremely few request certificates for 25/50-year certificates (40 in the Commandery) from this office. We would respectfully ask that they contact this office no less than annually to find out who is due, have the certificates created, and then make every effort to have them properly presented in a special open Chapter/Council/Commandery called for this very purpose, to honor those who have come before us in due and proper form. Hopefully (as addressed below) with our new database system, we will be able to prepare the certificates in advance and mail them to the Secretary/Recorders. I thank Paul R. Cannon for taking the time and effort to back up and do all certificates due to the members of Sedalia York Rite Bodies. If Secretary/Recorders need help, they really need to ask us.

Communications: Communications across the state, although better than they used to be, still leave much to be desired. We cannot stress enough that when Chapters, Councils, and Commanderies have degree work or special activities of interest, they need to let the office know. We receive so many requests for information about degree work, but without knowledge of where work is being conferred, we have nothing to offer those interested. Additionally, we need to know as far in advance as possible. Telling us two or three days before is not sufficient time. We would respectfully ask that anyone having knowledge of any notable activity please let us know by dropping us an email, fax, or letter.

With regard to the posting of activities on the web site, we try to publish the calendar monthly. We ask that other organizations who have known meeting dates and times please let us know as soon as they are set so they can be posted as well. We expect to have an updated web site and calendar within the next few months which should make posting of events much easier and timely.

Additionally, it appears that everyone assumes that someone else will or has already advised us of items of interest, especially deaths of past grand officers, widows, etc. In many cases, we get little or no notice. Please, we would rather have too many calls than none at all.

York Rite Brochures: During the past GYR year, we completed the production of some 120,000 printed brochures consisting of the new Missouri York Rite brochure, the York Rite Charities brochure, and the Missouri Masonic Family map. We purchase custom printed brochure holders to go along with the brochures. As of this date and thanks to the efforts of the Grand Lodge of Missouri, they mailed 100 copies of each brochure and 3 brochure holders to 134 lodges with mailings going out daily when they making mailings to each lodge. This saved the GYR a great sum of money and also carried the weight of the Grand Lodge, hopefully encouraging brethren not to simply throw them in the trash. We specifically thank the Grand Secretary, Ronald D. Miller, and his staff for assisting the Grand York Rite with this overwhelming task.

We are already receiving many petitions on the new forms so we can only assume that they are having some positive effect. The true test will be at the closing of this calendar year when the returns start to come in, hopefully our new membership numbers will be up.

Notice: This office has become aware that an organization calling itself "The Knights Templar Organization" has been sending communications, namely to widows, advising them of an "award" they are eligible for after they "secretly elected her to membership". A fee of \$25.00 is required to process the award. I would caution all Secretaries/Recorders to routinely communicate with all of their membership and all of their widows that no such solicitations will ever be initiated by any Masonic fraternity and that they should be extremely cautious of anything which requests money of them. We thank the Grand Lodge for bringing this to our attention.

Storage: Several very large tasks yet to be addressed, primarily due to funding and staffing, are the need to reduce our annual storage costs by:

- 1. scanning in all historic annual returns
- 2. scanning in all historic membership cards
- 3. authorizing the Grand Secretary/Recorder to sell or throw away items in storage which are not needed

4. database entry of all information contained on historic annual return and membership cards in order that they no longer have to be maintained

At some point, the GYR must make a decision as to the disposition of each of the items above, and if necessary, fund special projects to complete them.

Audits: We continue to experience difficulties with some Chapters, Councils and Commanderies with regard to returns of annual audits. Companions and Sir Knights, we all understand that we are Masons, but we have responsibilities which we must be cognizant of when it comes to supervision of our subordinate and constituent organizations. It should be acknowledged that in the past several years we have experienced several situations where Secretaries and Recorders have displayed less than Masonic behavior when handling their organization's money. It is my strongest suggestion that:

1. the appropriate grand officers and/or committees ensure that audits are being completed with the full knowledge of the organization and in due and proper form, presented to the organization at a regular meeting, and recorded in the minutes – reports of such audit standings may be found in the tabular statements of the Grand Secretary/Recorder

2. organizations having total assets of more than \$10,000.00 require the Treasurer and Secretary/Recorder to be bonded and that such annual bonds be forwarded to the Grand Secretary/Recorder for proof of compliance and document recording

3. annual organization budgets and financial reports be forwarded to the presiding grand officers and/or appropriate committees and the Grand Secretary/Recorder for review of the financial health of each organization – and where organizations are failing, that the grand officers take whatever appropriate action as may be required to ensure the financial stability of those organizations

4. that the appropriate regional/district grand officers review all of the above no less than semi-annually and report their findings to their presiding grand officer

Companions/Sir Knights, we have stated endlessly that there are two separate and distinct aspects to the operation of our subordinate and constituent organizations, the ritualistic side and the business side. If the business practices of the organization are not as healthy as the ritualistic side, the organization is doomed to failure. I would encourage each incoming presiding grand officer to establish a joint/collective committee of individuals to review our business practices of these organizations, evaluate how to best correct bad practices, develop an appropriate plan of action to correct such practices, and immediately implement such action plans. It is also necessary that the regional/district grand officers be intensely involved in the evaluation and corrective action processes outlined by the grand officers and follow up with the grand officers as progress is made.

990 Tax Returns: This office is of the opinion that many Chapters, Councils and Commanderies have not and are not filing the appropriate 990 tax returns as required by all organizations and respectfully requests that the presiding grand officer and appropriate committees take action to require each subordinate and constituent organization file with the Grand Secretary/Recorder verification of their having filed a return and said verification to be reported by this office to the grand officers and included in an annual report.

Web Site: The web site is a sore subject for many. For those unaware, it takes a great amount of time and care to maintain a site as "complex" as ours. Although this is not the responsibility of the Grand Secretary/Recorder, I created the site several years ago as a medium of information and education. Now it has grown into a monster and the monster has taken on a life of its own. Thankfully, finally, some in our organization have taken up the ball and are running with it. They are already working on bringing the GYR into its next phase of electronic communications and we look forward it.

Assistant Grand Secretary/Recorder: It is my suggestion that an Assistant Grand Secretary/Recorder be appointed to work with the Grand Secretary/Recorder's office to take care of items which need a more timely action than currently provided, namely Jurisdictional Communications, Grand Representatives, subordinate/constituent by-laws, and dispensations. Simply put, there are not enough hours in the day. I only wish we could afford to pay for those services. Hopefully, as time and overhead decreases with the new membership database, the need for an assistant will be less vital.

Appreciation: I would like to personally thank Aaron Shoemaker and his "team" for creating the new Grand York Rite logos which you see on the front of this document and which will be used from this point forward for all official communications. I would also thank Russell S. Hanson for his years of teaching, coaching, coaxing, and tightening the reigns on me when needed. Regardless, he is a wealth of technological wisdom as well as his fraternal achievements which shall not go unrewarded or unnoticed. We also appreciate our unofficial grand photographer, William R. Brantley.

Finally, I thank Paul R. Cannon for his tireless efforts in helping Joyce in the office, along with his lady Weatia who completed the inventory of the GYR library this year, totaling some 800 books, pamphlets, videos and DVD's.

For those of you who work with the real grand secretary/recorder, you all know that lady Joyce is the best thing that happened to all of us. Let her know you appreciate her hard work and dedication to our fraternity. Without her, we would all be lost.

In closing, it was a privilege and honor to work with our Grand High Priest, Grand Master, and Grand Commander this year, they were absolutely delightful to work with and they have truly taken responsibility for our organizations and are leading us into a positive future. Next year's officers have some mighty big shoes to fill; we pray they are up to the task.

PARTIAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JURISPRUDENCE

To the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the *Constitution at ARTICLE VI, Officers, Section 1*, be amended by styling the existing paragraph as "A" and adding paragraph "B", to wit,

B. Nominations for Grand Master of the First Veil shall be entertained at the time called for the election of officers. Past Grand High Priests may collectively select a single individual and introduce that individual to the Grand Chapter by means of a brief, verbally presented biography. Each Chartered Chapter, legally represented and registered with the Credentials Committee, may select and introduce one Companion by means of a brief, verbally presented biography.

THIS SECTION CURRENT READS: The elective officers of this Grand Chapter shall be elected by ballot, and by a majority of the votes cast for that purpose, at each annual convocation.

IF AMENDED THIS SECTION WILL READ:

A. The elective officers of this Grand Chapter shall be elected by ballot, and by a majority of the votes cast for that purpose, at each annual convocation.

B. Nominations for Grand Master of the First Veil shall be entertained at the time called for the election of officers. Past Grand High Priests may collectively select a single individual and introduce that individual to the Grand Chapter by means of a brief, verbally presented biography. Each Chartered Chapter, legally represented and registered with the Credentials Committee, may select and introduce one Companion by means of a brief, verbally presented biography".

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: The Grand Chapter has for the past several months taken under consideration the numerous concerns voiced by the general membership as regards the current process used in the election of Grand Line Officers at each annual convocation. For the most part the main concern appears to be the confusion that exists in the selection of an individual to the station of Grand Master of the First Veil. Let it be said that the Constitution and By-laws of the Grand Chapter are silent as to any specific process other than to state in the Constitution at ARTICLE VI, Officers, Section 1, "The elective officers of this Grand Chapter shall be elected by ballot, and by a majority of the votes cast for that purpose, at each annual convocation.

DISPENSATIONS

- July 15, 2008 Granted dispensation, authorizing another ballot in the balloting for candidates at Joplin Chapter No. 91 after suspected irregularities in the previous ballot were brought to my attention.
- August 26, 2008 Granted dispensation, to East Gate Chapter No. 136 to hold its election and installation of officers on Thursday, September 4, 2008. The June, 2008 meeting did not have a quorum present to perform these functions.
- December 1, 2008 Granted dispensation for Orient Chapter No. 102, RAM to move their regular stated convocation from Wednesday, December 17, 2008 to Friday, December 5, 2008 at 6:30 p.m.
- December 17, 2008 I granted permission for the removal of Jefferson City Chapter No. 34 to move from its temporary location at 2432 Tanner Bridge Road, ,Jefferson City, MO to its permanent location at 3211 Masonic Court, Jefferson City, MO.
- January 16, 2009 I issued a dispensation for Moberly Chapter No. 79 to hold an election of officers on February 10, 2009

DECISIONS

- January 10, 2009 I directed that the use of a nominating committee be instituted to make nominations of qualified individuals for the stations of Master of the First Veil. This would serve to eliminate the confusion of who to vote for during the elections of Officers in the Grand Chapter. There was nothing in the Grand Constitution to prohibit this action.
- January 10, 2009 The decision was made to send back to William F. Kuhn Chapter No. 109 RAM the matter concerning the mismanagement of Chapter Funds. It was decided that this should be handled on a local Chapter level.

January 10, 2009 The move date for the removal of Meridian Sun Chapter No. 61 from Carthage, MO to Alba, MO was

extended until completion of their new quarters.

April 1, 2009 The Grand Chapter has for the past several months taken under consideration the numerous concerns voiced by the general membership as regards the current process used in the election of Grand Line Officers at each annual convocation. For the most part the main concern appears to be the confusion that exists in the selection of an individual to the station of Grand Master of the First Veil. Let it be said that the Constitution and By-laws of the Grand Chapter are silent as to any specific process other than to state in the Constitution at ARTICLE VI, Officers, Section 1, "The elective officers of this Grand Chapter shall be elected by ballot, and by a majority of the votes cast for that purpose, at each annual convocation."

After lengthy discussion, it appears that some sort of a limited nominating process for this station would be an appropriate response. Several suggestions have been discussed and taken into consideration.

Two of these appear to be the most predominant. The first suggests that the Past Grand High Priests, having prior experience and knowledge in this matter, should have some expertise and input. The second suggests that the Subordinate Chapters themselves, having first hand knowledge of their memberships, should also have some input and be able to participate in the process as well.

The first suggests that the Past Grand High Priests form a "committee" of sorts and meet on the eve prior to the Annual Convocation for the purpose of discussion of potential candidates to recommend for the Station of Grand Master of the First Veil, select a speaker, decide on a single individual, and present that name along with a brief nominating recommendation to the assembled membership during the Convocation the following day.

The second suggests that any Subordinate Chapter desiring to place the name of one of its members in nomination for the station of Grand Master of the First Veil prepare a brief written nominating recommendation and present same to the credentials committee. The Chapter making the nomination must have legal representation at the convocation and must be registered with the credentials committee prior to making any such nomination during the Convocation. Such legal representation and proper registration along with the written nomination will be reported to the Grand Chapter during the preliminary report of the Credentials committee.

It appears that co-mingling of the two would be most appropriate. It is therefore my decision that both suggestions as presented above, shall be instilled into the election process for Grand Master of the First Veil for the upcoming Grand Convocation in May 2009.

This decision is to be mailed to each Past Grand High Priest and the High Priest of each Subordinate Chapter within this Grand Jurisdiction. The High Priest of every Subordinate Chapter is to insure its reading in its entirety at each meeting of his Chapter from receipt up to and including the last meeting immediately prior to the Grand Convocation and shall certify such initial reading to the Grand Secretary.

The consolidation of Copestone Chapter No. 33, RAM with Uel Chapter No. 129, RAM was approved by me on November 20, 2008.

The consolidation of Ralls Chapter No. 55, RAM with Hannibal Chapter No. 7, RAM was approved by me on March 18, 2009.

On October 17, 2008, I arrested the Charter of Marceline Chapter 118, RAM because the Chapter had not met for over a year, made annual returns or paid per capita dues for 3 years.

Edict No. 1

The chairman of any committee having oversight of or receiving any funds designated for charitable purposes or that were originally the property and assets of this Grand Chapter shall file a report with the Grand Secretary as to such receipt and the disbursement thereof with the Grand Secretary not later than April 1, 2009 for proper accounting purposes.

Edict No. 2

High Priests in this jurisdiction may, at their discretion, be covered while presiding over their Chapters. The Grand Lecturer may, at his discretion, call a meeting of the ritual committee to review the current ritual for the purpose of examining a suggestion that the wearing of a cover by a high priest while presiding over his chapter shall be made mandatory. Should the committee, after examining the issue, determine that the wearing of a cover should be mandatory, the Grand Lecturer shall prepare and submit a proposal to amend the ritual for a vote of the Grand Chapter as required in the By-laws of this Grand Chapter.

MASONIC TIME CAPSULE

On June 29, 2008, I visited the Masonic Time Capsule at Branson, Mo with Edgar Coonrod the Grand Master of the Grand Council and J. Joseph Hayes the Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery and his lady Sue. We found the site to be well maintained by the neighbors.

CONFERENCES AND RITUAL

I attended three conferences this year and asked other Grand Officers to represent me at the others. I enjoyed the programs that were presented at the conferences but was disappointed that more of our younger members did not attend. Those members attending were "the choir" or the backbone of our organization.

Ritual in our Chapters is a major concern because of the number of companions that use the pocket edition to read

their parts instead of committing their part to memory.

STATE OF THE CRAFT AND RECOMMENDATIONS

We continue to be supported by those loyal companions who are dedicated to seeing that the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri succeeds. However, we have some areas that require our continued attention to ensure our future success.

We continue to lose members and have been unable to turn the corner toward increasing membership. We must do 1. some of the following in order to counteract the outward flow:

- We must cultivate new members by having those people, that we feel will want to join the York Rite, petition the Blue Lodges. We must nurture them through the Blue Lodge and then into the York Rite.
- We should contact former members who have demitted or were suspended and ask them to become members again.
- We need to follow up with candidates after they have received their degrees to see if they have any questions and • offer to pick them up for the next meeting.
- We should not hasten to make them a line officer but give them time to know the members and the operation of our ٠ Chapters. We often scare them away by pushing them too fast.
- We should contact our members before a conferral and ask them to come to the initiation. This will impress the candidate more than a lot of empty seats which could cause him to question his decision to join.
- We should learn our ritual for our parts. Our commitment and dedication to the organization suffers when we have to read our parts out of the pocket ritual.

We either have a lack of knowledge or are ignoring the provisions of the Grand Constitution of the Grand Chapter in 2. the following areas:

- Some Chapters do not hold monthly meetings and when they do, they do not open or close using the prescribed ritual required by the Grand Constitution.
- Some Chapters are not sending in their Annual Returns and Per Capita payments on time.

We should move toward banning the use of the pocket ritual book in opening and closing the Chapters or in the 3. conferral of degrees.

The above areas of concern will require our future leaders to step up to the task before them. We as Royal Arch Masons must tackle the task before us and we will succeed.

For those Chapters that share a meeting night with a Council and a Commandery the function of all three bodies 4. suffer. If it is possible to have a single night for each body their performance in administration and ritual should improve because they will have more time to devote to these aspects.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT

It would be impossible for any Grand High Priest to operate the Grand Chapter without the support of dedicated members assisting him. Thankfully, I have been blessed with the support of all the Grand Officers, and all of my appointees including the District Deputy Grand High Priests, the District Deputy Grand Lecturers and all of the Committee Chairmen and Members that performed their work in an outstanding manner. To each of them I say well done and thanks for all of your hard work on behalf of the Grand Chapter and myself. Thanks also to Joyce Sample for her assistance in providing me information on a timely basis.

A "Special Thank You" to Ginny Goede and Sue Hayes for their work in setting up the 2009 Grand Session in Jefferson City. Thank you to Lon Goede, Edgar Coonrod and Joe Hayes for their valuable council whenever I needed it. Thanks also go to Ginny Goede and Keystone Chapter No.146 for arranging my reception in July of last year.

REPORTS OF GRAND SECRETARY

To the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri:

(See Joint Report for Grand Chapter, Grand Council, and Grand Commandery, page 13)

As of May 1, 2009, we have yet to receive the annual returns of Hannibal Chapter No. 7 and Lone Star Chapter No. 30. Lone Star has not submitted a report since 2005.

Regrettably, we lost three Chapters as outlined in the address of the Grand High Priest.

The reports on Chapter audits and bonds can be found in the tabular statements of the Chapters. Of the Chapters reporting, five failed to submit an audit or submitted an incomplete audit: Hannibal No. 7, Rolla No. 32 (due to illness of Secretary), Bethany No. 80, Joplin No. 91, and Mt. Nebo No. 148. This office cannot stress enough to the officers of each of these Chapters the importance of their complete knowledge of their organization's financial condition. Each should be followed up with to ensure there is no appearance of impropriety on the part of the Secretary or Treasurer.

In accordance with **Section 104A.** *Annual Audit.* There shall be a complete and careful audit of the financial affairs of each subordinate chapter and of the books, accounts, and vouchers of the Secretary and Treasurer and of others handling, and having in charge, money or property of the chapter. Such audit shall cover the period from the last previous audit up to and including the thirty-first day of December of each year. Upon his election, or as soon thereafter as is possible, the High Priest-elect, shall appoint an auditing committee of three or more members, whose duty it shall be forthwith to audit the books and accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer and Secretary of the chapter. If the chapter has trustees, or other custodians of property or funds, then their books, accounts, and vouchers shall also be audited, and the securities or other property checked, inspected, etc. The books, accounts and vouchers of any other officer, member or committee may also be designated by the High Priest-elect, and may be subject to an audit.

With regard to the April 1, 2009 Official Decision of the Grand High Priest which also stated: *The High Priest of every Subordinate Chapter is to insure its reading in its entirety at each meeting of his Chapter from receipt up to and including the last meeting prior to the Grand Convocation and shall certify such initial reading to the Grand Secretary.* Only two Chapters complied with the Grand High Priest's request to notify the Grand Secretary, that being Mexico Chapter No. 27 and Uel Chapter No. 129.

Joyce and I thank all the officers and members of the Grand Chapter for the opportunity to work with and serve each of you.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

To the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Missouri:

This Committee urges every Royal Arch Mason in Missouri to familiarize himself with the content of the 2007-2008 Report of the Grand Chapter Committee on Education appearing in the 2008 Proceedings, and to study and encourage the use of the educational papers which this Committee produced during the 2007-2008 Grand York Rite year. In placing two papers entitled Officer Tools and To Reach Inside Ourselves on file with the Grand York Rite office, the Committee addressed the current condition of the Craft, gave it an honest appraisal, defined leadership as eleven skill directions in which our York Rite Grand and constituent Chapter officers need to be growing, and laid out a solid scheme for how to think through many of the major issues facing the fraternity. In addition, knowing that improving performance of the ritual is universally desired, and recognizing that there is far more involved in "learning the ritual" than memorizing floor work, what to say, and when to say it, the Committee placed on file a third paper entitled Six Keys to Performing Effective Ritual which addressed several of these key areas of involvement. The Committee's mission this year was to see that the material in these three papers might become more generally known and reach more of those who most need them.

Some outstanding examples of dedication and service are being set by our current group of District Deputy Grand High Priests, and they are to be commended for it. There are still some Chapters however that either have not had the requirements explained to them, or lack the interest to apply, for the Distinguished Chapter Award. Because the requirements are subject to change from year to year, deputies should not presume that explaining them is unnecessary. For any active, functioning Chapter meeting continually, the requirements are not difficult to satisfy, provided that its officers know far enough ahead what is expected of them and they commit to following through as a team. During this Grand York Rite year, and at the request of the Grand High Priest, the requirements were changed to take in two additional items: 1) at least four meaningful Masonic or non-Masonic educational talks appropriate for the time of the year and/or the needs of the members, and 2) for the Chapter to have submitted on time a properly completed annual return to the Grand York Rite office with the required audit and per capita/fee payments, plus fines if applicable, owed to the Grand Chapter. Each High Priest continues to be responsible for the completion and submission of his own Chapter's application. Blank applications for downloading and printing continue to be available from the document library of the Missouri York Rite web site.

Considerable initiative and industry has been exercised this year with the educational programs presented by certain constituent Chapters at their regular convocations. Topics have ranged from the most basic and critical information with which the membership needs to be acquainted to in depth explanations of Biblical and other interesting subjects closely related to Royal Arch Masonry. The High Priests have done their best to fulfill all that was expected of them this past year, and we congratulate them for having served their Chapter. The recommendations of this Committee are as follows:

1. that, until a more comprehensive training document can be made available, the three above mentioned papers be studied, saved, and used to teach constituent and Grand officers about their responsibilities, accountability, what they need to know, and know well, about being officers, what they need to be studying, and what they owe the constituent bodies;

2. that the District Deputy Grand High Priests, in preparing for their Regional York Rite Conferences, consider selecting individual sections from these three papers and using them to develop an outline for a flexible program

(See 2008-2009 Report of Grand Chapter Committee on York Rite Conferences); invariably something contained in these three papers generally applies, or is related to, problem resolution as required by our respective York Rite bodies.

3. that the District Deputy Grand High Priests, when making their official visits, review the requirements for the Distinguished Chapter Award, one by one, and the proper procedure for filing the application, once yearly with the Chapters under their superintendence, and to encourage the High Priests in their respective regions to apply for the Award; official visits made as early as possible in the Grand Chapter year are therefore strongly encouraged;

4. that all completed applications for the Award be submitted first to the District Deputy Grand High Priest in order for his signature to be affixed to the application before it is forwarded to the chair;

5. that the requirements for the Award be converted into a point system to allow the constituent Chapters the freedom to complete the requirements for the Award with different activities rather than having to slavishly follow a set pattern (it is proper, for example, for those Chapters who have been extraordinarily active in conferring the degrees to receive credit for this where credit is due), provided however, that the requirements of a minimum representation at important York Rite events, support of Royal Arch Research Assistance, and submission of an on-time completed annual return with required audit and fees/per capita payments, be kept mandatory;

6. that Grand officers not only read, study, and save the Proceedings, but follow up on the ideas and recommendations made in the Committee Reports;

7. that Grand officers take full advantage of the guidance this Committee is making available to them and utilize the available materials;

8. that Education for Preservation become the focus of a combined Grand York Rite effort to provide essential solutions and to address membership decline; where there is education there is interest, and where there is interest, the waters are stirred to stimulate membership;

9. that this Committee collaborate in the future with the Education Committees of the Grand Council and Grand Commandery in developing a training document for a common program of education for teaching constituent and Grand York Rite officers about

- a. reorganizing the way we do business
- b. creating management methods where none currently exist
- c. managing dysfunctional organizations including reforming the management structure in the State
- d. providing a quality experience for the membership, and

e. maintaining the prestige of holding York Rite membership so the world at large can better see us

for what we are;

10. that a designated Education Officer and Assistant Education Officer in each constituent York Rite body in Missouri be made a requirement by edict or general order; and

11. that recommendations numbers 8, 9, and 10 be supported and promoted in perpetuity by all Grand presiding officers of the York Rite of Missouri.

PROPOSED LEGISLATION

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Ritual be amended by adding an ERRATA page to list the omissions, additions and/or corrections as noted below:

1. On page 1, add a new paragraph following the last paragraph on the page to state, "Dress-Royal Arch aprons and jewels".

2. On page 11, at paragraph 7A.(3), at the very end of the line, change "D.D.H.G.P.(s)" to D.D.G.H.P.(s) so that line 7A.(3) will read, "Local D.D.G.H.P.(s), then other D.D.G.H.P.(s)".

3. On page 50, at the very bottom of the page, move "MAR: Follow me." to page 53, between the last line of the Mark Master's Song and "MAR: How much did you receive?" and making "MAR: Follow me." a new paragraph.

4. On page 54, in the parenthesis immediately under "RESUMING LABOR", change the page number from "18" to "20" so that the wording within the parenthesis will read, "See page 20".

5. On page 63, at the 9th printed line from the top of the page, change "am" to "may" so that the 9th printed line from the top of the page will read, "RWM: How will you dispose of it that I may come to the knowl-".

6. On page 114, at the 11th printed line from the bottom of the page, change "to" to "do" so that the 11th printed line from the bottom of the page will read, "RAC: How do you expect to gain admission?".

7. On page 122, 25th printed line from the bottom of the page, add, "the" between "of" and "Law" so that the 25th printed line from the bottom of the page will read, "JES: Let us read further from this Book of the Law".

PROPOSED LEGISLATION

BE IT RESOLVED THAT *ARTICLE IX, Revenues of the Grand Chapter, Section 40, Annual Dues*, be amended by styling the existing paragraph as "A" and adding paragraphs "B" and "C", to wit,

B. The Secretary of every Chartered Chapter will cause to be written and provided to each Companion on its rolls, including those whose dues have been remitted, 50 year members, and those that are endowed, an annual dues notice on which are written line items for the suggested voluntary contributions for the charities that are supported by the Grand Chapter. Such line items should include, but may not necessarily be limited to Royal Arch Research Assistance (RARA) with a suggested contribution of \$3.65. The Grand Secretary will issue each Subordinate Chapter a number of Penny-a-Day stickers to affix to the dues card of each Companion that donates at least \$3.65 to RARA. Subordinate Chapter Secretaries will affix such stickers to the Companion's dues card and send it to the Companion. Contributions collected are to be forwarded to the Grand Secretary, the check written to the Grand Chapter of Missouri, with a notation in the memo field designating the charity for which it was collected and in a timely and efficient manner.

C. The Secretary of every Chartered Chapter and the chairman of any committee having oversight of the receipt of charitable contributions, donations of any kind, and bequests will report to and send to the Grand Secretary a written report of such charitable contributions, donations of any kind, and bequests so that documentation will be maintained

for Missouri to receive credit for and the recognition it deserves. All checks shall be issued to the Grand Chapter of Missouri, with a notation in the memo field of its designated use.

THIS SECTION CURRENT READS: Every chartered Chapter shall annually pay to the Grand Secretary, for the use of the Grand Chapter, twelve dollars and fifty cents per capita for each member borne on the rolls of the Chapter, on the 31st day of December, preceding the annual convocation of the Grand Chapter, plus the per capita of the General Grand Chapter.

IF AMENDED THIS SECTION WILL READ:

A. Every chartered Chapter shall annually pay to the Grand Secretary, for the use of the Grand Chapter, twelve dollars and fifty cents per capita for each member borne on the rolls of the Chapter, on the 31st day of December, preceding the annual convocation of the Grand Chapter, plus the per capita of the General Grand Chapter.

B. The Secretary of every Chartered Chapter will cause to be written and provided to each Companion on its rolls, including those whose dues have been remitted, 50 year members, and those that are endowed, an annual dues notice on which are written line items for the suggested voluntary contributions for the charities that are supported by the Grand Chapter. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: Standing Resolution No. 6, adopted on May 15, 2008, and Standing Resolution No. 7, adopted on May 15, 2008, addresses the issues of contributions and voluntary contributions. It has been observed that some Subordinate Chapter Secretaries have ignored these Standing Resolutions. Perhaps a more formal presentation under the Constitution and By-laws will capture their attention. This will also codify the requirement for reporting by any committee chairman having responsibility for the receipt of funds on behalf of the Grand Chapter. This also will aid in the record keeping for charitable organizations under 501 of the IRS Code.

When such joint convocations occur, the membership of each Chapter must be notified in advance per their Chapter by-laws. It will not be necessary to obtain a separate dispensation each time any of these events may occur, however, it is necessary that the Grand High Priest and Grand Secretary be informed in advance of these events.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT ARTICLE X, Standing Committees, Section 47, Duties of Committees, Subsection D,

The Committee on Jurisprudence, be amended by styling the existing paragraph as "A" and adding paragraph "B", to wit, B. The Committee on Jurisprudence shall, from time to time, either at its own volition or upon the prompting of others, review the Constitution and By-laws paying particular attention to the omission of words or phrases, lack of capitalization, doubled wording, misspelling or other obvious error. On making such observations, the Committee shall

IF AMENDED THIS SECTION WILL READ:

A. The Committee on Jurisprudence shall consider the decisions made by the Grand High Priest and all questions of law and report a brief statement of its findings for the action of the Grand Chapter.

B. The Committee on Jurisprudence shall, from time to time, either at its own volition or upon the prompting of others, review the Constitution and By-laws paying particular attention to the omission of words or phrases, lack of capitalization, doubled wording, misspelling or other obvious error. On making such observations, the Committee shall notify the Grand High Priest, Grand King and Grand Scribe of its findings. On review, the Grand High Priest, Grand King and Grand Scribe may order that a correction(s) be made so long as the original intent or meaning of the Section (s) is not affected by the change. The Committee on Jurisprudence shall note the occurrence (s) in its annual report to the Grand Chapter and if no objection appears, such changes shall automatically be made without benefit of the presentation of a formal resolution.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: Minor errors in the Constitution and By-laws have come to the attention of the Committee from time to time. Amendment of the Constitution and By-laws normally requires a resolution, the preparation of which can be burdensome, confusing and time consuming. The Committee feels this process is unnecessary in certain circumstances in light of a minor change as addressed in the resolution that does not affect original intent or meaning.

Those district/regional officers who helped to schedule and conduct a York Rite Conference in their respective Regions this year are to be commended for their dedication and industry. Many issues of critical importance to the future of

York Rite Freemasonry in Missouri received discussion at these events. Based upon its successful implementation in all seven Regions, this year the Committee continued making use of the York Rite Conference Regional Report Form developed by the Grand Chapter during the 2007-2008 Grand York Rite year. This Form was mailed to each member of the Committee, and replies were received from all seven Regions.

Region 1 was the first to hold a scheduled Conference. There were only nine attendees at this event. Those who attended were one Grand presiding officer, two past Grand presiding officers, two district/regional deputies, one past presiding officer, and three presiding officers representing, respectively, the three constituent York Rite bodies which meet in Shelbina. While no program was conducted, the attendees stayed and had some useful discussions.

Region 2 reported thirty three in attendance with two Chapters being represented. Mitchell Chapter was represented by thirty one of the attendees. The other two attendees were from Bethany Chapter. Discussion touched briefly upon York Rite charities, awards, membership, youth programs, jurisprudence, education, and the annual Grand session. The program was compact and finished an hour early.

Region 3 reported four Chapters represented by thirty five in attendance. The program was well presented using four speakers. Topics discussed included membership and retention, the need to improve performance of the ritual, and practicing what Freemasonry teaches. An excellent talk on leadership and the responsibility of a leader was presented. The need for improved communication was also discussed. In particular, the need to get word out in a timely manner about where, when, and why, especially as it has to do with completing requirements for the Grand Chapter Distinguished Chapter Award, the Grand Council Merit Award, and the Grand Commandery Honor Commandery Award, was stressed.

Region 4 reported thirty in attendance, eight of which were Grand officers. All six Regional Chapters and four Chapters outside the Region were represented. After the Grand officers present were introduced, the Grand High Priest discussed what local initiatives the Chapters are taking to gain membership and the educational programs they are conducting, many of which are including leadership training for higher office. The Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary were present and discussed the workings of their respective offices, what the various funds are for, what they do, what the Grand York Rite does for the membership, and how it works on their behalf. An open discussion followed in which everyone was encouraged to contribute their own thoughts and feelings, and different viewpoints were expressed. There was feedback from everyone, and with ten Chapters being represented, it gave everyone a chance to hear about nine other Chapters, their revitalization, and what they were doing.

Region 5 held the last scheduled Conference. Attendance and representation of constituent Chapters was not reported. Six dedicated York Rite Masons which included, among others, the Grand High Priest, Grand Lecturer, Grand Secretary/Recorder, and Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee were on the program and spoke on a number of important subjects which included, but was not limited to, pending Grand York Rite legislation, the ritual, membership, and declining attendance.

Region 6 had twenty in attendance at its Conference, with all three of its own regional Chapters and two Chapters outside the region being represented. The Council and Commandery Regional Deputies presented a particularly good program using five speakers. Several important issues were discussed having to do with improving the quality of the York Rite experience. These issues included, among other things, the importance of encouraging the new member, learning the ritual and delivering it from memory, providing entertaining education at every meeting, showing leadership by setting the right kind of example, maintaining continuity from one Grand York Rite year to the next, improving cooperation between constituent bodies in the conferrals of the York Rite degrees and orders, and establishing and maintaining a visible presence in the local community. There was considerable participation from the sidelines at this Conference, with different viewpoints being expressed.

Region 7 reported six Chapters represented by about forty who attended, six of which were new Chapter members. Several papers were presented at this Conference relating to a single issue, viz. membership. Topics covered how membership decline was being handled in other States, the effects of dues increases, membership retention and recruitment, and what the future holds. While this Conference narrowed its focus, the papers presented were well done and well received.

Since the 2007-2008 York Rite Conference Committee Report did not reach most of the membership until its official publication in the 2008 Proceedings, and then only by searching its pages, the possible effect that its message might have had to stimulate interest in attending this year's round of Conferences cannot be known. As this Report in now in print, it is unnecessary to repeat its message here. Considerable input from the sidelines was noted when a flexible program with provision for deviations was utilized. From the perspective of input from the attendees, the flexible agenda offered an advantage over the more tightly prescribed, formal agenda in stimulating that input. By working from a rough outline those on the sidelines commented frequently and even took the discussion in directions in which they currently had their greatest concerns. The resulting participation, interaction, and being exposed to differing viewpoints caused them to come away with their understanding broadened from the wide range of issues addressed and the variety of opinions heard.

The recommendations of this Committee are as follows:

1) that district/regional officers begin six months in advance to think about and plan an interesting, flexible Conference agenda that is different from year to year;

2) that every district/regional officer adopt a proactive rather than reactive role with respect to this thinking and planning;

3) that every district/regional officer be included in the staging of these Conferences;

4) that district/regional officers avoid reiterating at the Conference the same information which members expect to hear at official visits;

5) that district/regional officers permit Conference attendees to share their views on important York Rite issues at these events, even if this involves the agenda moving in unplanned directions,

6) that, based on its successful implementation over the last two years, the use of the York Rite Conference Regional Report Form continue, and

7) that officer education be included in every Conference program (See 2008-2009 Report of Grand Chapter Committee on Education).

REPORT OF GRAND HISTORIAN

NE PLUS ULTRA

The Masonic "Crown Jewels" and Other Invitational/Honorary/Ultra-Masonic-Bodies in the USA by Ernest R. (Randy) Spradling

INTRODUCTION

In 1492, when Columbus sailed the ocean blue, there was a limited view, at least among the lay folk, that he world was flat; if one sailed out to the edge of then world, one would fall off! Many of the "world" maps of the pre-Columbian days would simply show the land areas with nothing but ocean surrounding these masses, implying that one would fall off the Earth if one attempted to venture further. Some cartographers would note along the map edge, Ne Plus Ultra for "Nothing More Beyond."

Freemasonry is a fraternal order that has under its umbrella numerous bodies and rites established throughout the world. Not all rites are practiced in the United States: for example, the practice of the Swedenborg Rites is limited to the Scandinavian countries of Europe. Conversely not all degrees being practiced in the United States see the light of day in other parts of the world.

These various rites, grades, degrees, or orders, are usually divided into two major camps; the Universal grades are available for every Master Mason to join without having to be invited, while Invitational orders require the neophyte to be invited. Examples of Universal Freemasonry beyond the Craft Degrees include the 29 additional degrees practiced under the auspices of he Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, the seven degrees that compose the American Capitular and Cryptic Freemasonry, Knight Masonry as practiced in Ireland, and some of the invitational bodies with British origin, such as the Allied Masonic Degrees. The subject of this paper is the various Invitational orders that are practiced in the United States.

While some of these Masonic Orders were present in the United States in the 19th Century, many other came to our shores in the early 1930s. Further discussion will be presented near the end of this paper showing the reason for his influx of new Masonic bodies.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

This paper began as a Power Point presentation developed for presentation to the Scottish Rite Valley of Fort Myers, Florida in February 2007. It originated as an update to a paper written and presented by VB Richard Meacham PSM KCRBE. Also included in here references was an Ohio Chapter of Research article called "Fringe masonry" by VB Louis Van Slyck PSM KCRBE and Doug Jordon's revised history of Knight masonry, as well as numerous web sites.

Lest a reader be concerned with some pints presented in this paper, no Masonic secrets are divulged here. All of the information came from published sources that are available to any researcher, including World Wide Web.

MASONIC HONORS

There are numerous honors under the Masonic umbrella. This presentation arbitrarily divided them into four categories: Grand Presiding Officer, Distinguished Service, Presiding Officer in a Constituent Body, and Invitational /Honorary.

The first category is self-explanatory: no higher honor can be stowed on a Freemason than to be selected by his peers as the First among Equals, no matter what body is bestowing that honor. Titles include Most Worshipful Grand Master and Sovereign Grand Commander.

The second category is also self-explanatory: these are honors for longtime service to the Fraternity and/or to one's community. These honors are generally for service "above and beyond the call of duty." Some have several grades associated with them. Examples include Knights Templar Cross of Honor by the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar, he Grand Cross of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction, the Council of Nine Muses of the Allied Masonic Degrees, the Society of Blue Friars, and the Gold Key award from the Grand Chapter Royal Arch Mason in Florida. This could be the subject of another paper.

The third category consists of the various Chair Degrees for the bodies. To preside over a constituent body is the highest honor that can be bestowed on a member by his peers. Titles included Worshipful Master, Excellent High Priest, and Eminent Commander. Some systems have multiple chair degrees: the Royal Arch, as practiced in England, has three! Again, would be a good subject for another paper.

The final category is the Invitational/ Honorary Body group. As the category name implies, membership in these groups is by invitation only, and cannot be solicited: usually open solicitation can result in being "Blacklisted' form future consideration. There are several reasons for this:

• Some of these bodies have member population limitations.

• Many of these bodies emphasize the social/convivial aspects of the Fraternity that, from some perspective, and would not be appreciated by some more conservative Masons.

• Some of these bodies emphasize research into areas that may hold little interest to some or our Brethren; and

• Many of these bodies have a history of prestige and cachet that the members are trying to preserve.

Generally, to be considered, one must be an active contributor to the well-being of the Universal bodies in which one is a member and which may be prerequisite, be appreciative of knowledge "beyond the mainstream," be willing to promote peace and harmony, and be seen as one who would contribute to the group to which one is invited. These bodies are considered to be for the active membership (5 percent-ers), not for the card-carriers that contribute nothing to their bodies beyond dues payment. This way, being invited to, and accepting, membership in any of thee bodies then becomes an honor because one had to be perceived as a contributor to the Good of the Order in order to be considered in the first place. It is also an obligation to live up to the expectations of the group.

Even among the Invitational/Honorary Bodies, there is a perceived hierarchy of attainment. This unofficial hierarchy goes by different names, depending on who is espousing the list. These names include "Crown Jewel" and "Second Tier," among others. The Hierarchy is usually determined by the number or prerequisites, whether membership limitations exist, the amount of gravitas exhibited by the members of these bodies, and what performance level is expected from an invitee before and after the invitation is accepted.

For purposes of this paper, I am going to use "Grown Jewels" and "Cadet Groups." The latter name was chose to represent the status level of groups because it was consistent with Monarchical Aristocratic Hierarchy, with its Royal and Cadet Houses. The Cadet Groups usually have minor membership requirements and the constituent bodies usually have no membership population limitations. While some of them may be desirable, they are usually appreciated for their own merits and not so much for any perceived cachet. The Crown jewels, on the other hand, are usually perceived as having considerable prestige, have major performance and extensive tenure requirements, and have stringent population limitations. Many of these also have membership prerequisites, not only of Masonic affiliations, but also some even have religious requirements (unusually Christian).

Please understand that I am not casting aspersions on any group: prestige, like beauty, is in the eye of the beholder. What may be a Cadet Group to me may be the ne plus ultra for someone Else. The groupings were arbitrarily selected because of that human tendency to categorize things.

THE CADET GROUPS

The following bodies comprise this paper's American Cadet Group:

- 1. Grand College of Rites (GCR, USA)
- 2. Knight Masons
- 3. Allied Masonic Degrees (AMD)
- 4. York Rite College (YRSCNA)
- 5. Commemorative Order of St. Thomas of Acon.

Grand College of Rites

The Grand College of Rites is a sort of Masonic research group that is open to membership for all Master Masons who are members of regularly recognized Masonic Lodges. While is doesn't conform to the Invitational/Honorary model per se, it is relatively obscure group: usually one was made award of its existence through word of mouth. Once upon a time, an Aspirant had to go to its Annual Meeting, generally held in conjunction with Allied Masonic Week, to be Obligated. Recently, the Grand College of Rites has dispensed with that requirement.

Historically, the Grand College o Rites was formed by Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction, when that latter body subsumed the Ancient and Primitive Rite of Memphis and Mizraim. The current body constituted in 1932 with the mission to study the history of Masonic degrees not under control by other authorities, to collect and preserve the rituals of defunct bodies, and to eliminate :sporadic efforts to resuscitate or perpetuate Rites, Systems and Orders of freemasonry in the Untied States, except to bring them under the control of the Grand College of Rites.

It eventually became a repository for various defunct Masonic Degrees and orders, with the purpose of presenting ritual texts for study by Masonic scholars. These rituals texts then become part of its annual publication, Collectanea. There are no constituent (Local) bodies: any group study is done either as a correspondence circle or in other bodies, such as Allied Masonic Degrees.

Knight Masons

The Knight Masons is an Invitational body in the United States, but in Ireland, its Mother jurisdiction, it is considered to be the ne plus ultra of Universal Freemasonry. There is really only one prerequisite: the nominee must be a Mark Master Mason and a Royal Arch Mason; in Ireland, there is also a one-year tenure requirement following Exaltation. There is no religious requirements, and there are nor population limitation in constituent Councils.

There are four degrees under this system: three member grads and a Chair Degree. The degrees were originally worked in Ireland in the Knight Templar Preceptory. They are closely similar to the Red Cross of Babylon that is practiced in the Knight Templar Commanderies in the United States and the 15th and 16th Degrees of Scottish Rite, as well as similar degrees under the Supreme Grand Chapter of Holy Royal Arch Masons of Scotland and the Allied Masonic Degrees of England.

The Knight Mason degrees came into this country in 1932 under Irish jurisdiction. The Irish Grand Council ruled over the American bodies until 1967, when the Grand Council of the United States was formed. There are presently 95 constituent bodies, with about 9,000 members, in the United States. The Grand Council of Knight Masons USA is in fraternal amity with its Irish counterpart and the Scottish Royal arch Grand Chapter. Although the British allied Masonic Degree system contains the Red Cross of Babylon, neither the Irish nor America grand council is in amity with that group: the British AMD does not require its members to be Mark Master Masons.

ALLIED MASONIC DEGREES

The Allied Masonic Degrees is an Invitational Research and Social body in the United States. Like any invitation and honorary bodies, one must be a Royal Arch Mason before being invited. This is consistent with most of the degrees and orders having British origin, because the British believe that one has not completed the Master Mason until one has been Exalted in the Royal Arch degree. No sectarian religious is either express or implied.

Although similar bodies existed in the United States in the late 19th Century, this incarnation was formed form the British Isles in 1932 (although there was another group that existed having it origin in 1982). It was originally formed to act as a repository for side degrees outside the Masonic mainstream that were occasionally practiced in constituent Lodges. There are nine degrees, plus four Chair Degrees, that are practiced in the US Councils.

There are presently about 450 local constituent bodies in the United States with a bout 8,000 Brothers. Each Constituent council is limited to 27 members. The constituent population was kept small to foster closed ties between the members. Most Councils have an attendance requirement, and almost all Councils require members to contribute at least one research paper on a Masonic subject some time before attaining the Chair, Copies of the papers are sent to the Grand Council, where the best papers in the country are selected for publication in the Miscellanea.

York Rite College

The York Rite College is an Invitational Service Fraternity that is also a working Masonic Body. It is American in origin and one of the youngest, having been started in 1957 in Detroit, Michigan. Membership is by invitation only, and one must be active in one's Craft Lodge, Royal Arch Chapter, Cryptic Council, and Knight Templar Commandery before being invited. Some have unofficial requirements that one must be a past presiding officer in at least two of the prerequisite Masonic Bodies before being invited.

As stated earlier, it is service fraternity. Each companion Knight is expected to continuer serving the fraternity in some capacity as well as contributes effort in his community. There are about 400 Constituent bodies with about 12,000 Companion Knights in the United States, Canada, the Philippines and Brazil. There is on limit to the number of members a College may have.

St. Thomas of Acon

Ye Commemorative Order of St. Thomas of Acon is an Invitational and Honorary Body of British origin that was started in 1974 after researcher found documentation of the original Order's Installation Ritual while doing other research on early Operative Masonic Guilds. Membership is by Invitation only (a somewhat unusual occurrence in British Masonic circles), and one must be a Royal Arch Mason and Knight Templar before being considered.

As its name expresses, it commemorates the original British Order of knighthood that was founded in the name of Thomas Beckett, Archbishop of Canterbury and fought in the Crusades. It is in the growth and formation mode – from 12 Chapels and fewer than 500 Sir Knights worldwide in 2000 to about 70 Chapels worldwide and about 1,700 Sir Knights as of September 2007.

Although this growth appears to b fast, it is in fact slow, resulting from several impositions. Only two Sir Knights are installed per meeting and generally only tow meeting occur per year. The Constituent bodies are limited to between 30 to 40 Sir Knights: when these thresholds are reached, the Chapel is required to split and form a new one of about 16-18 Sir Knights each. Although it is relegated in some Brothers minds as "Cadet Group," this one should be watched: it is a potential future "Crown Jewel"; that cold surpass the prestige of some of the more mature groups.

The Crown Jewels

The following groups and titles constitute this paper's Crown Jewels:

- 1. 33° (Inspector General)
- 2. Red Cross of Constantine (RCC)
- 3. Knight York Cross of Honor (KYCH)
- 4. Royal Order of Scotland (ROS)
- 5. Knight Commander of Court of Honor (KCCH)
- 6. Knight Red Branch of Eri (KRBE)
- 7. Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests (HRAKTP)
- 8. Order of the Purple Cross of York (OPC)
- 9. Masonic Rosicrucians (MSRICF)
- 10. Chevaliers Bienfaisant de la Cite' Sainte (CBCS)

These are presented in any order of precedence. The latter two are really Ultra-Masonic, a term that will be explained later.

33° (Inspector General)

The ne plus ultra of Ancient and Accepted Scottish is the 330 Inspector General. It is an invitational and honorary body of the strictest sort. To be considered, one must have an extensive service record in one's Scottish Rite Valley, Freemasonry in general, and one's local community. In the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States, an invitee must also be a Knight Commander of Court of Honor (KCCH) for a specified period. The number of 32° Masons in the Valley generally limits the number of honors given. Selection is made on recommendation by the Active Inspectors General to the Sovereign Grand Commander. There are about 11,000 Inspectors General in the United States.

Red Cross of Constantine

The highest perceived honor in York Rite Freemasonry, as practiced in the United States, is the Red Cross of Constantine and Appendant Orders. For many this is the ne plus ultra of the York Rite. It is one of the oldest Invitational and Honorary bodies practiced in the United States, having been introduced from Britain in the later 19th century (1870).

The Red Cross of Constantine requires the prospects to be both Royal Arch Masons and Trinitarian Christians. It is a working Masonic body where in are worked Five Orders, and two Chair Orders. There are about 200 constituent Conclaves in the United States with about 8,000 Knight Companions; Local bodies are limited to 25-75 Knight Companions each.

Knight of the York Cross of Honour (KYCH)

The Knight Cross of Honour is a working Invitational and Honorary Service Fraternity with American origin, having been started on March 13, 1930. In order to be invited, one must have presided over his Craft Lodge, Royal Arch Chapter, Cryptic Council, and Knight Templar Commandery. Additionally one should have exemplary service record while progressing through the chairs in these four bodies.

As stated earlier, it is not only an honor but is also a service fraternity: the recipient are urged to continue working toward the health of their York Rite bodies. This is similar to the York Rite College's mission, and is probably the latter group's emphasis on service.

Only to other Orders are practiced: one is the Installation and there is a Chair grade for the Prior. Constituent priories are normally limited to one per grand jurisdiction, although some exceptions have been made for larger states. There are about 12,000 recipients in the US.

Royal Order of Scotland (ROS)

The Royal Order of Scotland is a working Invitational and Honorary Masonic Body that has British/Scottish origin, It is one of the oldest Invitational/Honorary bodies in the United States, being introduced in the later 19th Century (1877, although some apocryphal evidence purports its existence in this country during Colonial times); it also had the distinction of being considered one of the oldest Masonic working extant.

A Prospect must be Master Mason for five years, a 32° Scottish Rite Mason and/or a Knight Templar, and must be a professed Trinitarian Christian. The Work is presented n tow parts. There is only one Province in the United States, with no local constituent bodies; however, some local social groups have formed clubs known as Clans. There are about 8,000 members in the United States.

Knight Commander of the Court of Honour (KCCH)

The Knight Commander of the Court of Honour is a singular honor of the Ancient & Accepted Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction that is bestowed on certain 32° Scottish Rite Masons for exemplary service in Freemasonry and

communit8u, particularly to the Scottish Rite. An invitee must be 32° Scottish Rite Mason at least four years. While it is an honor to be bestowed, it is not a reward for services rendered; rather, it is an exhortation for continued service. There are approximately, (?) Knight Commander of the Court of Honour in the Southern Jurisdiction.

Knight of Red Branch of Eri (KRBE)

The Knight Red Branch of Eri is the highest honor that can be bestowed on a Brother of this Allied Masonic Degree. It is of Irish origin by way of England. The Red Branch of Eri has six grades: three are worked in the Constituent Councils, and three are conferred by the High Council. The highest constituent grade is Knight.

For a member to be eligible, he must have been in the Allied Masonic Degrees for seven years and have an exemplary service record. Formerly, two were given each year, one of whom was the Sovereign Master as he left office and the oldest living member of the council who was not already a recipient. Under the current statutes, only one is supposed to be conferred each year. There are about 4,000 Knights pf the Red Branch of Eri in the United States.

Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priest (HRAKTP)

The Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priest is a working Invitational and Honorary Masonic Body. It is British in origin, but was introduced to this country in 1931 by way of New Zealand. A prospect must be Past Commander of a Knight Templar Commandery and have an exemplary service record. There are 33 grades in the body—on paper, that is;' only one is ever exemplified.

The number of Constituent Bodies in a Grand Commandery jurisdiction is limited to one Tabernacle per 21 Commanderies or part thereof. Each Tabernacle is limited to 33 Knights Priests each. There are about 2,500 Knights Priests in the United States.

Order of the Purple Cross of York (OPC)

The Order of Purple Cross of York is the highest honor that the York Rite College can bestow. Like its parent group, it is American in origin. The recipient must have an exemplary service record in ALL of the York Bodies as well as the College that submitted his name.

The number of Purple Cross recipients in a constituent York Rite College is limited by the number of Companion Knights in the College and the number of current recipients. There are about 1,500 living recipients n the United States.

Masonic Rosicruciana (MSRICF)

The Masonic Societas Rosicruciana in Civitas Foederatis is an Ultra Masonic Honorary Body. By "Ultra Masonic" it is meant that it is out side the normal workings of Freemason. The Masonic Rosicruciana is an Invitational Research and Social Group of British origin by way of Scotland. It is also one of older Honorary bodies, having it roots of establishment in the later 19th Century. An invitee must be a Royal Arch Mason a Trinitarian Christian.

There are nine grades in the Masonic Rosicruciana. Advancement through the grades is based on time in grad and learning experience. The highest grades are limited in attainment. The Research papers generated by the members lean more toward the esoteric and mystical aspects of Freemasonry than to the historical.

There are about 55 Constituent Colleges in the United States, and a College membership population is limited to about 72. There are about 1,800 living members in the United States.

Chevaliers Bienfaisant de la Cite' Sainte (CBCS)

The Chevaliers Bienfaisant de la Cite' Sainte is another Ultra-Masonic Honorary Body. It is of Swiss/French origin and was brought into the United States around 1932. This body requires its members to profess the Christian Religion. Historically, it is a descendent of the Old Rite of Strict Observance titled the Scottish Rectified Rite, and as such is Masonic Martinism.

Before the proliferation of the World Wide Web, little information was available about this obscure group. Its existence was kept in the shadows, even to the point that its members would not acknowledge either the CBCS or reveal themselves as members if challenged by ou9tsides. Part of this reticence may be attributed to presenting internecine struggles cause by injured feelings among Brethren who felt they deserved invitation but were not. According to information collected from several Web articles, there are six CBCS Grand Priories worldwide, with 81 members per Grand Priory. In the United States, the membership is composed almost of entirely of Past Grand Commanders.

If the reader notes, many of the latter-day Invitational/Honorary bodies came into this country around 1932. If one looks into world history in the early 20th Century, one will note that the First World War and, along with France and Great Britain defeated the Germanic Central Powers, in 1918. That same year, the Bolshevik Revolution put Communistic Socialist Theory into practice. By 1930, a world-wide economic expression was drastically affecting world politics. A humiliated postwar Germany had just elected as it Chancellor an Austrian named Adolph Hitler, and he way pushing his own brand of Socialism. Mussolini came into power in Italy and brought Fascism to the forefront.

The ideology of all these Socialist governments were inimical to the principles of Freemasonry because they viewed the Fraternity as a part of the Establishment and as a competing force. Since they considered assimilation impossible, they set out to eradicate the competition. Since the United States had historically been a stronghold of Freemasonry since the lat 1700s' consideration was given to preserving the CBCS among some American Freemasons in order to preserve the organization.

After the decision was reached to preserve the CBCS, it was decided among the American Masons that perhaps it would be prudent to get authorizations from various bodies to set the others to work as well. The rest, as they say is history.

CONCLUSION

As is clearly shown in the preceding paragraphs, there is more beyond Craft Masonry and Universal Masonry. What they all have in common is that one must be invited to join these groups. The true honor to a Brother is to be invited by one or more of these groups. A Brother should not actively seek membership to any of them; doing so may result in a blacklisting from the honor sought.

Also, a Brother should not pick and choose which invitations he will accept, because there is considerable overlap of membership among these groups. There is a high risk that turning down an invitation proffered by one body may also curtail being invited by the other bodies.

One should be cautioned that these bodies are neither merely notches on a belt, nor should they be considered merit badges or gold watches. They are for those who labor in the Craft with no hope of fee or reward. If one follows when one is called to follow, and lead when one is called to lead, invitation to these honorary bodies will come one's way: "he that is greatest among you, let him be the younger, and he that is chief, as he doth serve."

An invited Bother should not expect to be allowed to set down his working tools; he is expected to actively participate after initiation, both in the Universal bodies and in the bodies to which he is invited. The true reciprocal honor a Brother makes is in accepting the invitation, appreciating the efforts make by the members in portraying whatever ceremonials are presented, being actively involved in the group, ever remembering the elite, and not elitist, status enjoyed by the members.

"WHERE ARE WE GOING TO GO FROM HERE?"

Can this intriguing subject be difficult to comprehend as well as to determine what to say about it? Thomas Freidman book, "The World Is Flat", quotes a Michael Hammer who is a businessman organization consultant who once remarked about an organization in decline saying, "One thing that tells me a company is in trouble is when they tell me how good they were in the past." You don't want to forget your identity. And I'm glad you were great in the fourteenth century. But that was then, and this is now. When memories exceed dreams, the end is near."

MEC James Williams who edited the Volume four of the History of Royal Arch Masonry. MEC Williams began the book with a tribute to Jerry Marsengill, by John Mauk Hilliard.

I assume there are some here who remember Jerry Marsengale. Jerry was a very learned Mason from Iowa. He was a GHP, editor of the Philalethes Magazine for a many years, but in that tribute to Jerry Marsengill, there is this line: "In his later years, (this was about twenty years ago), Jerry some times mentioned privately, "Freemasonry has out lived its usefulness to society."

Out of these two things what do we do? We go into mourning. (Leaves podium for a brief period to signify mourning.)

Rocky Weaver says that I can do more than mourn. There are some things to be done!

The future of Freemasonry. What it is the future of Freemasonry? A question that is being asked with increased frequency at Masonic gatherings. It does not mean that men are losing or have lost faith in Masonry. But they are beginning to realize its latent powers, and to the possibilities of an instrument in social services and betterment of humanity. Everything advances, improves broadens, and Masonry must keep step in the march of mankind or step aside.

Between those who will let nothing alone or those who will allow nothing to be improved, there is a middle path of caution, progress and development. But if we do not conserve what we have, we cannot improve it, nor can we really conserve it without constantly improving or applying it. Therefore, if young men can serve Masonry and make it effective for the higher end they must be taught what Masonry is hence to become what was taught to us in the past, and what it is trying to do in a tangible and turbulent world. So and only so, can they wisely conserve its holy historical tradition and apply its spirit and teachings and the present."

You might think whis was written this year, it was written by James Newton in *The Builder* in May of 1915. They were having the same problems as we are having today. There was mention made this morning of the Odd Fellows. It is my understanding that in 1915, there were more Odd Fellows in Missouri that there were Masons. There are now in Missouri less than 3,000 Odd Fellows. What does that tell us? I don't know for sure.

I want to talk a little bit about what has happened to our membership in the last 20 years. The membership in the United States according to Masonic Service Association, last year (2004), was 1,617,032. There is also available in the fall of the year what the membership of each state is. Missouri's membership was 52,000, but it does not, however, show duplications.

In 1959, Masonic membership was 4,100,000 Masons, in 1993, there were 2,371,000.

In a very short period of time we have lost a million members. There has been a lot of things said about what can be done. Reading a report by one of the appendant organizations holding a session to analyze their position, and what they wanted to do.

They came up with 13 images that they wanted to portray:

The first image they wanted to convey was to find ways to integrate the fraternity. We hear this so often. There has been many efforts made by many Grand Lodge groups to promote Masonry, and it is still going on.

The Conference of Grand Masters in a sense maybe the parent of Masonry in this country. Main object of the Conference of Grand Masters is to elect Five Boards that show some interest in Masonry. The one board has been elected, the George Washington Masonic Memorial. This group was started in 1912. The George Washington Masonic Memorial it itself is just a monument in Arlington Virginia our Washington D.C. The members of that board are Past Grand Masters.

The next group that became a part of the Conference of Grand Masters is the Masonic Service Association which was founded following World War I. Its records start in 1923. They elect commissions and all are Past Grand Masters.

I am introduced as Chairman of the Commission of the Masonic Service Association. That is the most important position that I have held.

Masonic Service Association has three major functions. Until recently, they had only two major functions: To distribute educational material and collect and distribute relief. As of yesterday (September 15, 2005), the Masonic Service Association in response to the appeal that had been put out for Hurricane Katrina has contributed \$260,000 in funds. This money has been passed on to the Grand Lodges of Mississippi and Louisiana, and money is still being gathered.

At noon I was told, what the Masonic Service Association did for a lodge in South Carolina after Hurricane Hugo. The Masonic Service Association distributes income from their appeals to the Grand Lodges involved. The Grand Lodges pass it on to the local lodges in their respective states.

I have asked Carl Truesdale to come forward and relate the manner in which the Masonic Service Association helped them in South Carolina after Hurricane Hugo.

Carl Trusdale: My Masonic lodge was built in 1825 by Robert Mills who designed the Washington Monument. Our lodge building had a cedar roof on it. It was the original roof from date when it was built. The Marquis de Lafayette visited the building in 1825, and we had a celebration in honor of Baron DeKalb. This building is on the National Register of Historic Buildings. The body was re-interred from a cemetery to a church in town. A lot of historic things happened at that particular time. In 1989, Hurricane Hugo came ashore between Charleston and Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. The lodge was located 125 miles inland. It was thought that the lodge might escape damage, but the sustained winds from the storm were 115 miles an hour. It took the roof off and caused much damage to the interior of the building. The limits on the insurance were not going to pay to make the repairs. The building being on the National Register of Historic Buildings, it had to be restored to its original condition.

If it had not been Masonic Service Association who sent a great deal of money to Grand Lodge of South Carolina which enabled us to put the roof back on as it was and improved it with copper flashing. The lodge was able to paint and cleanup inside and to replace paraphernalia for chapter and council. Twenty-seven swords were taken. They were on a rank in the building. Since the building was wide open, it was easy to do. The Masonic Service Association enabled them to get maintenance and repair done faster and easier. We will always be grateful for their help in overcoming problems with insurance and etc.

MEC Kinkead continues: About 1989 or 1990, the Conference on Grand Masters began to recognize the problems we were having and they sought advice from other Grand Lodges. They formed the Masonic Renewal Committee, and the Masonic Renewal Committee has been in place for almost twenty-years. They got off to something of a bad start. They hired a Professional Public Relations man from Boston, who was not a Mason. Things just didn't go very well for quite awhile, but they have printed a lot of material over the years to help the lodges: "75 Ways to Attract New Members," and etc. The Masonic Renewal Committee has been making an effort to do something about membership.

In 1993, the National Masonic Foundation for Children came out of the Conference of Grand Masters. They have been doing many things in many places: training teachers in grade school to recognize the symptoms of drug or alcohol abuse. They have a publication, "The National Masonic Foundation for Children, Prevention of Drug and alcohol Abuse."

CHIPS PROGRAM

Most Worshipful Brother Stanley M. Thompson, PGM had the foresight to ask the current Members of this MCF Board (2004) to think outside the box—to find some program that we could bring back to the Brethren that was both wanted and needed in our communities. He then afforded us the opportunity to attend the Grand Master's Conference in Washington D. C. to find out what children's programs were working in the other jurisdictions.

At that conference, we were introduced to (CHIPS) or Children's Identification Program presented by Brother David Harte. Doctor Harte (DDS) founded CHIPS' Program in Massachusetts, and it has since spread across the Northeastern Jurisdictions like wildfire. Massachusetts alone has identified over 200,000 children since the Program's inception. There are over 30 jurisdictions across North America that now provides some kind of child identification program. Twelve or more of those jurisdictions employ the CHIPS' Program.

The thing that makes the CHIPS Program unique is its five point program:

1. Malleable wafer: (The heated wafer is applied to the child and from it you get; perfect impression of the teeth; perfect scent sample; DNA sample which will last for 2 to 3 years if left in the baggie in which it is placed.).

2. Photos: At least 3 photos of the child, left, right, and front, additional if further distinguishing marks or

scars;

3.

Finger prints.

4. Through the use of a green light scanner, where a child just lays his or her hand on the reader, we are able to obtain the child's fingerprints. (Why was the infra-green scanner used instead of an infra-red scanner? The infra-red scanner had to be replaced with an infra-green scanner because the children recognized the "red" as being hot, and would not place their hand on the screen.) This method has the highest definition of the print possible to capture. This method can also be used on infants to capture a perfect print. It is the only method that will capture an infant's print clearly at this time.

5. A Rinker CD containing all pertinent information about the child, height, weight, age, hair color, eye color etc. 3 or more photos, plus the fingerprints. We also give them the original information sheet they filled out. We keep nothing.

Every forty-one seconds, a child is reported missing in the United States of America—over 660,000 last year alone. Nearly 5,000 children were reported missing in Missouri; just under 1,500 of those children were from the St. Louis Area. Kansas City reported nearly 2,000.

By providing parents of missing children with all the information they need in one small package, we increase the chances of safely returning those children to their parents, or heaven forbid, providing positive identification if needed. This sends a very important message to our children and communities—that the greatest fraternity on earth cares about ht children of or state. We are partnering with the Missouri Dental Association and Missouri law enforcement agencies to provide for the welfare and safety of our kids. The board of Directors for the Masonic Children's Foundation has unanimously decided to charge headlong into the CHIPS Program to make a positive difference to our local communities and state.

This program is envisioned to be and to become a grass roots volunteer program on the part of the lodges and their brethren as well as the local Missouri Dental Association, law enforcement agencies and other local service organizations that choose to participate in these events.

The Northeastern Jurisdiction has proven that this program will give us major television network and newspaper coverage. This will be a public relations blessing--unparalleled in Missouri. It is hoped that this "CHIPS PROGRAM" will put local lodges and Masonic Youth Groups back in the public eye. In Connecticut, 22 petitions were signed at one CHIPS event. Massachusetts, in one five week period, gained 52 new Masons—eight DeMolay and seven new Rainbow Girls. The CHIPS Program will attract and retain members for our lodges and Masonic youth groups, because we will again be out in front of and serving exactly the people we want to join our ranks.

In 2003, Children's Identification Program (CHIPS) was introduced in Missouri. Rocky Weaver: I had opportunity to be Chairman last year, as Junior Deacon of the Grand Lodge. It was privilege to go to Washington D.C. and be informed about the program. Basically, it is a five step program to identify children:

To this point we have run eight programs. In order to get that many done, the equipment needed to be assembled: computers, and other electronic devices secured.

This program is going to be big because it is putting Masonry back in the community working with the people that we want to be working with.

This is a program whose time has come. It is both wanted and desperately needed in our communities. It is simple enough so the smallest lodge can and should plan to host an event. It can also be expanded several lodges can come together and host a regional event it they chose.

In 1993, the Masonic Information Center connected to the Masonic Service Association was formed. We are fortunate to have member of that Masonic Information Center, SK Robert Davis, REGC of the State of Oklahoma.

SK Davis: The Masonic Information Center is the vision of Denise Robertson, the widow of John Robinson who wrote the book, "Born in Blood." Most are aware of John Robinson and the impact that he had on Freemasonry through his willingness to take on Anti-Masons around the country, with his expertise and knowledge, and quick wit, to neutralize many of their distorted claims that had been made about us by the leading anti-Masons.

At the same time, the Southern Baptist Convention decided to assault Freemason, and you all know the end to f that story. They fired a fellow who is now editor of the Royal Arch Magazine, Dr. Gary Leazer.

All of a sudden, the fraternity was getting threatened not only by the leaders of the Anti-Masonic on strictly profit motives, but also by main line right-wing fundamentalist church leaders. So John did such a wonderful job of positioning the fraternities' response to these things before the public. After his death, Denise wanted to leave his legacy with the fraternity to enable it to respond to any Anti-Masonic up-rising in the United States. Any need for public information regardless of what the situation is. She plans for 5% of the proceeds of the revenues of Brother Robinson's book to go the Masonic Information Center. She selected a task force which became a group and was adopted by the North American Conference of Grand Masters. What we do is, we put out a lot of Public Relations materials for Grand Lodges, if anything happens in a Grand Jurisdiction and they need a Masonic response to it, they can contact the Masonic Information Center and they will meet with the media, and to do anything the Grand Master needs to have done in response whatever the situation is that has arisen.

That have evolved to the point that now when national media source want to write and article, they call the Masonic Information Center. The Masonic Information Center has essentially become the spokesperson for the Masonic Fraternity. This is all done having received permission from the Grand Master of the Jurisdiction involved.

MEC Kinkead: There hasn't been another John Robinson. It was thought that Dr. Gary Leazer who was fired by the Southern Baptist Convention. But apparently, he didn't want to do so. There are some who think that Don Brown, the author of the "Da Vinci Code," who is writing another book that is going to be quite favorable to Masonry.

In 2004, a year and a half ago, the Masonic Information Center was assigned the subject of looking into some public awareness. A group was chosen to be that task force. John Boettjer, who is Editor of Scottish Rite Journal (Northern Jurisdiction), Carolyn Bain a consultant for public relations firm. She was young lady and a member of the Eastern Star also a very dynamic person. The members of the committee said she really raked their brains with the questions, she asked as they were being analyzed about what this fraternity was, is and hopefully what it is to become. Richard Curtis, Editor of the Northern Light, William Feingold, Public Relations Specialist from New York, Richard Fletcher, Executive Secretary of the Masonic Service Association, and last but not least, Jim Treece, Editor of Oklahoma Mason.

P. Vincent Kinkead: Report—hoping to stop the erosion, the fraternity has tried numerous methods to increase membership. Grand Lodges had tried Public Relations firms and paid for advertising and multi-media channels, including newspapers, magazines, bill boards, radio, TV each initiative has hinted at success, and the report gives a summary of the membership of the lodges, by lodge, in U.S. Starting in 1925:

1925 3,157,000

1928 3,295,000

1941 2,451,000

1959 4,103,000

1960 4,099,000 1961 4,086,000

2003 1.600.000

1959 was the year that membership in the Masonic Fraternity peaked here in the United Sates, and 1961 is the year that first decline is shown. This is beginning of the 50 year to date slide.

Our core problem was two fold: loss of Masonic identity and loss of energy.

The task facing Masonry is to attempt to define our Masonic identity in a rapidly changing world. The public wants to know who are the Masons and how do we know them in our lives? When we can answer their questions, we can move forward with traditional programs for public relations--marketing, communication and membership and more. In order to evaluate the present day situation in Freemasonry, we need to assess it strengths and weaknesses. An in-depth analysis of the fraternity was made by the Masonic Information Task Force. A series of penetrating questions listed our findings, and they concluded each section with a summary formed by observations and conclusions.

What has Freemasonry done in the past: provided camaraderie; created an elite status; served as stepping stone to military, arts, business, social contacts and attracted leaders to its membership.

I might stop here and relate a personal experience:

Something of 60 years ago, I petitioned a lodge in the county seat town eleven miles form home. I'm a country boy, farm boy and will probably stay that way. The officers in the lodge were business men on Main Street. A young country boy had no chance of being elected an officer in that lodge.

There was a lodge within a mile and a half from where I was raised, and I had deep Masonic roots there. My father was once a member there. He then moved his membership to Farmington. So after about ten years, I moved my membership to a smaller lodge. The story begins from there. If I had kept my membership in the town lodge, I would not be standing here today talking about Masonry.

I took duel membership with Farmington Lodge about ten years ago, and I received the opportunity to become Master.

Masonry: protecting workers, interest, helping families, operating lodges, opening lodges to non-stonemasons, and finally, ritualizing the method of creating new members.

The summary from this question: Freemasonry evolved from 18th century European Masonry. Today's Masonry is shaped by the 19th century concept of social benevolence, and the 20th Century emphasis on the ritual as the completion of your Masonic Education about the fraternity. You learned the ritual and you were there, and up until just recently, how true that was.

What is currently happening in Masonry?

A slight movement toward wanting to educate the public about the fraternity through recognition that additional communications tools that had failed to heightened public awareness. The inclusion of family members at Masonic events produced mixed results. Acknowledging that Masonry is no longer identified as a lead organization, tension between members regarding priorities, financial commitments; to Masonic building and charitable obligations, starting new programs.

Let me stop and quote something that I said: "any body who listened to Lum and Abner, that's been a good while ago. They had a saying, a thousands or hundred times—and I said a thousand or hundred times how the fraternity does as well as it does, the way we treat each other."

Relies on historical integrity that restricts contemporary relevance.

How does the public perceive Freemasonry today?

Its confused, mistaken duplicity.

The summary to the question is: Masons are not visible in the daily life in their community. There identify is frequently misunderstood and miss represented in the press and by religious critics. Masons fail to perform what they profess and have lost their relevance in the community.

What is the desired image of Freemasonry?

What communicates the identify of Freemasons?

What are the Benefits of Freemasonry within the context of our World?

Summary of the questions was: The Masonic way of life is observable. We are men who build communities through brotherhood that is based on the principled life styles.

Who needs to be aware of the Masonic Fraternity?

What do we want to reach as potential membership?

Summary: Freemasonry wants to reach fellow journeymen seeking enrichment in body, mind and spirit through participation in a brotherhood committed to good works and personal growth. Freemasonry must be a lodge centered, giving members an opportunity to express themselves through activities an improved experiences of the lodge and benefits in the life of the community.

Freemasonry sustains its livability as a fraternal organization through the promise of Masonic ritual and the values through the lodge both in and out of everyday life. As the trustees of Masonic rituals valuable heritage members must continue vigorously their approach to Masonic participation making it an experience that is rewarding, enriching, relevant to the members, and finally, to the families of the greater community.

Masonic awareness through this progress our task force has shared with our vision about Freemasonry. We felt it was obviously critical that we examine the fraternity past in order to properly understand our current needs. This was the first, and now, we must continue with the next step, which is to begin the building of programs that are qualified through our Masonic identify and affirmed through the relevance of our changing world.

Where do we do from here? Its general understood that we don't have enough membership. About every place we go you hear talk about the need to get more members.

My question is, "Do we have too much Masonry?" When I talk about Masonry, I am including the appendant bodies.

Recently, a Grand Master of Missouri emphasized the Masonic Family. They had this book a little summary of the activities of the 35 different Masonic groups that all take Masonic energy.

I got the Crystal Ball out, and it said, "Do we have to have too much Masonry, Yes and no?"

Personally, I don't see any change in the direction in which this fraternity is going today unless some of that Masonic money and Masonic energy in these other appendant bodies is manifest in the lodges.

I know very little about Masonic ritual. But there isn't very much in the ritual of organizations that I have become a member of that couldn't be taught as education material in the lodge.

What I see in the future unless lodges improve their standards, a subject that should be left alone when we talk about the quality of members. Every one of us in this room is not quality to someone else. But the lodge standards have gotten to the point; we ask why would a man that has dressed up in a white shirt and tie want to go to lodge. I see that decline to continue. It's going to take the appendant bodies that evolved from Masonry to demonstrate what it is or was. We evolved from stonemasons or Knight Templar Masonry. 200 years from now some appendant will say that we evolved from the Freemasons of the 20^{th} century.

Masonry as we know it is about 300 years old, and something like 275 years of age in this country. But how long will it take for Masonry, as we know it now, to disappear? I don't think that in the United States that it is going to be so very long. The appendant bodies can keep their standards high and survive.

Attendance at these conferences has changed over the years. My first conference was in 1970, and I am not as well acquainted now with those attending the conference as I was in years past. I see a change. I don't see very many who say that they are "Past Grands". One of the problems with a Past Grands is that they talk too much.

M. C. Lewis from Arkansas when he was Chairman, I told him, "You don't have a conference of officers, you have a reunion of Past Grands."



When such joint assemblies do occur, the membership of each Council must be notified in advance and in accordance with the by-laws in effect for each Council. It will not be necessary to obtain a separate dispensation each time, however, it will be necessary to inform the Grand Master and the Grand Recorder in advance of the event. This edict shall remain in effect until a new Grand Master shall be elected and installed into office.

Edict No. 2

Each Council Recorder shall include on their dues notice to every member of each Council of Royal & Select Masters under the jurisdiction of the Grand Council of Missouri a line item for voluntary contributions to 1) Cryptic Masons Medical Research Foundation, suggested amount \$3.65, and 2) Grand Council Charity Endowment Fund, suggested amount \$3.65. For each member contribution of \$3.65 to the Grand Council Charity Endowment Fund, the subordinate Recorder shall affix to that member's dues card a "Penny-a-Day" sticker, available from the Grand Recorder. Said contributions shall be collected with each member's dues and forwarded to the Grand Recorder as soon as possible, but no later than April 1, 2008. Collected monies for these two charities may be sent in lump sum, payable to the Grand Council of Missouri for each charity. This edict shall remain in effect until a new Grand Master shall be elected and installed into office.

All Councils of Royal and Select Masters in the jurisdiction of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of Missouri, will heretofore report and send to the Grand Recorder any and all funds for charitable contributions, donations, or bequests, so that documentation will be maintained for Missouri to receive credit and the recognition we deserve. All checks shall be issued to the Grand Council of Missouri, with a notation in the memo field of its designated use. This also will aid in the record keeping for charitable organizations under 501 of the IRS Code.

TIME CAPSULE

I was fortunate to have the opportunity to visit the Masonic Time Capsule in Branson on June 29, 2008, with MEC Robert E. Hardester, Grand High Priest, and Sir Knight James Joseph Hayes, Right Eminent Grand Commander.

SURETY BOND

I am in receipt of the required Surety Bonds on the Grand Treasurer and the Grand Secretary and will pass them on to my successor.

MASONIC YOUTH

I was able to represent the Grand Council at the Grand sessions of our three Youth groups. On May 25 - 26, 2008 I attended the Grand session of the Order of DeMolay in Missouri and presented them with a check for \$500.00 from the

Charity Endowment Fund. On June 26, 2008 I attended the Grand session of the Order of Jobs Daughters in Missouri and presented them with a similar Check for \$500.00. And on June 29, 2008 I attended the Grand session of Rainbow for girls in Missouri and presented them with a similar check for \$500.00.

Companions, it was great to see the enthusiasm that these youth showed at their sessions. They were well run and well attended. I feel that through our youth groups, Masonry in Missouri has a good future.

RECOMMENDATIONS

As far as recommendations go, I recommend that we study the new ritual books that the Grand Council Ritual Revision Committee has developed, and that we do the best ritual we can when we have new Candidates. And, that we encourage the Companions and especially the officers of our Councils to attend the Regional York Rite Conferences.

CLOSING REMARKS

In closing I want to thank all the Companions for their Prayers, cards and calls I received during my illness. There are too many Companions for me to name them all, but I would especially like to thank Most Excellent Companion Robert E. Hardester for his help in chauffeuring me around and for his friendship, also Right Eminent Sir Knight J. Joseph Hayes for his help and friendship. It was great working with you guys.

Of course I couldn't close this address without thanking our Grand Secretary/Recorder, Most Illustrious Companion Kevin B. Sample and his wife Joyce for all their help and advice during this year.

To the in coming grand officers. I wish for them to have an enjoyable and productive year. Thank you and GOD BLESS YOU ALL.

All bank accounts are interest bearing, with no service charges, and with amounts being maintained at less than \$100,000 in any one banking institution. Investments in common stock or equal securities in nationally known corporations traded on the New York Stock Exchange, as allowed by Sec. 135 of the By-Laws is being utilized (Ararat Temple Investment Account at Commerce Bank and American Balanced Fund with Premier Bank). Based on previous ledgers, general fund receipts and expenditures are being projected on a monthly basis, so as to keep investments at the highest practical level for the longest practical time frame.

To the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of Missouri:

As of May 1, 2009, we have yet to receive the annual returns of Chillicothe Council No. 28 and Trinity Council No. 47. Chillicothe has not submitted a report since 2006.

Regrettably, we lost one Council as outlined in the address of the Grand Master.

The reports on Council audits and bonds can be found in the tabular statements of the Councils. They shall be forwarded to the Grand Recorder no later than the first day of March of each year. Failure to make such return as provided shall subject the Council to a fine of fifteen dollars for each period of thirty days, or fraction thereof, said return is withheld. *(Amended 5/2/97)*

Joyce and I thank all the officers and members of the Grand Council for the opportunity to work with and serve each of you. I thank the Grand Council Officers for their approval to make a trip to our Grand Master's home on April 26 to present him with his Past Grand Master credentials. I spoke to our Most Puissant Grand Master Joe Vale and received his approval to proceed as well. Enough cannot be said in appreciation to all those Companions who attended. This was the hardest thing I have had to do since assuming the mantle of Grand Recorder and I pray it never has to be done again by any in this office.

(a) To acquaint himself thoroughly with the work and lecturers of the degrees of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of Missouri.

(b) To visit the councils in Missouri as extensively as possible, and instruct them in the work, lectures and ceremonies adopted by the Grand Council.

(c) To make written report to the Grand Council of the work done by him, and of the general condition of the councils as to work, and of such other matters connected with his office as are considered of interest or importance.

(d) To prepare and conduct, in conjunction with the Regional Deputy Grand Master and the Grand Lecturer, at least one Regional Assembly in his region per year.

(e) To recommend and, in conjunction with the Grand Lecturer, approve and accredit degree teams in his region for the Royal, Select, and Super Excellent Master degrees.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

To the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of Missouri:

This Committee did not undertake to produce any papers this year, as there was much fine material already on file with the Grand York Rite office for the use of the constituent Councils to help them qualify for the Grand Council Merit Award If any constituent Council has not already done so, it is strongly urged to obtain copies of three papers (Officer Tools, To Reach Inside Ourselves, and Six Keys to Performing Effective Ritual) produced during the 2007-2008 Grand York Rite year and begin making use of them. To what extent the three fine papers produced during the 2005-2006 Grand York Rite year have been used by the constituent Councils is not known, as we received no feedback. These continue to be posted

on, and are available for downloading and printing from, the Missouri York Rite web site. Many Councils are having their own members offer educational talks covering what appears to be fine topics for discussion.

The recommendations of this Committee are as follows:

1) that, until a more comprehensive training document can be made available, the three above mentioned papers on file with the Grand York Rite office be studied, saved, and used to teach constituent and Grand officers about responsibility, accountability, what they need to know, and know well, about being officers, what they need to be studying, and what they owe the constituent bodies;

2) that since the Grand Council Merit Award Committee's only function has been to act as a clearing house for the processing of data submitted on applications, and that the requirements for the Award fall under the auspices of the Grand Council Education Committee, the latter should have oversight of the Award;

3) that the requirements for the Merit Award be converted into a point system to permit the constituent Councils the freedom to fulfill the requirements with different activities rather than having to slavishly following a set pattern (it is proper, for example, for those Councils who have been extraordinarily active in conferring the degrees to receive credit for this where credit is due), provided however, that the requirements of a minimum representation at important York Rite events, support of Cryptic Masons Medical Research, and submission of an on-time completed annual return with required audit and fees/per capita payments, be kept mandatory;

4) that Grand officers not only read, study, and save the Proceedings, but follow up on the ideas and recommendations made in the Committee Reports;

5) that Grand officers take full advantage of the guidance that this Committee is making available to them and utilize the available materials;

6) that Education for Preservation become the focus of a combined Grand York Rite effort to provide essential solutions and to address membership decline; where there is education there is interest, and where there is interest, the waters are stirred to stimulate membership;

7) that this Committee collaborate in the future with the Education Committees of the Grand Chapter and Grand Commandery in developing a training document for a common program of education for teaching constituent and Grand officers about a) reorganizing the way we do business, b) creating management methods where none currently exist, c) managing dysfunctional organizations including reforming the management structure in the State, d) providing a quality experience for the membership, and e) maintaining the prestige of holding York Rite membership so the world at large can better see us for what we are;

8) that a designated Education Officer and Assistant Education Officer in each constituent York Rite body in Missouri be made a requirement by edict or general order; and

9) that recommendations numbers 6, 7, and 8 be supported and promoted in perpetuity by all Grand presiding officers of the York Rite of Missouri.

PARTIAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPLAR JURISPRUDENCE

BE IT RESOLVED THAT *ARTICLE I, The Grand Commandery, Section 3. Of whom composed, Subsection A*, be amended by addition of: A single nomination for the Station of Grand Warder may be made by any Constituent Commandery providing that, the Constituent Commandery is legally represented at the Annual Conclave at which the nomination is being made. Such Constituent Commandery must have prepared a short biography in writing and made presentation of same to the Credentials Committee at the time of registration. The Constituent Commandery must select a single speaker who will verbally present the nomination at the time called for the election of officers during the Annual Conclave. The traditional and past practice by the Past Grand Commanders of suggesting a mystic knight shall not be infringed. However, the Past Grand Commanders will also select a single speaker to make a nomination and verbally present a short biography at the time called for the election of officers during the Annual Conclave.

IF ADOPTED, this wording will appear as the next sentences following "installed." in the fourth paragraph of the Subsection.

THIS SUBSECTION AT PARAGRAPH FOUR CURRENTLY READS: A majority of the votes cast shall elect, and such elected officers shall hold their respective offices until their successors are installed.

IF ADOPTED THIS SUBSECTION WILL READ: A majority of the votes cast shall elect, and such elected officers shall hold their respective offices until their successors are installed. A single nomination for the Station of Grand Warder may be made by any Constituent Commandery providing that, the Constituent Commandery is legally represented at the Annual Conclave at which the nomination is being made. Such Constituent Commandery must have prepared a short biography in writing and made presentation of same to the Credentials Committee at the time of registration. The Constituent Commandery must select a single speaker who will verbally present the nomination at the time called for the election of officers during the Annual Conclave. The traditional and past practice by the Past Grand Commanders of suggesting a mystic knight shall not be infringed. However, the Past Grand Commanders will also select a single speaker to make a nomination and verbally present a short biography at the time called for the election of officers during the Annual Conclave.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: The proposed amendment attempts to address the numerous complaints voiced by the membership as regards the process for electing an individual to fill the station of the Grand Warder. It appears that confusion most always abounds among the voting delegates as to a proper nominee. While the Past Grand Commanders have performed impeccably well in suggesting a potential nominee, unfortunately, such implication rarely is adequately disseminated. There has been much concern expressed that the process is less than fair in that, some of the Constituent Commanderies feel that they have well qualified individuals who are not getting the opportunity for consideration.

GRAND ENCAMPMENT

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri

Greetings: A situation has recently come to light concerning the per capita tax charged by the Grand Encampment on 50 (fifty) year members of the Grand Commandery as well as other miscellaneous fees, dues and/or assessments. The Grand Commandery of Missouri, by law, specifically exempts its 50 (fifty) year members from these payments which means that, should a Constituent Commandery also have written its by-laws to accommodate such exemptions, such Constituent Commandery would still have the responsibility of paying the per capita and/or any other fees, dues or assessments to the Grand Commandery for a pass through to the Grand Encampment. By consensus of opinion, the Grand Line Officers feel that this practice is inappropriate and does not exemplify a due respect for those that have served this Grand Commandery for so, so many years. Jurisprudence was directed by the Grand Commander and the current line officers to prepare resolutions addressing both issues, one as a matter of the Constitution of the Grand Encampment, the other as a matter of the Statutes of the Grand Encampment for presentation at the upcoming Triennial. While no specific action need be taken by this Grand Commandery, the resolutions are included for informational purposes and as a matter for record.

Suggested amendments to the CONSTITUTION AND STATUTES OF THE GRAND ENCAMPMENT OF KNIGHTS TEMPLAR OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Constitution:

BE IT RESOLVED THAT *Section 10 REVENUE AND FINANCES* be amended to include the wording, "except that no per capita tax dues shall be levied upon any member of a Grand or Subordinate Commandery that has attained fifty (50) years or more of service", following the third (3rd) reference to Subordinate Commanderies in the paragraph.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the wording "however, no assessment shall be levied against a Grand or Subordinate Commandery for any member that has attained fifty (50) years or more of service" be added following the last word in the paragraph.

THIS SECTION CURRENT READS: It may levy and collect fees for Dispensations and Charters issued to Grand and Subordinate Commanderies; may levy a fee for each Knight Templar created by Subordinate Commanderies; may levy annual per capita dues upon Grand and Subordinate Commanderies; and may also levy assessments upon Grand and Subordinate Commanderies.

IF ADOPTED THIS SECTION WILL READ: It may levy and collect fees for Dispensations and Charters issued to Grand and Subordinate Commanderies; may levy a fee for each Knight Templar created by Subordinate Commanderies; may levy annual per capita dues upon Grand and Subordinate Commanderies except that no per capita tax dues shall be levied upon any member of a Grand or Subordinate Commandery that has attained fifty (50) years or more of service; and may also levy assessments upon Grand and Subordinate Commanderies based upon the membership therein however, no assessment shall be levied against a Grand or Subordinate Commandery for any member that has attained fifty (50) years or more of service.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: Those that have attained this longevity should be awarded some measure of recognition for this auspicious accomplishment. Many of these Sir Knights have attained an age that could potentially bring about infirmity, mental lapse, or other malady if it has not already. Indeed, many live on a fixed income that does not quite or barely meets their daily needs given the ever increasing costs of medical support and necessary prescriptions. It seems an injustice to place our Brothers in such a position that they have to make the decision to abandon their membership in order to

pay for needed expenses. Our fraternity espouses relief and Brotherly Love to our Brotherhood. What better way to demonstrate these attributes than to relieve these Fratres of this burden and give them a small measure of recognition as well?

Statutes:

BE IT RESOLVED THAT *CHAPTER II GRAND ENCAMPMENT, Section 120 REVENUE* be amended by addition of the wording, "except that no annual per capita shall be levied upon any member of a Grand or Subordinate Commandery that has attained fifty (50) years or more of service" immediately following the last word of the paragraph.

THIS SECTION CURRENTLY READS: Each Subordinate Commandery shall pay to the Grand Recorder of the Grand Encampment Two Dollars (\$2.00) for each Knight Templar created in such Commandery, and an annual per capita of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each member on the roll of such Commandery on the first day of January of each year.

{It is believed that the dollar figures in this Section are no longer valid, however, this Grand Commandery has not received any updates by way of an ADDENDA since 2001.}

IF ADOPTED THIS SECTION WILL READ: Each Subordinate Commandery shall pay to the Grand Recorder of the Grand Encampment Two Dollars (\$2.00) for each Knight Templar created in such Commandery, and an annual per capita of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each member on the roll of such Commandery on the first day of January of each year except that no annual per capita shall be levied upon any member of a Grand or Subordinate Commandery that has attained fifty (50) years or more of service.

{Again, the proper dollar figures should be inserted into the proposal prior to presentation.)

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: Those that have attained this longevity should be awarded some measure of recognition for this auspicious accomplishment. Many of these Sir Knights have attained an age that could potentially bring about infirmity, mental lapse, or other malady if it has not already. Indeed, many live on a fixed income that does not quite or barely meets their daily needs given the ever increasing costs of medical support and necessary prescriptions. It seems an injustice to place our Brothers in such a position that they have to make the decision to abandon their membership in order to pay for needed expenses. Our fraternity espouses relief and Brotherly Love to our Brotherhood. What better way to demonstrate these attributes than to relieve these Fratres of this burden and give them a small measure of recognition as well? BE IT RESOLVED THAT all references that the Grand Commandery has a Constitution or By-laws, wherever they may be found within the Laws and Regulations or within the ritual, be stricken. Laws and Regulations shall be substituted for any reference to By-laws. This resolution will include a title change for ARTICLE XVIII from Change of By-laws to Change of Laws and Regulations.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: The Grand Commandery of Missouri has no Constitution. The Grand Commandery of Missouri has no By-laws. It has Laws and Regulations.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: The section has been a bone of contention for quite some time. It is time it went away. Elimination of this Section will remove the prohibition against nominations of officers by Constituent Commanderies and open an avenue for nominating a Grand Warder as below.

THIS SECTION CURRENT READS: Election of Officers of the Grand Commandery shall be held at each Annual Conclave, at an hour to be announced in the official notice.

IF AMENDED THIS SECTION WILL READ: Election of Officers of the Grand Commandery shall be held at each Annual Conclave, at an hour to be announced in the official notice. The Office of The Grand Warder shall be filled by nominations made from the floor at each Annual Conclave.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: While the office of the Grand Warder will still be an elective office under this proposal as per ARTICLE I, Section 3. A., the process for the election of a Sir Knight to the office will change to permit nominations. Taking the vote by paper ballot is likewise not affected. The current method of balloting is cumbersome and confusing which frequently results in many of the Sir Knights being "left in the dark" about possible qualified candidates that are eligible to hold the office. Complaints are raised at every Annual Conclave from uninformed Sir Knights about the mystique of the current process and the fact that they did not get the "word". While it may be a simple task to review a copy of the program to ascertain who the current line officers are and to either vote to advance the line or write in other names, such is not the case with the office of the Grand Warder. By allowing nominations from the floor, such mystique and confusion should be eliminated.

The Committee on Templar Jurisprudence shall, from time to time, either at its own volition or upon the prompting of others, review the Rules and Regulations paying particular attention to the omission of words or phrases, lack of capitalization, doubled wording, misspelling or other obvious error. On making such observations, the Committee shall notify the Grand Commander, Deputy Grand Commander and Grand Generalissimo of its findings. On review, the Grand Commander, Deputy Grand Commander and Grand Generalissimo may order that a correction(s) be made so long as the original intent or meaning of the Section (s) is not affected by the change. The Committee on Templar Jurisprudence shall note the occurrence (s) in its annual report to the Grand Commandery and if no objection appears, such changes shall automatically be made without benefit of the presentation of a formal resolution.

THIS SECTION CURRENTLY READS: The Committee on Templar Jurisprudence shall consider the decisions made by the Grand Commander, and all the questions of laws referred to it, and report its findings for the action of the Grand Commandery. All proposed amendments or additions to the laws and regulations of the Grand Commandery or any proposed amendments to the Constitution and Statutes of the Grand Commandery, or any other matter which may properly come before this committee, must be submitted in writing to the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee and in proper form, at least thirty (30) days prior to the Grand Commandery's Annual Conclave. No changes or additions shall be made to the said laws and regulations until the same have been considered and reported upon by this committee.

IF ADOPTED THIS SECTION WILL READ: The Committee on Templar Jurisprudence shall consider the decisions made by the Grand Commander, and all the questions of laws referred to it, and report its findings for the action of the Grand Commandery. All proposed amendments or additions to the laws and regulations of the Grand Commandery or any proposed amendments to the Constitution and Statutes of the Grand Commandery, or any other matter which may properly come before this committee, must be submitted in writing to the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee and in proper form, at least thirty (30) days prior to the Grand Commandery's Annual Conclave. No changes or additions shall be made to the said laws and regulations until the same have been considered and reported upon by this committee. The Committee on Templar Jurisprudence shall, from time to time, either at its own volition or upon the prompting of others, review the Rules and Regulations paying particular attention to the omission of words or phrases, lack of capitalization, doubled wording, misspelling or other obvious error. On making such observations, the Committee shall notify the Grand Commander, Deputy Grand Commander and Grand Generalissimo may order that a correction(s) be made so long as the original intent or meaning of the Section (s) is not affected by the change. The Committee on Templar Jurisprudence shall note the occurrence (s) in its annual report to the Grand Commandery and if no objection appears, such changes shall automatically be made without benefit of the presentation of a formal resolution.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: Minor errors in the laws and Regulations have come to the attention of the Committee from time to time. Amendment of the Laws and Regulations normally requires a resolution, the preparation of

which can be both confusing and time consuming. The Committee feels this process in some circumstances is unnecessary and burdensome in light of a minor change as addressed in the resolution that does not affect original intent or meaning.

Such line items should include, but may not necessarily be limited to the Knights Templar Eye Foundation with a suggested contribution of \$5.00; the Holy Land Pilgrimage Endowment Fund with a suggested contribution of \$3.65; and, the Charity Endowment Fund with a suggested contribution of \$5.00. The Grand Recorder will issue each Commandery a number of Holy Land Pilgrimage stickers to affix to the dues card of each Sir Knight that gives at least \$3.65 to the Holy Land Pilgrimage endowment fund. Constituent Commandery Recorders will affix such stickers to the Sir Knight's dues card and send it to the Sir Knight. Contributions collected are to be forwarded to the Grand Recorder, in a timely and efficient manner, the check written to the Grand Commandery of Missouri, with a notation in the memo field designating the charity as noted above for which it was collected.

IF ADOPTED THIS SECTION WILL READ: Will cause to be written and provided to each Sir Knight on its rolls, including those whose dues have been remitted and those that are endowed, an annual dues notice on which are written line items for the suggested voluntary contributions for the charities that we support. Such line items should include, but may not necessarily be limited to the Knights Templar Eye Foundation with a suggested contribution of \$5.00; the Holy Land Pilgrimage Endowment Fund with a suggested contribution of \$3.65; and, the Charity Endowment Fund with a suggested contribution of \$5.00. The Grand Recorder will issue each Commandery a number of Holy Land Pilgrimage stickers to affix to the dues card of each Sir Knight that gives at least \$3.65 to the Holy Land Pilgrimage endowment fund. Constituent Commandery Recorders will affix such stickers to the Sir Knight's dues card and send it to the Sir Knight. Contributions collected are to be forwarded to the Grand Recorder, in a timely and efficient manner, the check written to the Grand Commandery of Missouri, with a notation in the memo field designating the charity as noted above for which it was collected.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: General Order No. 9 written by PGC Fred Troxel and addressing the issue of voluntary contributions went into effect June 2, 2007. On May 27, 2008, GC Joseph Hayes reissued General Order No. 9 in toto. It has been observed that some Constituent Commandery Recorders have ignored the General Orders. Perhaps a more formal presentation under the Laws and Regulations will capture their attention.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT *ARTICLE XI, Dues, Section 171, Members May Not be Exempted*, be amended by deleting the third paragraph and replacing the second paragraph with the following words, "When the dues of any member of a Constituent Commandery shall have been remitted for the reasons set out above, the per capita tax due the Grand Commandery on such member shall be reduced to the amount due the Grand Encampment, provided that a member is exempt from payment of dues, who has been a Knight Templar in good standing for 50 years or more".

THIS SECTION CURRENTLY READS: A Commandery may not exempt a member from all yearly dues by electing him an honorary member, nor as compensation for services rendered: provided, the dues of any member of a Commandery may be remitted, in whole or in part, for inability to pay, upon proper application in person or in writing, or upon a statement made by a Knight justifying such action.

When the dues of any member of a Constituent Commandery shall have been remitted for the reasons set out above, the per capita tax due the Grand Commandery on such member shall be reduced to the amount due the Grand Encampment.

Any Constituent Commandery, may, by provision in its By-laws, and with the sanction of the Grand Commandery, remit the dues of its members who have paid dues for fifty (50) years.

IF ADOPTED, THIS SECTION WOULD READ: A Commandery may not exempt a member from all yearly dues by electing him an honorary member, nor as compensation for services rendered: provided, the dues of any member of a

Commandery may be remitted, in whole or in part, for inability to pay, upon proper application in person or in writing, or upon a statement made by a Knight justifying such action.

When the dues of any member of a Constituent Commandery shall have been remitted for the reasons set out above, the per capita tax due the Grand Commandery on such member shall be reduced to the amount due the Grand Encampment, provided that a member is exempt from payment of dues, who has been a Knight Templar in good standing for 50 years or more.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: Each year as Commanderies income from dues decreases and per capita increases are put into effect by the Grand Commandery and the Grand Encampment, it is increasingly difficult for these Commanderies to be able to afford to remit the dues of those who have attained 50 years of membership in the Commandery. Each year, 50-year members are proposed for suspension for non-payment of dues. Sir Knights, this is wrong and is long past due for correction. Any Sir Knight who has attained 50 years of membership should be exempt from the payment of dues, as is the case in the Grand Chapter and Grand Council. The Grand Commandery should recognize that it will become liable for the Grand Encampment per capita on these 50-year members as the Grand Encampment does not allow for the remission of per capita on any member for any reason. Estimated cost to the Grand Commandery annually will be \$1,000.00. Places the burden for the remission of dues of 50 year members upon the Grand Commandery and removes the requirement that a Constituent Commadnery amend its By-laws to provide for the remission of dues of 50 members.

This shall then be forwarded to the Grand Recorder. All checks shall be made payable to the Grand Commandery of Missouri, with a notation in the memo field of its designated destination. The Grand Recorder shall record the receipt thereof and forward the same to the Grand Treasurer for deposit and disbursement as the source of the funds directs or requires.

THIS SECTION CURRENTLY READS: Every committee or officer of the Grand Commandery charged with the expenditure of any funds appropriated by the Grand Commandery, shall make a full and complete report of the appropriation, and amount expended, and the balance, if any, remaining in the hands of the officer or committee, shall be turned back to the Grand Recorder and by him lapsed into the general fund. No appropriation shall be continued beyond the current year except by re-appropriation. The Triennial Fund shall be exempted from this provision and any unexpended funds shall be returned to the Triennial Endowment Fund.

IF ADOPTED THIS SECTION WILL READ:

A. Every committee or officer of the Grand Commandery charged with the expenditure of any funds appropriated by the Grand Commandery, shall make a full and complete report of the appropriation, and amount expended, and the balance, if any, remaining in the hands of the officer or committee, shall be turned back to the Grand Recorder and by him lapsed into the general fund. No appropriation shall be continued beyond the current year except by re-appropriation. The Triennial Fund shall be exempted from this provision and any unexpended funds shall be returned to the Triennial Endowment Fund.

B. All funds received by any Grand Commandery Committee or individual on behalf of a Constituent Commandery, the Grand Commandery, or its charitable works shall include a signed tabulation sheet documenting the contribution by date, amount, from what source, and its disbursement directive. This shall then be forwarded to the Grand Recorder. All checks shall be made payable to the Grand Commandery of Missouri, with a notation in the memo field of its designated destination. The Grand Recorder shall record the receipt thereof and forward the same to the Grand Treasurer for deposit and disbursement as the source of the funds directs or requires.

The Grand Commandery Endowed Membership Fund has a total membership of 146 with a total endowed value of \$73,444.45. It had a 2008 distribution value of \$2,983.04 to 24 Commanderies.

Investments are in a combination of interest bearing money market accounts and Certificates of Deposit. Current interest rates have limited these monies from being invested in long-term certificates.

Short-term rates at this time are more favorable and allow greater flexibility to move moneys to better performing accounts whenever possible. The current economy has necessitated that funds be invested at much lower than desired rates of return. As the economy improves these short tern investments can once again be invested at more reasonable rates of return, thusly enhancing the distribution values.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMBERSHIP

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Missouri:

Sir Knights, I here present a very dismal picture of our Commandery.

In 2002 our membership stood at 6666, by 2003 we had declined to 6230, in 2004 we fell to 5859, by 2005 our numbers were at 5438, in 2006 they were 5223, and in 2007 they were at 3800. With the partial 2008 returns, we have fallen to a projected number of 3511 (now below that of the Grand Council) and showing a projected number for the end of 2009 to stand at 3195.

In the 10 years since 2000 (7305 membership), we have lost almost 55% of our members.

The previous chairman of the membership committee wondered where we would be in 20 years. At the current rate, we will cease to exist by 2020. We will be just a name.

We are suspending way too many members for non payment of dues. Each Commandery needs to appoint a membership committee of two to three members and follow up on the unpaid members before they are suspended. We need to know why they are not continuing their membership.

The same committee should contact previously suspended members and see about getting them reinstated. They joined our number for some reason and apparently we have not met the need.

We should all be promoting the York Rite in our own Lodges and we need to be visiting all Blue Lodges that do not have a York Rite presence and invite the members to join our order and gain further light in freemasonry and more knowledge.

We keep complaining of dues increases. The dues will continue to rise as our membership declines, because our expenses continue to rise as we now operate.

Sir Knights, we need to replace ourselves with a new member. Make a concentrated effort so we can continue. This is going to take a real effort on each of our parts. Our Grand Officers cannot do this by themselves. They can make recommendations but the end result is in each of our hands.

There is nothing we can do about death, as it eventually comes to each of us, but we can work on suspensions, reinstatements and new members.
